auk and labrador duck very soon it will also be too late to collect walrus manatee fur seal prong horn antelope elk moose mountain sheep and mountain goat all along the atlantic coast and in florida the ducks are being exterminated for the metropolitan markets and the gulls terns herons egrets ibises and spoonbills are being slaughtered wholesale for the equally bloodthirsty goddess of fashion if the naturalist would gather representatives of all these forms for perpetual preservation and future study he must set about it at once this work is offered as my contribution to the science of zoology and the work of the museum builder it is entirely an affair of the heart and my only desire in regard to it is that it may be the means of materially increasing the world s store of well selected and well preserved examples of the beautiful and interesting animal forms that now inhabit the earth and its waters the sight of a particularly fine animal either viii alive or dead excites within me feelings of admiration that often amount to genuine affection and the study and preservation of such forms has for sixteen years been my chief delight
