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barrymore laurence scherer a distinguished american author leads the reader through an enthralling history illustrating the importance of not only renowned names such as gershwin copland bernstein joplin and sousa but also those formally in the shadows such as william henry fry and alan hovhaness and of course we even step into broadway for that most american step child of opera the musical this development tracked largely by key composers is set against america s tempestuous history putting neatly into context the achievements of the time and with the words come 2 cds of carefully chosen music to provide a uniquely rounded representation of this field furthermore the purchaser of the book is given access to a dedicated website which offers even more music to listen to as well as other bonus material

building on the strengths of the first edition the second edition of latin american classical composers a biographical dictionary presents expanded and updated coverage of its topic with an aim to be comprehensive the authors have conducted exhaustive research to fill in gaps and correct minor errors in the first edition adding young composers and documenting deaths since 1996 when the first edition appeared hundreds of composers are represented in this volume which presents biographical data including dates of birth and death personal information about composers background and training and a selective listing of each composer s works sources for further study are noted within each entry an index of composers by country rounds out this work

offers the reader a fascinating portrait of american serious music though most of the story takes place in the 20th century it begins in 1562 examines all the influences that shaped the american music tradition these include 18th 19th century east coast genteel musical traditions scottish irish folk music north american indian music west african music brought over adapted by slaves balladry creole gulf coast music popular music also includes a foreword by composer philip glass over 50 photographs a chronology a list of basic repertoire an extensive bibliography

most studies of 1960s jazz underscore the sounds of famous avant garde musicians like John Coltrane, Ornette Coleman and Albert Ayler. Conspicuously absent from these narratives are the more popular jazz artists of the decade that electrified dance clubs, permeated radio waves and released top selling records. Names like Eddie Harris, Nancy Wilson, Ramsey Lewis and Jimmy Smith are largely neglected in most serious work today. Mike Smith rectifies this oversight and explores why critical writings have generally cast off best selling 1960s jazz as unworthy of in depth analysis and reverent documentation. The 1960s were a time of monumental political and social shifts. Avant garde jazz made by musicians indifferent to public perception aligns well with widely held images of the era. In with the in crowd popular jazz in 1960s Black America argues that this dominant and unfortunately distorted view negates and ignores a vibrant jazz community. These musicians and their listeners created a music defined by socialization, celebration and Black pride. Smith tells the joyful story of the musicians, the radio DJs, the record labels and the live venues where jazz not only survived but thrived in the 1960s. This was the music of everyday people who viewed jazz as an important part of their cultural identity. As Black Americans in an era marked by turmoil and struggle, popular jazz offered a powerful outlet for joy, resilience, pride and triumph.

The Crisis of Classical Music in America by Robert Freeman focuses on solutions for the oversupply of classically trained musicians in America. a juilliard trained musician and professor of history explores the fascinating entanglement of classical music with american foreign relations dangerous melodies vividly evokes a time when classical music stood at the center of twentieth century american life occupying a prominent place in the nation s culture and politics the work of renowned conductors instrumentalists and singers and the activities of orchestras and opera companies were intertwined with momentous international events especially the two world wars and the long cold war jonathan rosenberg exposes the politics behind classical music showing how german musicians were dismissed or imprisoned during world war i while numerous german compositions were swept from american auditoriums he writes of the accompanying impassioned protests some of which verged on riots by soldiers and ordinary citizens yet during world war ii those same compositions were no longer part of the political discussion while russian music especially shostakovich s was used as a tool to strengthen the us soviet alliance during the cold war accusations of communism were leveled against members of the american music community while the state department sent symphony orchestras to play around the world even performing behind the iron curtain rich with a stunning array of composers and musicians including karl muck arturo toscanini wilhelm furtwängler kirsten flagstad aaron copland van cliburn and leonard bernstein dangerous melodies delves into the volatile intersection of classical music and world politics to reveal a tumultuous history of twentieth century america

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
