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this volume examines the concept of word in its many guises and across many languages word is a cornerstone for the understanding of any language it is a pronounceable phonological unit it has a meaning and a morphological structure and syntactic function and it exists as a dictionary entry and an orthographic item speakers also understand word as a psychological reality they can talk about the meaning of a word and its suitability in certain social contexts however the relationship between the phonological word and grammatical word can be more complex in that a phonological word can consist of more than one grammatical word or vice versa following an introduction outlining the parameters of variation for phonological word and grammatical word the chapters in this volume explore how the concept of word can be applied to languages of diverse typological make up from the highly synthetic to highly analytic the data are drawn from languages of australia and the pacific fijian yalaku yidiñ the americas chamacoco murui jarawara asia hmong japanese lao and africa makary kotoko with a final chapter that investigates the properties of word from a cross linguistic perspective the volume advances our understanding of what constitutes a word and will be a valuable resource for scholars and students of typology linguistic anthropology phonology and grammar

this grammar of kenyan sign language ksl phonology adds to a sparse literature on the units of categorical form in the world s sign languages at the same time it brings descriptive and theoretical research on sign language phonology into better alignment by systematically evaluating current models of sign language phonology for each of the main parameters handshape location and movement against the ksl data this grammar also makes a methodological contribution by using a unique dataset of ksl minimal pairs in the analysis demonstrating that minimal pairs are not as infrequent in sign languages as previously thought the main content of the book is found in five chapters on handshape location core articulatory movement manner of movement and other

distinctive features e.g. orientation, mouth actions. The book also contains two large appendices that document the phonological evidence for each of the 44 handshapes and 37 locations. This book will be a key reference for descriptive and typological studies of sign phonology as well as a helpful resource for linguists interested in understanding the similarities and differences between current models of sign phonology and identifying promising avenues for future research.

Spontaneous speech errors provide valuable evidence not only for the processes that mediate between a communicative intention and the articulation of an utterance but also for the types of grammatical entities that are manipulated during production. This study proposes an analysis of speech errors that is informed by grammar theory. In particular, it is shown how characteristic properties of erroneous German utterances can be accounted for within Distributed Morphology (DM). The investigation focuses on two groups of errors: errors that result from the manipulation of semantic and morphosyntactic features, and errors which appear to involve the application of a post-error repair strategy. It is argued that a production model which incorporates DM allows for a straightforward account of the attested, sometimes complex error patterns. DM mechanisms, for instance, render unnecessary the assumption of repair processes. Besides providing an account for the attested error patterns, the theory also helps us in explaining why certain errors do not occur. In this sense, DM makes for a psychologically real model of grammar.

What is a grammar? What types of grammar are possible in natural languages? Why, and to what extent, do grammatical properties vary from one language to another? This book gathers ten original contributions on the phonology and morphosyntax of various languages which, from several complementary angles, contribute to the general debate on the genesis and structure of grammars. Their common thread is the logical relationship between general theory and particular grammars, basing their reflections on the careful study of various empirical materials from Lithuanian, Gothic, Sanskrit, Nakanai, Bosnian, Croatian, and Serbian, Finnic languages, Atlantic languages, Proto-Western Arabic, and Maltese to Occitan, Medieval French, Medieval and Modern Italo-Romance. The general and common angle to these contributions is to describe and model variation in grammar.
