the palauan reference grammar offers a comprehensive description of the language that will interest speakers of palauan and linguists alike although the linguistic phenomena of palauan are often extremely complex special efforts have been made to keep explanations as simple and clear as possible while capturing the essential phonological and grammatical principles unique to the language learning is facilitated by extensive cross referencing a list of phonetic and orthographic symbols a glossary of relevant linguistic terms a brief bibliography and an index material is presented in order of difficulty with an analysis at each stage some information of a highly technical nature is also included for readers with a background in linguistics

the philippines series of the pali language texts under the general editorship of howard p mckaughan consists of lesson textbooks grammars and dictionaries for seven major filipino languages ilokano is an austronesian language it ranks third among the major languages of the philippines being spoken by just over 12 percent of the population widely spoken throughout the philippines ilokano is the dominant language of most of the provinces of northern luzon and is used as a lingua franca by non ilokano speakers in this area settlers have also carried the language to mindoro and to several areas in mindanao the ilokano reference grammar was developed under the auspices of the pacific and asian linguistics institute pali of the university of hawaii and accompanies the ilokano dictionary by the same author as well as ilokano lessons by bernabe lapid and sibayan this reference grammar concentrates on syntactic structures professor constantino cites morphological farms in depth in his dictionary consequently the treatment here should be used in conjunction with both the dictionary and the lessons mentioned above it is the hope of the editor and author alike that this reference grammar will prove of value and interest to learners of ilokano

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the yapese reference grammar is a comprehensive survey of the yapese language all important aspects of the language phonology morphology and syntax are discussed at both the phrase and sentence levels of structure useful features of the

text are the extensive cross referencing a glossary of relevant linguistic terms and an index though the book is aimed primarily at speakers of the language both students and teachers on the island of yap the text has been so organized as to be useful also to others interested in the language thus the linguist the scientist and the general reader with an interest in language may profit from study of the text

this is the first attempt to present for native speakers of mokilese the essential features of the language written primarily for a lay audience with no prior knowledge of linguistics this work will be useful as well to the professional linguist seeking data on a micronesian language the grammar covers the phonology morphology and syntax of mokilese separate treatment is given to the nominal reference system quantification and counting possession transitivity modality direction markers verbal aspect complex sentences derivation and questions of topicalization and focus an appendix discusses problems in devising an orthography for mokilese and the methodology employed

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bikol grammar notes form part of a basic bikol language course they are to be used as a companion volume to bikol text also by malcolm w mintz included also in the series for bikol is a quite comprehensive dictionary which may be used as reference but separate from a language course the bikol materials in turn form a part of a larger series on six other philippine languages all developed by the pacific and asian linguistics institute of the university of hawaii under a contract with peace corps pczs 1507 it is the hope of the author of this volume and the editor of the series that many will be encouraged to learn bikol through these materials

without question this is the definitive grammar of the hawaiian language indeed it is the first attempt at a comprehensive treatment of the subject since w d alexander published his concise short synopsis of the most essential points in hawaiian grammar in 1864 this grammar is intended as a companion to the hawaiian dictionary by the same authors the grammar was written with every student of the hawaiian language in mind from the casual interested layperson to the professional linguist and grammarian although it was obviously impossible to avoid technical terms their use was kept to a minimum and a glossary is included for those who need its help each point of grammar is illustrated with examples many from hawaiian language literature

the best available primer in the grammar of the hawaiian language its introduction to the structure and idiosyncrasies of the language offers an opportunity to study the genuine uncorrupted idiom as spoken by older hawaiians of a century ago employs the standard terms and divisions of european grammars with clear explanations and numerous examples
