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in May 1968 students occupied London's Hornsey College of Art in a dispute over student union funds. This relatively minor issue soon expanded into a broad critique of Britain's educational system. The one-day sit-in led to six weeks of intense debate over 70 policy

papers and a prolonged confrontation with the local authorities a special commission even conveyed the students demands to parliament hornsey 1968 draws on previously unpublished archival material to present a full account of this seminal event

this book proposes paragogic methods to re imagine the art academy while art schooling was revolutionised in the early 20th century by the bauhaus the author argues that many art schools are unwittingly recycling the same modernist pedagogical fashions stagnating in such traditions today s art schools are blind to recent advances in the scholarship of teaching and learning as discipline based education research in art eternally battles the perceived threat of epistemicide transformative educational practices are rapidly overcoming the perennialism of the art school the author develops critical case studies of open source and peer to peer methods for re imagining the art academy para academia and andragogy paragogy this innovative book will be of interest and value to students and scholars of the art school as well as how the art academy can be reimaged and rebuilt

winner of the american society for aesthetics 2019 outstanding monograph prize until now research on art schools has been largely occupied with the facts of particular schools and teachers this book presents a philosophical account of the underlying practices and ideas that have come to shape contemporary art school teaching in the uk us and europe it analyses two models that hidden beneath the diversity of contemporary artist training have come to dominate art schools the first of these is essentially an old approach a training guided by the artistic values of a single artist teacher the second dates from the 1960s and is based around the group crit in which diverse voices contribute to an artist s development understanding the underlying principles and possibilities of these two models which sit together in an uneasy tension gives new insights into the character of contemporary art school teaching demonstrating how art schools shape art and artists how they can be a potent engine of creativity in contemporary culture and how they contribute to artistic research a philosophy of the art school draws on first hand accounts

of art school teaching and is deeply informed by disciplines ranging from art history and art theory to the philosophy of art education and creativity

the art school has had a fundamental effect on society internationally influencing how the creative arts are represented and perceived at a time that funding in the uk is placing arts education in crisis this is the first book of its kind to investigate the concept of the art school and its social impact and legacy it highlights how the physical studios and workshops designed for learning teaching and making influence and interact with the curriculum creativity and practice beautifully illustrated with both archival and contemporary photographs many taken by the authors this book celebrates the spaces dedicated to learning and teaching creative disciplines exploring a drastically shifting landscape in higher education it celebrates the crucial relationship between the creative working spaces and the development of creative minds a timely reflection on the current social and political climate this book emphasises the significant role that the art school has to play in society developing thriving creative industries and a wider culture of the arts featured art schools include chelsea college of arts government college of art chandigarh the bauhaus escuelas nacionales de arte ena cuba manchester school of art

in this uniquely wide ranging book david craven investigates the extraordinary impact of three latin american revolutions on the visual arts and on cultural policy the three great upheavals in mexico 1910 40 in cuba 1959 89 and in nicaragua 1979 90 were defining moments in twentieth century life in the americas craven discusses the structural logic of each movement s artistic project by whom how and for whom artworks were produced and assesses their legacies in each case he demonstrates how the consequences of the revolution reverberated in the arts and cultures far beyond national borders the book not only examines specific artworks originating from each revolution s attempt to deal with the challenge of socializing the arts but also the engagement of the working classes in mexico cuba and nicaragua with a tradition of the fine arts made newly accessible through social transformation craven considers how each revolution dealt with the pressing problem of creating a dialogical art one that reconfigures the existing artistic resource rather than one that just reproduces a populist art to keep things as they were in addition the author charts the impact on the revolutionary processes of theories of art and education articulated by such thinkers as john dewey and paulo freire the book provides a fascinating new view of the latin american revolutionaries from artists to political leaders who defined art as a fundamental force for the transformation of society and who bequeathed new ways of thinking about the relations among art ideology and class within a revolutionary process
