one of the best political biographies i have ever read dominic sandbrook sunday times not for turning is the first volume of charles moore s authorized biography of margaret thatcher the longest serving prime minister of the twentieth century and one of the most influential political figures of the postwar era charles moore s biography of margaret thatcher published after her death on 8 april 2013 immediately supercedes all earlier books written about her at the moment when she becomes a historical figure this book also makes her into a three dimensional one for the first time it gives unparalleled insight into her early life and formation especially through her extensive correspondence with her sister which moore is the first author to draw on it recreates brilliantly the atmosphere of british politics as she was making her way and takes her up to what was arguably the zenith of her power victory in the falklands this volume ends with the falklands dinner in downing street in november 1982 moore is clearly an admirer of his subject but he does not shy away from criticising her or identifying weaknesses and mistakes where he feels it is justified based on unrestricted access to all lady thatcher s papers unpublished interviews with her and all her major colleagues this is the indispensable fully rounded portrait of a towering figure of our times

this text examines current social and political issues involving childhood it looks at the impact of the new right who talk of family values parent power in schools irresponsible provision of contraception to young girls and the increase in child violence as a result of mass media

this book situates the controversial thatcher era in the political social cultural and economic history of modern britain

she reveals how conviction style politicians have appeared in the u s and u k at the same time individuals who articulated similar ideas that adapted liberal ideology to shifting circumstances and who achieved fundamental change at critical moments in their nations histories

a collection of papers written by distinguished academics and journalists this study examines the effect of margaret thatcher s administration since 1979 the dominant force in british politics on such areas as the arts the media the civil service the economy the military trade unions local government the churches education the law and more each essay discusses the principal changes that

have occurred since 1979 the role of the thatcher government in promoting these changes and the extent to which change would have occurred regardless of the government in power

during the eleven years of margaret thatchers premiership education in england was transformed by her determination to reorganise the state sector along public school lines and in doing so to remove local councils from the key role they had always played in the national system throughout this time donald naismith was the director of education for three of them where he frequently came in lord dennings words very near the line in pursuing policies central to mrs thatchers revolution but opposed by both the right as well as the left wings of the education establishment in this description of the impact of mrs thatchers policies on local government he draws attention to the extent to which she unwillingly depended on local councils themselves to provide the practical means of putting her reforms into effect among them richmonds league tables croydons national curriculum and standardised testing and wandsworths specialist schools donald naismith argues that margaret thatchers reforms would have made more headway had she enlisted the cooperation of local councils instead of fatally weakening them and predicts that a new more powerful version of local government will paradoxically need to be invented if her education market strategy now gathering momentum is to succeed

the thatcher era was the most dramatic period in british politics since the 1940s the keynesian order established then was falling apart thirty years later and the time had come for radical change as conservative prime minister margaret thatcher proved to be the iron lady at home and abroad trade union power was crushed as her governments strove to bring about an economic renaissance and to reshape the welfare state the civil service and local government this book analyses the politics of the thatcher era in an incisive and challenging manner

nunn opens up a space for thinking in new ways about the relationship between the categories of woman and nation of political power and violence she explores the role of particular forms of femininity and masculinity in securing imaginary constructions of political leadership and national identity in which fantasies of mastery and invasion come to the fore

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
