documents included here demonstrate that african americans have long been an integral part of catholic history in america from the spanish and french periods of the pre revolutionary south continuing through the civil war and the 20th century struggles against racism offers hope for all catholics as they search to realize a communion that embraces members of all races and cultures as equals

an engaging study of black catholics their contributions to the catholic church and the challenges they face these essays describe the experience of black catholics in this country since their arrival in north america in the sixteenth century until the present day the essays highlight the difficulties black catholics faced in their early attempts to join churches and enter religious communities their participation in the civil rights struggle and the challenges they face today as they seek full inclusion in the church whether in terms of liturgical practice or pastoral ministry

this volume explores the experiences of african americans in catholic schools through historical and sociological analysis as well as personal memoirs and reflections of former students it challenges the theory that they are marginalised existing in constant opposition to the dominant culture

a unique study of how the bible constructs african americans and how african americans construct the bible from literature and the arts to popular culture and everyday life the bible courses through black society and culture despite the enormous recent surge of interest in african american religion scant attention has been paid to the diversity of ways in which african americans have utilized the bible african americans and the bible is the fruit of a four year collaborative research project directed by vincent l wimbush and funded by the lilly endowment it brings together scholars and experts sixty eight in all from a wide range of academic and artistic fields and disciplines including ethnography cultural history and biblical studies and also music film dance drama and literature the book is less about the meaning s of the bible than about the bible and meaning s less about the

worlds of the bible than about how worlds and the bible interact in short about how a text constructs a people and a people construct a text it is about a particular socio cultural formation but also about the dynamics that occur in the interrelation between any group of people and sacred texts in general african americans and the bible offers a critical lens through which the process of socio cultural formation can be viewed

tracing the development of social reform movements among american catholics from 1880 to 1925 deirdre moloney reveals how catholic gender ideologies emerging middle class values and ethnic identities shaped the goals and activities of lay activists rather than simply appropriate american reform models ethnic catholics particularly irish and german catholics drew extensively on european traditions as they worked to establish settlement houses promote temperance and aid immigrants and the poor catholics also differed significantly from their protestant counterparts in defining which reform efforts were appropriate for women for example while women played a major role in the protestant temperance movement beginning in the mid nineteenth century catholic temperance remained primarily a male movement in america gradually however women began to carve out a significant role in catholic charitable and reform efforts the first work to highlight the wide ranging contributions of the catholic laity to progressive era reform the book shows how lay groups competed with protestant reformers and at times even challenged members of the catholic hierarchy it also explores the tension that existed between the desire to demonstrate the compatibility of catholicism with american values and the wish to preserve the distinctiveness of catholic life

the present book fits within the long history of african american catholic attempts e g the nineteenth century african american catholic congresses and the twentieth century federation of colored catholics to address the issue of education for african american catholics this book is part of an already established tradition of criticism and creative reform this time within catholic higher education

preceded by three introductory essays and a chronology of major events in black religious history from 1618 to 1991 this a z encyclopedia includes three types of entries biographical sketches of 773 african american religious leaders 341 entries on african american denominations and religious organizations including white churches with significant black memberships and educational institutions topical articles on important aspects of african american religious life e g african american christians during the colonial era music in the african american church

with information on over 500 organizations their founders and membership this unique encyclopedia is an invaluable resource on the history of african american activism entries on both historical and contemporary organizations include african aid society african americans forhumanism black academy of arts and letters blackwomen s liberation committee minority women in science national association of black geologists andgeophysicists national dental association nationalmedical association negro railway labor executivescommittee pennsylvania freedmen s relief association women s missionary society african methodist episcopalchurch and many more

since the early days of the republic washington has nurtured an increasingly prosperous and articulate community of black catholics for much of that time the spiritual welfare of these citizens as well as their material aspirations centered on st augustine s parish from the days of civil war through the decades when jim crow ruled washington to recent times and new challenges for the inner city black catholics from all over the area have worshipped regularly at st augustine s popularly called the mother church of black catholics it provides a beacon of hope for its parishioners and its history offers a unique lens through which to view the emergence of an important washington community morris j macgregor traces the history of st augustine s from its beginning as a modest chapel and school to its recent years as one of the city s most imposing and active churches for more than a century the congregation has counted among its members many of the intellectual and social elite of black society as well as impoverished newcomers struggling with the perils of urban life this socially diverse membership enhanced by a constant stream of visitors of all races and classes drawn by the beauty of the church and the artistry of its musicians has made st augustine s an exemplar of christian brotherhood the book presents in considerable detail the history of race relations in church

and state since the founding of the federal city parish lay leaders have long been crusaders in the fight for racial justice they have played important roles in the congress of colored catholics the federation of colored catholics the catholic interracial council and the naacp macgregor discusses these groups as well as more recent urban institutions such as the vibrant 14th and u streets coalition because music has played an essential role at st augustine s a sizable appendix is devoted to its history in the parish the religious racial and social insights uncovered in this fascinating history make it a valuable resource for the study of american social and church history about the author morris j macgregor is the author of several books including a parish for the federal city st patrick s in washington 1794 1994 and integration of the armed forces 1940 1965 praise for the book morris macgregor s history of st augustine s parish in the nation s capital is much more than a conventional history of a catholic parish and its people macgregor s history thoroughly researched and carefully documented recounts the history of a black catholic community from the eve of the civil war to the present day placing this parish within the context of the history of washington d c and most particularly within the context of the african american community the author masterfully demonstrates how this unique black parish one of the oldest in the nation played a pivotal role in the social and religious history of the district of columbia cyprian davis o s b saint meinrad archabbey this is how parish history should be written with an eye to the big picture in this substantial volume morris j macgregor drawing on rich archival sources newspapers and oral interviews gracefully recounts the story of st augustine s parish the mother church of black catholics in the nation s capital and historically one of the most prominent black congregations in the city catholic historical review morris macgregor has finally done it he has produced the most comprehensive treatment of a catholic parish that we have seen st augustine s church is not just another african american catholic parish it is the mother church of black catholics in washington catholic standard

