it s important that research with indigenous peoples is ethically and methodologically relevant this volume looks at challenges involved in this research and offers best practice guidelines to research communities exploring how adherence to ethical research principles acknowledges and maintains the integrity of indigenous people and knowledge

this book is situated in the simultaneous thinking theory and doing action of posthumanist performativity and new materialist methodologies to bring forth a multitude of stories that demonstrate co constituted and co implicated worldmaking practices it is written in response to the fact that our earth is at a critical juncture as atmospheric temperatures rise and cast unprecedented and wide spread social and ecological crises across the planet social and ecological injustices and threats cannot be separated from globalising neoliberal capitalist and colonial discourses that proliferate through anthropocentric and humancentric logics manifesting in binary classifications that position the human as separate from the earth and dominant categories of the human in hierarchies of power such logics homogenise and institutionalise the field of environmental education and result in an over emphasis on instrumentalist technicist and mechanistic teaching and learning practices exploring the affects emerging within and between an assemblage comprising researcher teacher environmental education worldings this book seeks to understand how the researcher makes sense of herself with in the broader ecologies of the world collaborative processes with an elementary school teacher in saskatchewan canada as actualised through four co created and co implemented multisensory researcher teacher enactments mindful walking mapping worlds eco art installation and photographic encounters and how the researcher teacher organises themselves with land based pedagogies environmental education curriculum policy and wider discourses of western education this book does not propose a better way of teaching and learning in environmental education rather showing how difference between categories is relationally bound this book offers a conceptual re storying of human earth relationships in environmental education for social and ecological justice in these times of the anthropocene

this book amplifies the distinct intersecting and coalitional possibilities of education in the spaces of ongoing movements for native and black liberation contributors highlight the importance of activist oriented teaching and learning in community encampments and other movement spaces for the preservation and expansion of resistance education with chapters from scholars educators and organizers this volume offers lessons taken from these experiences for nation state schools classrooms and spaces of teaching and learning that are most commonly experienced by native and black children and educators through attention to recent social movements across the united states from standing rock to black lives matter this book demonstrates the vital connections between native and black communities educational futures

mapping possibility traces the intertwined intellectual professional and emotional life of leonie sandercock with an impressive career spanning nearly half a century as an educator researcher artist and practitioner sandercock is one of the leading figures in community planning dedicating her life to pursuing social cultural and environmental justice through her work in this book leonie sandercock reflects on her past writings and films which played an important role in redefining the field in more progressive directions both in theory and practice it includes previously published essays in conjunction with insightful commentaries prefacing each section and four new essays two discussing sandercock s most recent work on a feature film project with indigenous partners innovative visionary and audacious leonie s community based scholarship and practice in the fields of urban planning and community development have engaged some of the most intractable issues of our time inequality discrimination and racism through award winning books and films she has influenced the planning field to become more culturally fluent addressing diversity and difference through structural change this book draws a map of hope for emerging planners dedicated to equity justice and sustainability it will inspire the next generation of community planners as well as current practitioners and students in planning cultural studies urban studies architecture and community development

a collection of engaging essays that seeks to uniquely reperiodize american literature it is all but inevitable for literary history to be divided into periods early american antebellum modern post 1945 such designations organize our knowledge

of the past and shape the ways we discuss that past today these periods tend to align with the watershed moments in american history even as the field has shifted its perspective away from the nation state it is high time we rethink these defining periods of american literary history as the drawing of literary timelines is a necessary even illuminating practice in these short spirited and imaginative essays 23 leading americanists gamely fashion new unorthodox literary periods from 600 b c e to the present from the age of van buren to the age of microeconomics they bring to light literary and cultural histories that have been obscured by traditional timelines and raise provocative questions what is our definition of modernism if we imagine it stretching from 1865 to 1965 instead of 1890 to 1945 how does the captivity narrative change when we consider it as a contemporary not just a colonial genre what does the course of american literature look like set against the backdrop of federal denials of native sovereignty or housing policies that exacerbated segregation filled with challenges to scholars inspirations for teachers anchored by an appendix of syllabi and entry points for students timelines of american literature gathers some of the most exciting new work in the field to showcase the revelatory potential of fresh thinking about how we organize the literary past

diverse social programmes including conditional cash transfer programmes labour and production inclusion programmes and social pensions are being implemented in latin american and caribbean countries with the aim of ending poverty and reducing inequalities throughout the life cycle this book offers an up to date analysis of these programmes and the way they relate to labour inclusion and analyses ongoing debates regarding the possible incentives and disincentives they create in terms of the labour supply formalization and child labour among the target population considering that poverty is a structural problem of highly unequal societies the thesis that poverty is due to a lack of effort on the part of the poor is argued to be an expression of the strong prejudice against those living in poverty the great majority of whom work or are actively seeking employment but are hampered by the large decent work deficits existing in the region from an integrated and rights based perspective public policies should simultaneously address the twofold challenge of social and labour inclusion in order to achieve basic thresholds of well being by ensuring income universal access to good quality social services and opportunities for decent work
