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feedback says to a student somebody cared enough about my work to read it and think about it most teachers want to be that somebody feedback matches specific descriptions and suggestions with a particular student s work it is just in time just for me information delivered when and where it can do the most good this book is intended to help teachers provide such feedback to students the focus is on feedback that comes from a teacher to a student and is based on student work in the context of the book the term feedback means teacher feedback on student schoolwork important as they are responses to student behavior are not considered here publisher s website

a teacher s feedback on student schoolwork can be a powerful force for learning if it contains a helpful message and is delivered with certain considerations in mind but what kind of content makes a feedback message helpful to a student and what kinds of strategies work best for delivering feedback in how to give effective feedback to your students susan m brookhart answers these questions by describing important elements of feedback content focus comparison function valence clarity specificity and tone and strategy timing amount mode and audience grounded in what researchers have learned about effective feedback the book provides practical suggestions and classroom examples that demonstrate what to do and not do to have a positive impact on students in addition to general guidelines for good feedback readers will learn what kinds of feedback work best in the various content areas and how to adjust feedback for different kinds of learners including successful students struggling students and english language learners done well feedback has a two pronged effect it influences cognitive factors by helping students understand where they are in their learning and where they need to go next and it influences motivational factors by helping students develop a feeling of control over their own learning taken together these factors explain why learning how to give good feedback should be at the top of every teacher s to do list

feedback skills are needed by all trainers and teachers in all areas this book focuses on the importance of giving correct and tactful feedback to learners during and at the end of individual sessions and courses the author considers how feedback and debriefing can be handled constructively with full awareness of how it might be received by the learners among the issues considered are what people can learn how they learn the difference between feedback and debriefing and how to handle confidentiality the different requirements from trainers when giving feedback in a variety of situations one to one coaching sessions group training exercises are

underlined the author covers feedback from the points of view of all those concerned

whatever level you occupy in an organization from line manager to senior executive to team leader the skill of giving meaningful and effective feedback is an important component to helping other people develop and to getting the job done creating and delivering a specific message based on observed performance is key to effective feedback your feedback should enable the receiver to walk away understanding exactly what he or she did and what impact it had on you when the result is this specific and this direct there is a better chance that the person getting the feedback will be motivated to begin continue or stop behaviors that affect performance this guidebook explains how to deliver effective feedback by showing how to build your message when to deliver it and how to communicate it by using the methods and examples in this guidebook your feedback becomes a tool for development for others and for yourself

when viewing corrected assessments students often are most concerned with the grade they received rather than the comments provided to make improvements on their work this project focused on the type of feedback students viewed and the ways they used the feedback to improve their performance this project utilized the elearning site brainhoney to provide students in a high school advanced math course two forms of feedback following each assessment one form gave affirmation of good work students could view no feedback one form of feedback or both forms of feedback brainhoney logged the number of views and the total duration of views for each student at the beginning of the project students completed a survey to provide information about how they prepared for

assessments and how they determined the materials that are beneficial to study students tended to utilize classroom notes previous assignments and review packets when preparing for assessments at the end of the project students completed a survey giving information on how they utilized the feedback and how the feedback could be improved to increase performance the study was unable to clearly explain how students utilized the feedback and resources to prepare for assessments ultimately the results indicated those who viewed feedback showed significantly greater growth in their performance from unit quizzes to unit tests than those who did not view any feedback

adults who return to higher education after a number of years away enter the classroom with rich workplace and life experience they may wish to complete an undergraduate degree to advance professionally or desire an advanced degree to enhance their skills and expand career options they have numerous and often conflicting demands on their time energy and attention they may be apprehensive at the accelerated pace of classes and the advances in technology since they last attended school the purpose of the study was to investigate the nature of effective feedback to adult students the study was guided by a research question and two sub questions what is the nature of effective feedback to adult students what are students perceptions of the challenges and benefits related to understanding accepting and applying instructor feedback what are instructors perceptions of the challenges and benefits related to creating and delivering effective feedback to students the research design was a qualitative phenomenological case study at a single mid size faith based university it was supported by a theoretical framework of adult learning theory and feedback theory data collection involved semi structured interviews of 10 faculty members and focus group interviews of 38 adult students data were analyzed in a qualitative process that included the use of qsr s nvivo10 software supplemented with manual coding research findings identified challenges that both students and instructors face in the feedback process the findings suggest that benefits from effective feedback center on enhanced learning improved communication and personal growth a gap in preparing adult students to accept and use instructor feedback was identified implications for faculty include preparing students for feedback and providing individualized feedback that focus on future improvements implications for adult students include identifying needs and creating action plans to implement feedback implications for institutions include providing the technology training and support needed for effective feedback the results indicated that an improved feedback process could lead to deeper learning enhanced reputations for programs and the institution and the possibility of attracting additional students

feedback lets employees know how well they're doing at meeting goals and expectations used well it creates a supportive environment motivates people helps to maintain or improve performance and provides people with insight into how others see them and their work you use positive feedback to reinforce support or encourage positive behavior you use corrective feedback to help employees improve to give this feedback specify what's wrong keep it relevant and be supportive to give effective feedback directly observe the person's behavior without hovering or making judgments until you're certain of the facts and determine whether positive or corrective feedback is required aim to give feedback in private or to tailor it for a group so that no one will be embarrassed also give feedback as soon as possible after the behavior when providing feedback be specific about the behavior explain its impact and state what the person should do next to maintain improve or change behavior when giving corrective feedback start with a positive then specify what's wrong that needs correcting and end on a positive note with an eye to the future constructive criticism is considerate of recipients feelings and contributes to their development by pointing out errors or inefficiencies it can open lines of communication and foster a cooperative culture in the workplace resulting in better problem solving conversely destructive criticism can adversely affect workplace performance and communication causing low self esteem and feelings of inadequacy in recipients to provide criticism that's constructive you should follow three steps first observe the individual's behavior directly and record examples then review any assumptions you've made to ensure you're being objective and prepare what you plan to say finally meet the individual in private and give the criticism constructively to do this start with a positive be specific about the behavior that needs to change remain calm and respect the recipient's feelings and end with a positive
