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this volume uses the art of rome to help us understand the radical historical break between the fundamental ancient pre supposition that there is a natural world or cosmos situating human life and the equally fundamental modern emphasis on human imagination and its creative power rome s unique art history reveals a different side of the battle between ancients and moderns than that usually raised as an issue in the history of science and philosophy the book traces the idea of a cosmos in pre modern art in rome from the reception of greek art in the roman republic to the construction of the pantheon to early christian art and architecture it then sketches the disappearance of the presupposition of a cosmos in the high renaissance and baroque periods as creativity became a new ideal through discussions of the art and architecture that defines proto modern rome from michelangelo s *terribilita* in the sistine chapel caravaggio s realism baroque illusionism the infinities of borromini s architecture to the grand tour s representations of ruins through an interpretation of such major issues and works this book shows how modern art liberates us while leaving us feeling estranged from our grounding in the natural world the book will be of interest to scholars working in art history architectural history classics philosophy and early modern history and culture

today gained the most currency atrocity and early modern drama intervenes in the broad field of violence and early modern drama by placing acts of atrocity at its centre in doing so this essay collection offers the first book length examination of atrocities and early modern english drama the volume considers atrocity in early theatre its varied representations in contemporary shakespeare performance and strategies for teaching early modern atrocity drama contributors introduce us to atrocity in the works of shakespeare john fletcher william rowley thomas dekker and thomas middleton across a range of forms including comedy tragedy revenge cinematic adaptation documentary film and contemporary theatre the collection addresses the intersections of atrocities through class crime gender race and the natural world together the chapters interrogate how early modern english drama reflects upon and shapes understandings of the historically contingent politically loaded and culturally contentious phenomena of atrocity

This handbook re-examines the concept of early modern history in a European and global context. The term 'early modern' has been familiar, especially in Anglophone scholarship, for four decades and is securely established in teaching, research and scholarly publishing. More recently, however, the unity implied in the notion has fragmented while the usefulness and even the validity of the term and the historical periodisation which it incorporates have been questioned. The *Oxford Handbook of Early Modern European History, 1350–1750* provides an account of the development of the subject during the past half century but primarily offers an integrated and comprehensive survey of present knowledge together with some suggestions as to how the field is developing. It aims both to interrogate the notion of early modernity itself and to survey early modern Europe as an established field of study. The overriding aim will be to establish that early modern is not simply a chronological label but possesses a substantive integrity. Volume I examines peoples and places, assessing structural factors such as climate, printing and the revolution in information, social and economic developments and religion, including chapters on orthodoxy, Judaism and Islam.

for early modern europeans the past was a measure of most things good and bad for that reason it was also hotly contested manipulated and far too important to be left to historians alone memory in early modern europe offers a lively and accessible introduction to the many ways in which europeans engaged with the past and practised memory in the three centuries between 1500 and 1800 from childhood memories and local customs to war traumas and peacekeeping it analyses how europeans tried to control mobilize and reconfigure memories of the past challenging the long standing view that memory cultures transformed around 1800 it argues for the continued relevance of early modern memory practices in modern societies

kevin de ornellas argues that in renaissance england the relationship between horse and rider works as an unambiguous symbol of domination by the strong over the weak there was little sentimental concern for animal welfare leading to the routine abuse of the material animal this unproblematic practical exploitation of the horse led to the currency of the horse rider relationship as a trope or symbol of exploitation in the literature of the period engaging with

fiction plays poems and non fictional prose works of late tudor and early stuart england de ornellas demonstrates that the horse a bridled unwilling slave becomes a yardstick against which the oppression of england s poor women increasingly uninfluential clergyman and deluded gamblers is measured the status of the bitted harnessed horse was a low one in early modern england to be compared to such a beast is a demonstration of inferiority and subjugation to think anything else is to be naïve about the realities of horse management in the period and is to be naïve about the realities of the exploitation of horses and other mammals in the present day world

superstition and magic in early modern europe brings together a rich selection of essays which represent the most important historical research on religion magic and superstition in early modern europe each essay makes a significant contribution to the history of magic and religion in its own right while together they demonstrate how debates over the topic have evolved over time providing invaluable intellectual historical and socio political context for readers approaching the subject for the first time the essays are organised around five key themes and areas of controversy part one tackles superstition part two the tension between miracles and magic part three ghosts and apparitions part four witchcraft and witch trials and part five the gradual disintegration of the magical universe in the face of scientific religious and practical opposition each part is prefaced by an introduction that provides an outline of the historiography and engages with recent scholarship and debate setting the context for the essays that follow and providing a foundation for further study this collection is an invaluable toolkit for students of early modern europe providing both a focused overview and a springboard for broader thinking about the underlying continuities and discontinuities that make the study of magic and superstition a perennially fascinating topic
