a biography on the legendary gay american composer of contemporary classical music american composer lou harrison 1917 2003 is perhaps best known for challenging the traditional musical establishment along with his contemporaries and close colleagues composers john cage aaron copland virgil thomson and leonard bernstein living theater founder judith malina and choreographer merce cunningham today musicians from bang on a can to björk are indebted to the cultural hybrids harrison pioneered half a century ago his explorations of new tonalities at a time when the rest of the avant garde considered such interests heretical set the stage for minimalism and musical post modernism his propulsive rhythms and ground breaking use of percussion have inspired choreographers from merce cunningham to mark morris and he is considered the godfather of the so called world music phenomenon that has invigorated western music with global sounds over the past two decades in this biography authors bill alves and brett campbell trace harrison s life and career from the diverse streets of san francisco where he studied with music experimentalist henry cowell and austrian composer arnold schoenberg and where he discovered his love for all things non traditional beat poetry parties and men to the competitive performance industry in new york where he subsequently

launched his career as a composer conducted charles ives s third symphony at carnegie hall winning the elder composer a pulitzer prize and experienced a devastating mental breakdown to the experimental arts institution of black mountain college where he was involved in the first happenings with cage cunningham and others and finally back to california where he would become a strong voice in human rights and environmental campaigns and compose some of the most eclectic pieces of his career lou harrison s avuncular personality and tuneful music coaxed affectionate regard from all who knew him and that affection is evident on every page of alves and campbell s new biography eminently readable it puts harrison at the center of american music he knew everyone important and was in touch with everybody from mentors like henry cowell and arnold schoenberg and charles ives and harry partch and virgil thomson to peers like john cage to students like janice giteck and paul dresher he was larger than life in person and now he is larger than life in history as well kyle gann author of charles ives s concord essays after a sonata

integrating the psychology of love and creativity this pioneering book explores both how a couple s involvement as lovers influences their creative collaboration and how working together affects their relationship representing a variety of genres painting sculpture photography and installation art the celebrated couples profiled here include among others christo and jeanne claude elizabeth diller and ricardo scofidio and kristin jones and andrew ginzel intrigued by this process of intimate creativity psychologists irving and suzanne sarnoff themselves partners in love and work decided to conduct in depth interviews with partners in visual art because they defy the supremely individualistic tradition of their field whatever their age or sexual orientation these artist couples combine their talents to form a collective identity as a professional team passionately intense about their shared commitment they communicate endlessly to resolve conflicts and reach consensus providing mutual validation and support they increase their productivity and the quality of their work they minimize their fear and frustration and enhance their pleasure in being together the authors also draw on historical and contemporary literature about similar couples ranging from jean arp and sophie taeuber to gilbert and george to claes oldenburg and coosje van bruggen stimulating and engaging this book highlights the features of a unique collaborative process considers the connection between creativity and sexuality and suggests possibilities for any couple to expand their intimacy

lou harrison who celebrated his 80th birthday in 1997 has often been cited as one of the america's most original and influential composers in addition to his prolific musical output harrison is also a skilled painter calligrapher essayist critic poet and instrument builder during his long and varied career he has explored dance asian music tuning systems and universal languages and has actively championed political causes ranging from pacifism to gay rights as an articulate and outspoken observer of the contemporary musical scene he is frequently quoted in the media yet until now no comprehensive study of his life and works has been published the present book supported by extensive archival research and nearly 70 interviews examines the ideas that have shaped harrison's creative output as seen through the eyes of the composer and his associates a detailed biographical section is followed by individual chapters focusing on music and dance intonation and tuning instruments asian influences gamelan music and politics music criticism and compositional processes in a separate chapter the authors

describe the historical background of the san francisco gay community harrison s literary and musical statements on gay rights and possible gay markers on his musical style an annotated works list details over 300 compositions and a full length cd illustrates the text in sound including several unique and previously unrecorded works this engaging study of harrison s life and works will be indispensable to students and scholars of american music and to performing artists and programmers

viewed by many as hidden in the shadow cast by lennon and mccartney harrison s song writing nonetheless stands on its own merits as an impressive body of work originally planned as a celebration of harrison s music this is now sadly a commemoration too beatles fans the world over mourn the passing of the quiet beatle and this book is a fitting tribute to a revered musician 20 photos

over a period of twenty five years julius harrison 1885 1963 was admired as a conductor with beecham at covent garden with the scottish orchestra in glasgow and in the 1930s with the hastings municipal orchestra but he conducted of necessity to earn a living by inclination and calling he was a composer and there was always a conflict of interest between his twin professions when in his sixties increasing deafness brought an end to his conducting career he turned more and more to composition and in the years remaining to him produced a handful of works of a quality undreamed of in earlier years music can offer very few examples of composers coming to maturity so late harrison was such

a composer it is the author's belief that at least two of these late works the mass in c and the requiem are among the finest of their time that has prompted this first study of harrison's life and achievement

from 1952 to 1981 south africa's apartheid government ran an art school for the training of african art teachers at indaleni in what is today kwazulu natal the art of life in south africa is the story of the students teachers art and politics that circulated through a small school housed in a remote former mission station it is the story of a community that made its way through the travails of white supremacist south africa and demonstrates how the art students and teachers made together became the art of their lives daniel magaziner radically reframes apartheid era south african history against the dominant narrative of apartheid oppression and black resistance as well as recent scholarship that explores violence criminality and the hopeless entanglements of the apartheid state this book focuses instead on a small group's efforts to fashion more fulfilling lives for its members and their community through the ironic medium of the apartheid era school there is no book like this in south african historiography lushly illustrated and poetically written it gives us fully formed lives that offer remarkable insights into the now clichéd experience of black life under segregation and apartheid
