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this book considers the historical and cultural origins of the gut brain relationship now evidenced in numerous scientific research fields bringing together eleven scholars with wide interdisciplinary expertise the volume examines literal and metaphorical digestion in different spheres of nineteenth century life digestive health is examined in three sections in relation to science politics and literature during the period focusing on northern america europe and australia using diverse methodologies the essays demonstrate that the long nineteenth century was an important moment in the western understanding and perception of the gastroenterological system and its relation to the mind in the sense of cognition mental wellbeing and the emotions this collection explores how medical breakthroughs are often historically preceded by intuitive models imagined throughout a range of cultural productions

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by the early 1830s the old school of gothic literature was exhausted late romanticism emphasising as it did the uncertainties of personality and imagination gave it a new lease of life gothic the literature of disturbance and uncertainty now produced works that reflected domestic fears sexual crimes drug filled hallucinations the terrible secrets of middle class marriage imperial horror at alien invasion occult demonism and the insanity of psychopaths it was from the 1830s onwards that the old gothic castle gave way to the country house drawing room the dungeon was displaced by the sewers of the city and the villains of early novels became the familiar figures of dr jekyll and mr hyde dracula dorian grey and jack the ripper after the death of prince albert 1861 the gothic became darker more morbid obsessed with demonic lovers blood sucking ghouls blood stained murderers and deranged doctors whilst the gothic architecture of the houses of parliament and the new puginesque churches upheld a victorian ideal of sobriety

christianity and imperial destiny gothic literature filed these new spaces with a dread that spread like a plague to america france germany and even russia from 1830 to 1914 the period covered by this volume we saw the emergence of the greats of gothic literature and the supernatural from edgar allan poe to emily bronte from sheridan le fanu to bram stoker and robert louis stevenson contributors also examine the fin de siècle dreamers of decadence such as arthur machen m p shiel and vernon lee and their obsession with the occult folklore spiritualism revenants ghostly apparitions and cosmic annihilation this volume explores the period through the prism of architectural history urban studies feminism hauntology and much more horror as poe teaches us is the soul of the plot

focusing on women s writing of the last two centuries scenes of the apple traces the intricate relationship between food and body image for women ranging over a variety of genres including novels culinary memoirs and essays the contributors explore works by a diverse group of writers including mary elizabeth braddon toni morrison tsitsi dangarembga and jeanette winterson as well as such nonliterary documents as discussions of queen victoria s appetite and news coverage of suffragettes hunger strikes moreover in addressing works by hispanic african african american jewish and lesbian writers the book explodes the myth that only white privileged and heterosexual women are concerned with body image and shows the many cultural contexts in which food and cooking are important in women s literature above all the essays pay tribute to the rich and multiple meanings of food in women s writing as a symbol for all kinds of delightful and transgressive desires
