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in the light of recent waves of mass immigration non professional interpreting and translation npit is spreading at an unprecedented pace while as recently as the late 20th century much of the field was a largely uncharted territory the current proportions of npit suggest that the phenomenon is here to stay and needs to be studied with all due academic rigour this collection of essays is the first systematic attempt at looking at npit in a scholarly and at the same time pragmatic way offering multiple methods and perspectives and covering the diverse contexts in which npit takes place the volume is a welcome turn in an all too often polarized debate in both academic and practitioner circles

this special issue of the translator explores the field with a view to learning from the individuals and networks who take on such non professional translation and interpreting activities it showcases the work of researchers who look into the phenomenon within a wide variety of settings from museums to churches crowdsourcing and media sites to wikipedia and scientific journals to the social forum drawing on a wide range of disciplines and models the contributions to this volume enhance the visibility of non professionals engaged in translating and interpreting and challenge a range of widely held assumptions within the discipline and the profession

in this landmark project moratto and zhang evaluate how conference interpreting developed as a profession in china and the directions in which it is heading bringing together perspectives from leading researchers in the field moratto and zhang present a thematically organized analysis of the trajectory of professional conference interpreting in china this includes discussion of the pedagogies used both currently and historically the professionalization of interpreter education and future prospects for virtual reality multimodal conferences and artificial intelligence taken as a whole the contributors present a rich and detailed picture of the development of conference interpreting in china since 1979 its status today and how it is likely to develop in the coming decades an essential resource for scholars and students of conference interpreting in china alongside its sister volume the pioneers of chinese interpreting insiders accounts on the rise of a profession

this significant new study is concerned with the role of interpreting in nazi concentration camps where prisoners were of 30 to 40 different nationalities with german as the only official language in the lager communication was vital to the prisoners survival while in the last few decades there has been extensive research on the language used by the camp inmates investigation into the mediating role of interpreters between ss guards and prisoners on the one hand and among inmates on the other has been almost nonexistent on the basis of primo levi s considerations on communication in the nazi concentrationary system this book investigates the ambivalent role of interpreting in the camps one of the central questions is what the role of interpreting was in the wider context of shaping life in concentration camps and in what way did the knowledge of languages and accordingly certain communication skills contribute to the survival of concentration camp inmates and of the interpreting person the main sources under investigation are both archive materials and survivors memoirs and testimonials in various languages on a different level interpreting in nazi concentration camps also asks in what way the study of communication in concentration

camps enhances our understanding of the ambiguous role of interpreting in more general terms and in what way does the study of interpreting in concentration camps shape an interpreting concept which can help us to better understand the violent nature of interpreting in contexts other than the holocaust

this book is a comprehensive exploration of the practice and research relating to sign language interpreting the reader is taken on a journey from the early days of interpreting to the professionalization of interpreters to an examination of past and present modes of interpreting two models are introduced that take into account the influence of all participants and environmental factors in a variety of interpreting situations

examines what it means to be a responsible professional including the sorts of things thoughtful conscientious people ought to perceive and care about

this monograph examines how higher education institutions construct professional identities in the classroom specifically how dominant discourses in institutions frame the social role requisite skills and character required to practice a profession and how students navigate these along their academic trajectories this book is based on a longitudinal case study of a prestigious institution specialising in training professional interpreters adopting an innovative research approach it investigates a community of aspiring professionals in the context by drawing on small story narrative analysis from an ethnographic perspective to provide emic insights into the student community and the development of their social identities the findings contextualised by examining the curricula of similar institutions worldwide suggest that interpreter institutions might not be providing students with a clear and comprehensive picture of the interpreter profession and not responding

to its increasingly complex role in today's society

over 22 000 deaf and hard of hearing students are currently enrolled in local school programs where their access to the language of learning is dependent on an interpreter as a discipline educational interpreting has developed quickly without precedent the need for a practical guide to the many issues and practices required to provide optimum access is finally met with this book this book is a comprehensive overview of the process of interpreting in educational settings readers will understand the changing needs of the hearing impaired person as s he moves from primary school through college it is applicable to interpreters who use sign language cued speech and oral interpreting an excellent resource for anyone working with deaf and hearing impaired students including interpreters regular teachers parents speech language pathologists and deaf educators a longwood professional book

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
