mental health and substance use disorders affect approximately 20 percent of americans and are associated with significant morbidity and

mortality although a wide range of evidence based psychosocial interventions are currently in use most consumers of mental health care find it difficult to know whether they are receiving high quality care although the current evidence base for the effects of psychosocial interventions is sizable subsequent steps in the process of bringing a psychosocial intervention into routine clinical care are less well defined psychosocial interventions for mental and substance use disorders details the reasons for the gap between what is known to be effective and current practice and offers recommendations for how best to address this gap by applying a framework that can be used to establish standards for psychosocial interventions the framework described in psychosocial interventions for mental and substance use disorders can be used to chart a path toward the ultimate goal of improving the outcomes the framework highlights the need to 1 support research to strengthen the evidence base on the efficacy and effectiveness of psychosocial interventions 2 based on this evidence identify the key elements that drive an intervention's effect 3 conduct systematic reviews to inform clinical guidelines that incorporate these key elements 4 using the findings of these systematic reviews develop quality measures measures of the structure process and outcomes of interventions and 5 establish methods for successfully implementing and sustaining these interventions in regular practice including the training of providers of these interventions the recommendations offered in this report are intended to assist policy makers health care organizations and payers that are organizing and overseeing the provision of care for mental health and substance use disorders while navigating a new health care landscape the recommendations also target providers professional societies funding agencies consumers and researchers all of whom have a stake in ensuring that evidence based high quality care is provided to individuals receiving mental health and substance use services

millions of children adolescents and adults worldwide experience significant mental health problems for which they receive no treatment whatsoever despite decades of world class innovative treatment research growing governmental and public attention to mental health issues and decreasing stigma around seeking care the supply of tools and resources available to combat the burdens of mental illness globally are vastly outweighed by demand for services innovations in psychosocial interventions and their delivery provides an integrated and detailed overview of advances challenges and necessary new directions with regard to evidence based psychological interventions drawing on diverse fields such as public health business entertainment social policy and law and other domains that may inform efforts to deliver interventions more effectively alan kazdin explores an assortment of novel and inventive ways to address the world's mental health crisis focusing attention on promising scientific developments and the special challenges that emerge in evaluating and delivering such interventions the book examines opportunities such as trans diagnostic treatments inventive uses of technology complementary approaches novel methods of dissemination such as task shifting and more the first to bring together such diverse perspectives in an effort to show precisely and practically how treatments could be delivered effectively and in a scalable manner innovations in psychosocial interventions and their delivery has direct and immediate implications for health care systems but also for research and clinical practice in the mental health professions it will be of keen interest to those

despite the steady acceptance of psychological interventions for people with psychosis in routine practice many people continue to experience problems in their recovery the need to develop new approaches particularly for those who are more difficult to engage and have significant co morbidities is therefore important innovations in psychosocial interventions for psychosis positions psychological formulation as a key organising principle for the delivery of care within multidisciplinary teams the interventions described all have the common theme of supporting recovery and achieving goals that are of primary importance to the service user which targets interventions on broader obstacles to recovery along with their experienced contributors alan meaden and andrew fox introduce new developments in psychological interventions for people affected by psychosis who are hard to reach working in a variety of settings with people at various stages of recovery the book is divided into three parts in part one brief interventions and approaches aimed at promoting engagement are described as interventions in their own right part two is focused on longer term interventions with individuals some of these highlight new developments in the evidence base whilst others draw on work applied less frequently to psychosis drawing from the broader psychological therapy practice based evidence field in part three attention is given to innovations in group settings and those aimed at promoting greater multidisciplinary working in settings where a whole team approach is needed each chapter describes the theory underpinning a different approach its development key strategies principles and stages and contain case examples that illustrate the use of the approach in a clinical setting innovations in psychosocial interventions for psychosis will be an invaluable resource to professionals working with this client group including clinical and counselling psychologists psychiatrists and other allied health professionals

abstract of thesis entitled psychophysiological effects of psychosocial interventions an example of breast cancer patients in hong kong submitted by ho tin hung rainbow for the degree of doctor of philosophy at the university of hong kong in january 2005 bringing physiology into psychosocial intervention outcome studies in psycho oncology has been drawing increasing attention in recent years as it provides an integrative perspective for investigating the mediators of cancer progression following this direction the present study adopted a longitudinal randomized controlled design to investigate the psychophysiological outcomes of different psychosocial interventions for breast cancer patients seventy six breast cancer patients in hong kong were recruited and randomly assigned into groups that received three different intervention approaches namely body mind spirit bms supportive expressive se and social support self help ss approaches a no intervention group was used as control psychological and physiological data were collected at baseline 4 months and 8 months outcome measures included the general health questionnaires perceived stress scale hospital anxiety and depression scale emotional control scale minimac and yale social support index salivary cortisol was used as the physiological stress markers overall results indicated that the bms intervention produced the greatest and the most sustained effects it reduced psychological distress  $p < 0.01$  and enhanced positive social support after 4 months  $p < 0.02$  emotional control  $p < 0.02$  and negative mental adjustment  $p < 0.04$  were reduced after 8 months total salivary cortisol was lowered after 8 months  $p < 0.03$  salivary cortisol concentration was lowered after 4 months  $p < 0.03$  and 8 months  $p < 0.02$  besides feeling supported participant reported that bms intervention equipped them with sustainable knowledge and insights for meaning reconstruction from their cancer experience participants in se groups showed improvements in psychological distress emotional control and mental adjustment but the changes were not statistically significant most subjects viewed the se treatment as helpful in particular professional advice was viewed as useful and self hypnosis was regarded as effective in reducing stress overall participants in the ss groups seemed less likely to benefit from the intervention negative mental adjustment increased after 4 months  $p < 0.004$  only half of subjects evaluated the group as effective five 31 of them stated that they derived no benefit at all from participation the no intervention control group indicated a reduction in social support network size after 4 month  $p < 0.04$  and 8 months  $p < 0.01$  and reduced positive support after 8 months  $p < 0.04$  these outcomes suggest that social gathering may not be sufficient to produce psychophysiological improvement active professional intervention providing a supporting context encouraging expression providing relevant information and teaching stress management techniques are more likely to yield therapeutic effects in particular attending to the spiritual dimension which has been largely ignored in psychosocial interventions contributes to positive outcomes also for cancer patients failure to receive psychosocial intervention may result in redu