let it shine probes the distinctive contribution of black catholics to the life of the american church and to the unfolding of lived christianity in the united states this important book explores the powerful spiritual renaissance that has marked african american life and selfunderstanding over the last several decades by examining one critical dimension the forging of new expressions of catholic worship rooted in the larger catholic tradition yet shaped in unique ways by african american religious culture starting

with the 1960s the book traces the dynamic interplay of social change cultural awakening and charismatic leadership that have sparked the emergence of distinctive styles of black catholic worship in their historical overview mcgann and eva marie lumas chronicle the liturgical and pastoral issues of a black catholic liturgical movement that has transformed the larger american church mcgann then examines the foundational vision of rev clarence r j rivers who promoted forms of black worship music preaching and prayer that have enabled african american catholics to reclaim the fullness of their religious identity finally harbor constructs a black catholic aesthetic based on the theological ethical and liturgical insights of four african american scholars expressed through twenty three performative values this liturgical aesthetic illuminates the distinctive gift of black catholics to the multicultural tapestry of lived faith in the american church and can also serve as a pastoral model for other cultural communities blending history theology and liturgy let it shine is a valuable resource for scholars teachers and students and a practical pastoral guide to bringing african american spirituality more firmly into the sacramental life of american parishes

a comprehensive treatment of preaching in the black catholic tradition

chicago has been known as the black metropolis but before the great migration chicago could have been called the catholic metropolis with its skyline defined by parish spires as well as by industrial smoke stacks and skyscrapers this book uncovers the intersection of the two authentically black and truly catholic traces the developments within the church in chicago to show how black catholic activists in the 1960s and 1970s made black catholicism as we know it today the sweep of the great migration brought many black migrants face to face with white missionaries for the first time and transformed the religious landscape of the urban north the hopes migrants had for their new home met with the desires of missionaries to convert entire neighborhoods missionaries and migrants forged fraught relationships with one another and tens of thousands of black men and women became catholic in the middle decades of the twentieth century as a result these black catholic converts saved failing parishes by embracing relationships and ritual life that distinguished them from the evangelical churches proliferating around them

they praised the quiet dignity of the latin mass while distancing themselves from the gospel choirs altar calls and shouts of amen increasingly common in black evangelical churches their unique rituals and relationships came under intense scrutiny in the late 1960s when a growing group of black catholic activists sparked a revolution in u s catholicism

in this unique ethnography of urban southern catholicism one of the few substantial studies of modern african american catholics since the 1920s gary w mcdonogh employs a decade of anthropological and historical research to explore the contradictions and survival of black and catholic parishes in savannah given the disfranchisement of african americans in the south as well as nativist responses to catholics among both blacks and whites those who are black and catholic in savannah constitute a double minority whose lives mcdonogh explores by examining the interaction of community church and individual a city divided for two centuries by conflicts over culture class and race savannah is permeated by ambiguous identities that often end up before the altar religion thus serves as a cultural language through which urban life can be observed as well as a system of belief and identity shared by blacks and catholics this multidisciplinary study links ethnography to wider debates on symbolism gender class and cultural power the vivid voices memories ritual and social acts and observations of savannah provide the basis for comparative insights and theoretical generalizations on communities within the united states and on a broad range of urban and religious issues

one act set in motion a chain of events that threatened one catholic community s ability to thrive it happened between 1945 and 1946 at the headquarters of the archdiocese of detroit in the chancellor s office msgr john c ryan called an emergency meeting with the cardinal and so the stage was set for the years of turmoil that followed and the subsequent demise of this once vibrant church here comes the author who gives the reader an intimate look at her church the township she grew up in and its historical significance to world war ii henry ford s auto plant migration from the south and the housing crisis that was unfolding the reader is introduced to the pioneers of this west eight mile community who helped shape and establish this community that shaped her but the book takes a different turn as the research uncovers forgotten secrets today 2014 this little church is in danger of closing its physical doors forever stay tuned as this story continues to unfold

founded in 1930 as the result of efforts by several black catholic lay women queen of angels was the first african american catholic congregation in newark new jersey the church quickly embarked on an outreach campaign that endured for decades and affected the entire newark community black and white catholic and protestant by the 1960s many people looked to queen of angels as a model of social and civil rights activism in a mission for justice mary ward places queen of angels within its broader historical religious and social context and explores the church s struggle for justice within the catholic church and in society as a whole

black and catholic documents the exclusion erasure and systematic racism faced by black catholics filling an essential gap in both catholic and black history in the storied history of the u s catholic community there is a long standing myth held by catholics and non catholics alike that there are no black catholics in this deeply researched and compelling book tia noelle pratt debunks this myth and brings forward the religious experiences and culture of black catholics filling a void in the literature of both u s catholicism and african american religion she identifies the nature and ramifications of systemic racism on american catholicism and how that marginalization impacts black catholic identity building on her extensive research pratt amplifies the voices and experiences of black catholics through original interviews and by sharing the story of st peter claver philadelphia s first black catholic church black and catholic also explores the ways that liturgy and music can build community celebrate individuality and resist racism black and catholic is an essential book that centralizes the black catholic community revealing the heartache of racism and discrimination the comfort drawn from the strength of generations of believers and the celebration from combining the music and traditions of african american religious experiences with the belief and rituals of roman catholicism

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
