the perfection of the cosmos uniting the finite with the infinite in the perfection of divine personality working from an original synthesis of the major kabbalistic traditions of cosmology derived from the bible the zohar and the school of isaac luria leonora leet has erected a new framework for understanding the mechanism of the transformative spiritual work that enables the human soul to reach increasingly higher dimensions of consciousness this analysis extends the frontiers of leet's prior works on the kabbalah to provide a new illumination of human possibilities leet first considers the false temptations of worldly power and pleasure that lead to the fall of the soul and then the means of its redemption she develops a powerful meditative technique called the transformative moment whose workings are exemplified by jacob and joseph and that allow the individual to progress through all the higher levels of the soul even possibly to attain the miraculous powers of the legendary spiritual masters she further correlates the hierarchy of soul levels with ezekiel's throne vision to show the various paths the soul may travel toward self realization sex love power knowledge holiness and unification the first four paths relate to the four faced living creatures chayot of ezekiel's throne vision the bull ox lion eagle and man the final two paths correlate to the prophet and the envisioned man on the throne he recognizes to be his divine higher self the knowledge that defines the secret doctrine of the whole of the jewish mystical tradition culminating in the kabbalah

third edition god the universe and man their essential unity and fundamental attributes as seen through the eyes of jewish esoteric tradition is the subject of leo schaya's masterly study of the kabbalah unlike most works on the subject which focus on the history of the kabbalah or the kabbalah as literature not to mention countless new age rants this penetrating text expounds the universal teachings of the kabbalah on the relationships of all things to their supreme archetypes the ten sephiroth or principal aspects of god in addition to the old testament and the talmud schaya draws on one of the classical sources of jewish mysticism the zohar or book of splendor from which he extracts an all embracing synthesis of the numberless degrees of all reality to which correspond the multiple states of human being from earthly individuality to essential identity with the absolute this work acclaimed by reviewers and scholars alike fittingly concludes with an illuminating chapter on the name of god which saves all those who invoke him in truth students of comparative religion will find an abundance of information here for striking parallels both with the hindu cosmological doctrines and the metaphysical insights of the vedantic sages are among the surprises interlaced in this account of judaic esoteric wisdom in this schaya carries on the extraordinary work of three great 20th century metaphysicians of the philosophia perennis ren gunon frithjof schuon and ananda k

coomaraswamy this book will be extremely useful to anyone who is in the words of maimonides perplexed by the bible in the sense of having exercised his best thinking about it and who now stands broken before its apparent contradictions and its overwhelming emotional authority the kabbalah or esotericism is the communication to man of what schaya calls principal ideas ideas that are to thought and actions what the sun is to its rays standing between metaphysical ideas and the symbolic language of the zohar and the old testament he allows each side to penetrate the other jacob needleman author of lost christianity a sense of the cosmos etc this book fills an urgent need to rediscover the deepest meaning of the old testament is something that could have had a most tonic and enlightening effect on the whole of christian thought today no clearer interpreters are to be found than the masters of the kabbalah marco pallis author of the way and the mountain a buddhist spectrum etc leo schaya was born in switzerland in 1916 he received a traditional jewish upbringing but from an early age devoted himself to the study of the great metaphysical doctrines of east and west particularly those of neoplatonism sufism and theadvaita vedanta his works include in addition to the universal meaning of the kabbalah first published in french in 1958 as *l'homme et l'absolu selon la kabbale la doctrine soufique de l'unit la cration en dieu la lumire du judasme du christianisme et l'islam* and *naissance l'esprit* as well as numerous articles

an account of kabbalah and its impact outside of judaism offers a concise and highly accurate look at the history and character of the various systems developed by the adherents of the kabbalah

provides an introduction to the world of the kabbalah focusing on both the kabbalist as a person and the major teachings of the kabbalah

dressing entirely in white is normal practice on a five block stretch of robertson boulevard in west los angeles western men and women garbed in white from their turbans to their keds traverse the busy streets surrounding the sikh temple further north you have to wait until friday afternoon to see white clad young men in yarmulkes gathering outside the kabbalah learning centre greeting each other with hugs the spaces around them filled with women and children wearing multi colored garments beyond this city street one hears of the popularity of kabbalah in the tabloids as celebrities such as madonna claim kabbalah as their new religion how have the obscure and

