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this is the first english translation of a controversial japanese best seller that made the public aware of the social problem of hikikomori or withdrawal a phenomenon estimated by the author to involve as many as one million japanese adolescents and young adults who have withdrawn from society retreating to their rooms for months or years and severing almost all ties to the outside world saitō tamaki's work of popular psychology provoked a national debate about the causes and extent of the condition since hikikomori was published in japan in 1998 the problem of social withdrawal has increasingly been recognized as an international one and this translation promises to bring much needed attention to the issue in the english speaking world according to the new york times as a hikikomori ages the odds that he'll re enter the world decline indeed some experts predict that most hikikomori who are withdrawn for a year or more may never fully recover that means that even if they emerge from their rooms they either won't get a full time job or won't be involved in a long term relationship and some will never leave home in many cases their parents are now approaching retirement and once they die the fate of the shut ins whose social and work skills if they ever existed will have atrophied is an open question drawing on his own clinical experience with hikikomori patients saitō creates a working definition of social withdrawal and explains its development he argues that hikikomori sufferers manifest a specific interconnected series of symptoms that do not fit neatly with any single easily identifiable mental condition such as depression rejecting the tendency to moralize or pathologize saitō sensitively describes how families and caregivers can support individuals in withdrawal and help them take steps toward recovery at the same time his perspective sparked contention over the contributions of cultural characteristics including family structure the education system and gender relations to the problem of social withdrawal in japan and abroad

ten follies a journey around the world in ten forms of madness focuses on a critical question in the history of psychiatry to what extent does psychopathology describe phenomena that exist before or beyond their description marco innamorati probes the view that any description of a psychopathological phenomenon is to a significant extent the result of a construction by the subject describing it or a co construction made by the clinician and the

patient a perspective also known as the constructivist approach starting from the work of the philosopher and historian of science ian hacking who proposed the concept of transient mental illness i.e. an illness that appears at a given time in a given place and then disappears hacking 1998 innamorati explores some forms of madness that seem to arise in a particular environment and in specific historical circumstances developing through a kind of epidemic and then disappearing almost definitively the author evaluates strengths and weaknesses of the constructivist approach by juxtaposing evolving hermeneutical questions to cultural factors from hysteria to demonic possession from the mad travellers to arctic shamanism until the recent mushrooming of the hikikomori phenomenon ten follies is an unconventional journey around the world in ten forms of madness which takes the reader through astonishing stories of suffering and healing against the trend of mapping a single globalised discourse of folly this book embraces a kind of philosophical perspectivism ten follies which echoes the contemporary cultural transformation of the many narratives of madness

japan is not only the oldest society in the world today but also the oldest society to have ever existed this aging trend however presents many challenges to contemporary japan as it permeates all areas of life from the economy and welfare to social cohesion and population decline nobody is more affected by these changes than the young generation this book studies japanese youth in the aging society in detail it analyses formative events and cultural reactions themes include employment parenthood sexuality but also art literature and language thus demonstrating how the younger generation can provide insights into the future of japanese society more generally this book argues that the prolonged crisis resulted in a commonly shared destabilization of thoughts and attitudes and that this has shaped a new generation that is unlike any other in post war japan presenting an inter disciplinary approach to the study of the aging trend and what it implies for young japanese this book will be useful to students and scholars of japanese culture and society as well cultural anthropology and demography

the condition named hikikomori by the japanese psychiatrist saito tamaki describes the suffering of young people who withdraw from society abandon their studies jobs and social life to lock themselves in a room usually at their

parents house driven by internet addiction and isolation during the pandemic this phenomenon has only gotten worse this problem has two key pieces results orientated societies and family nucleus that generate extended dependency in adolescents find out how the phenomenon of the hikikomori spread outside of japan and the asian world and how the covid 19 epidemic could affect its spread

this book examines the phenomenon of social withdrawal in japan which ranges from school non attendance to extreme forms of isolation and confinement known as hikikomori based on extensive original research including interview research with a range of practitioners involved in dealing with the phenomenon the book outlines how hikikomori expresses itself how it is treated and dealt with and how it has been perceived and regarded in japan over time the author a clinical psychologist with extensive experience of practice argues that the phenomenon although socially unacceptable is not homogenous and can be viewed not as a mental disorder but as an idiom of distress a passive and effective way of resisting the many great pressures of japanese schooling and of japanese society more widely the open access version of this book available at taylorfrancis.com/books/e/9781351260800 has been made available under a creative commons attribution non commercial no derivatives ccby nc nd licence

this book explores adolescents 10 18 years experiences of silence solitude loneliness within the school setting although many studies explore social withdrawal and loneliness in adolescence little is known about young people s experiences of solitude as a state of being alone this book ties together cutting edge research from developmental psychology and education on solitude in adolescence and opens the way to a pedagogy of solitude and well being sandra leanne bosacki explores concerns about how adolescents learn social and solitude skills and the extent to which such skills are harmful or helpful including self control and regulation and self compassion the book further explores implications of solitude studies for practice and provides recommendations for future research and education holistic models of education are encouraged to promote a balance of social and solitude skills that combines social management with self regulation and self compassion

describes the biological and psychological changes that occur during adolescence and examines social problems questions and adjustments that are part of the transition from childhood to adulthood

presenting a conception of adolescence and emerging adulthood from a cultural perspective this book includes a considerable amount of anthropology sociology and international research in addition to the usual psychological research done mostly in the united states it encourages readers to think critically about the studies presented enabling them to examine the subject in a cultural context topics include biological foundations cognitive functions cultural beliefs gender the self family friends and peers dating love and sexuality school work media problems and a 21st century look at adolescence and emerging adulthood for teachers sociologists psychologists and psychiatrists or anyone who works with those in the 10 25 age range

uses the latest research findings and influential theoretical viewpoints to convey what is known about adolescent development how the behavior of young people can best be understood and what the adolescence experience is like for teenagers and those around them features extensive individual examples and first person accounts of young adults special attention is paid to social and cultural aspects such as bicultural environments growing up in divorced or reconstituted families physical or sexual abuse homosexuality etc this edition contains expanded discussions of cognitive development and adolescence theories and a new chapter on social cognition
