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decolonization and anti colonial praxis presents research on contemporary forms of decolonization and anti colonialism in practice it pertains to the ways in which individuals groups and communities engage with the logic of epistemic colonial power within areas of citizenship migration education indigeneity language land struggle and social work the contributions in this edited volume empirically document the conceptual and bodily engagement of racialized and violated individuals and communities as they use anti colonial principles to disrupt criminalizing institutional discourses and policies within various global imperial contexts the terms decolonization and anti colonialism are used in diverse and interdisciplinary academic perspectives they are researched upon and elaborated in necessary ways in the theoretical literature however it is rare to see these principles employed in applied forms decolonization and anti colonial praxis provides a much needed contemporary and representative reclamation of these concepts from the standpoint of racialized communities it explores the frameworks and methods rooted in their indigeneity cultural history and memories to imagine a new future the research findings and methodological tools presented in this book will be of interdisciplinary interest to teachers graduate students and researchers contributors are harriet akanmori ayah al oballi sevgi arslan jacqueline benn john lucy el sherif danielle freitas pablo isla monsalve dionisio nyaga hoda samater rose ann torres umar umangay and anila zainub

introducing the central theoretical issues as well as key personalities this book traces the origins growth and diffusion of the subject essential to all those attempting to understand the state of cultural studies today

in singapore a family are tested by the onset of the second world war the long journey home is an unforgettable saga from wendy robertson of friendship love and sacrifice during the second world war perfect for fans of harry bowling and dilly court a spellbinding story you ll find it hard to put down sunderland echo for ten year old sylvie sambuck singapore seems a long way from the fighting of the second world war however the advancing japanese army soon leads to a mass evacuation of the island but as sylvie s family begins to board their ship there is no sign of sylvie somehow in the confusion sylvie finds refuge with her governess virginia chen but neither virginia nor her family believe they will escape the japanese internment camps where virginia may have to pay the ultimate price for sylvie s survival what readers are saying about the long journey home a superbly written book this is the first book i ve read in ages that made me want to go to bed early so i could read it in peace and go to sleep late as i didn t want to put it down five stars

f r leavis was the chief editor of scrutiny which between 1932 and 1953 had some claim on being the most influential literary journal in the english speaking world the common pursuit is a selection of leavis s essays from scrutiny including his robust defence of milton against t s eliot his deeply felt engagement with shakespeare and his severe strictures on attempts to import sociology and political activism into the study of literature the title of the book comes from a passage in eliot s the function of criticism in which the poet argues that the critic must engage in the common pursuit of true judgment for leavis this meant a strenuous insistence on discriminatory criticism clear statements about what is good and morally mature and admirable and equally clear condemnation of what is trivial the common pursuit with its controversial judgments of bunyan and auden swift and forster remains as challenging now as it did in 1952 and it is easy to see why leavis who was never offered a professorship by cambridge university held such sway over the study of english literature in his time

because of its focus on mutual understanding the language classroom is uniquely situated to discuss and enact ideas about social justice this book brings together authors from different geographical and professional contexts united by a common goal to bring about a change in language teacher education and language classrooms the chapters represent the perspectives of authors at a range of stages in their careers together they take the reader on a journey from conceptual dilemmas and their place in applied

linguistics through specific critical issues which are positioned within the theoretical landscape surrounding social justice to projects with clear pedagogical implications the book represents a much needed step in broadening the conversation about social justice in and through language education and will be of interest to language teachers and researchers as well as students of applied linguistics

called an oracle and sage the involuntary founder of an unofficial cult marshall mcluhan 1911 80 was one of the most famous men of the 1960s from whose name a french word mcluhanisme was coined his reputation as a communications theorist was established by two of many books the gutenberg galaxy the making of typographic man 1962 explains how society and human psychology were changed when pre literate oral culture was supplanted by the invention of the phonetic alphabet and a manuscript culture gave way to the gutenberg era of movable type the printing press and mass produced books understanding media the extensions of man 1964 mcluhan's most widely read book explores the next development the electronic age and its effects on individuals and society the early letters in this collection offer a fascinating background to mcluhan's intellectual growth the bulk of them however contain many interesting discussions of ideas that later became subjects in his books his correspondents include some of the best known names of the sixties and seventies and range from woody allen to tom wolfe heavily annotated the letters are arranged in three sections each with a period introduction 1931 1936 takes mcluhan through the university of manitoba and cambridge university 1936 1946 covers one year's teaching at the university of wisconsin two years at saint louis university one year with his bride at cambridge for work on his ph d four more years at saint louis and two years as assumption college windsor ontario these letters include a large correspondence with wyndham lewis the last section begins in 1946 when mcluhan went to the university of toronto two years later he began a long correspondence with ezra pound covering the period of mcluhan's fame it ends in september 1979 with a letter to pierre elliot Trudeau written shortly before mcluhan had a stroke that rendered him speechless these letters have been selected from a large collection now in the public archives of canada assembled by corinne mcluhan mcluhan's widow and matie molinaro his literary agent

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