offensive ideas of medieval jewish mysticism expressed in doctrines like the demonic power of women s menstrual blood or the soulless bodies of gentiles been made palatable for so many from all stripes of life with klcs in cities such as boca raton new york los angeles boston miami philadelphia san diego houston and las vegas the reach of this mystical tradition can be said to be nationwide but how did its beliefs and practices become as fashionable as they are now what do the klcs teach so that adherents stay on is it a cult a religion or simply a system of universal wisdom as its leaders purport determined to uncover the secrets of this esoteric faith the author embarked upon three 10 week kabbalah classes among other learning opportunities examined kabbalah publications from the 1970s to the present listened to klc audio tapes and interacted with adherents this book presents her experiences and findings and offers an overview of the history of the kabbalah in this country its beliefs and practices its positions on health and healing of both the self and the world its structure and outreach and its views of men and women she traces the origins of kabbalah offers a glimpse into its world its relationships to judaism its place in american society and its future

reuchlin's keen interest in jewish mysticism resulted in the original publication of this work in 1517 the first part of this dialogue reflects on messianism the second part on the relation of the pythagorean system to the kabbalah and the third on the practical kabbalah ø the german humanist johann reuchlin 1455-1522 defended the value of jewish scholarship and literature when it was unwise and unpopular to do so as g lloyd jones points out a marked mistrust of the jews had developed among christian scholars during the later middle ages it was claimed that the rabbis had purposely falsified the text of the old testament and given erroneous explanations of passages which were capable of a christological interpretation christian scholars most certainly did not advocate learning the hebrew language ø reuchlin was exceptional in pursuing and promoting hebrew studies believing that a working knowledge of that language was essential for a true appreciation of the bible and rabbinic literature refusing to join christian contemporaries who wished to destroy the kabbalah and the talmud he spoke out against ignorance christians could have a useful dialogue with jews if they gained a thorough knowledge of the writings of jewish exegetes and philosophers toward that end he proposed university endowments that aroused the fury of opponents and led to the famous battle of the books ø reuchlin's keen interest in jewish mysticism resulted in the publication of *de arte cabalistica* in 1517 the first part of this dialogue reflects on messianism the second part on the relation of the pythagorean system to the kabbalah and the third on the practical kabbalah according to jones reuchlin demonstrates how christians can make profitable use of jewish

mystical writings and therefore shares with the reader his understanding of the art of the kabbalah that art will reach more readers in this modern english language translation by martin and sarah goodman it reinforces the historical importance of the man who prevented the destruction of jewish books and anticipated the more liberal climate of the reformation

this book is a critical study of the mystical celebration of sabbath in the classical period of kabbalah from the late twelfth to the early sixteenth centuries the kabbalists re reading of the earlier jewish tradition has been called a model of mythopoeic revision a revision rooted in a world view that stressed the interrelation of all worlds and levels of being this is the first work in any language to systematically collect and analyze all the major innovations in praxis and theology that classical kabbalah effected upon the development of the rabbinic sabbath one of the most central areas of jewish religious practice the author analyzes the historical development of the kabbalistic sabbath constructs a theoretical framework for the interpretation of its dense myth ritual structure and provides a phenomenology of key myths and rituals it is one of the first kabbalistic studies to integrate traditional textual historical scholarship with newer methods employed in the study of religion and symbolic anthropology

mysticism but also to the study of medieval mysticism in general now with a new foreword by david biale this book remains essential reading for students of the history of religion

the general view of scholars is that the kabbalah had no meaningful influence on leibniz s thought but on the basis of new evidence i am convinced that the question must be reopened the kabbalah did influence leibniz and a recognition of this will lead to both a better understanding of the supposed quirkiness 2 of leibniz s philosophy and an appreciation of the kabbalah as an integral but hitherto ignored factor in the emergence of the modern secular and scientifically oriented world during the past twenty years there has been increasing willingness to recognize the important ways in which mystical and occult thinking contributed to the development of science and the emergence 3 of toleration however the kabbalah particularly the lurianic kabbalah with its monistic vitalism and optimistic philosophy of perfectionism and universal salvation has not yet been integrated into the new historiography although it richly deserves to be on the basis of manuscripts in libraries at hanover and wolffenbiittel it is clear that leibniz s relationship with francis mercury van helmont 1614 1698 and christian knorr von rosenroth 1636 1689 the two leading christian kabbalists of the period was much closer than previously imagined and that his direct knowledge of their writings especially the collection of 4 kabbalistic texts they published in the kabbala denudata was far more detailed than most scholars have realized during 1688 leibniz spent more than a month at sulzbach with von rosenroth
