philosophers on race adds a new dimension to current research on race theory by examining the historical roots of the concept in the works of major western philosophers

this edition assembles the major essays on race and imperialism written by nancy cunard in the 1930s and 1940s as a british expatriate living in france and as a politically engaged poet editor publisher and journalist nancy cunard devoted much of her energy to the cause of racial justice this broadview

edition contextualizes cunard s writings on race in terms of the relations among modernism gender and empire it includes a range of contemporaneous documents that place her essays in dialogue with other european writers and with the work of writers of the african diaspora

henry louis gates jr nikki giovanni james mcpherson stephen l carter itabari njeri reginald mcknight and twelve other african american intellectuals reveal with vast originality and candor the lure and loathing that characterize the experience of black people in white america

color struck essays of race and ethnicity in global perspective is a compilation of expositions on race and ethnicity written from multiple disciplinary approaches including history sociology women s studies and anthropology this book is organized around a topical chronological framework and is divided into three sections beginning with the earliest times to the contemporary world the term race has nearly become synonymous with the word ethnicity given the most recent findings in the study of human genetics that have led to the mapping of human dna color struck attempts to answer questions and provide scholarly insight into issues related to race and ethnicity

in look a negro political theorist robert gooding williams imaginatively and impressively unpacks fundamental questions around race and racism inspired by frantz fanon s famous description of the profound effect of being singled out by a white child with the words look a negro his book is an insightful rich and unusually wide ranging work of social criticism these essays engage themes that have dominated debates on race and racial identity in recent years the workings of racial ideology including the interplay of gender and sexuality in the articulation of racial ideology the viability of social constructionist theories of race the significance of afrocentrism and multiculturalism for democracy the place of black identity in the imagination and articulation of america s inheritance of philosophy and the conceptualization of african american politics in post segregation america look a negro will be of interest to philosophers political theorists critical race theorists students of cultural studies and film and readers concerned with the continuing importance of race consciousness to democratic culture in the united states

as we are now mix blood essays on race and identity

in these essays brought together by the scholar wahneema lubiano some of today s most respected intellectuals share their ideas on race power gender

and society the authors including cornel west angela y davis and toni morrison argue that we have reached a crisis of democracy represented by an ominous shift toward a renewed white nationalism in which racism is operating in coded quasi respectable new forms

through public appearances radio and television interviews and his many articles and books manning marable has become one of america s most prominent commentators on race relations and african american politics speaking truth to power brings together for the first time marable s major writings on black politics peace and social justice the book traces the changing role of race within the american political system since the civil rights movement it also charts the author s striking evolution of political ideas moving toward a political analysis of multicultural democracy social justice and egalitarian pluralism

in highlighting the crucial contributions of diasporic people to british cultural production this important collection defamiliarizes prevailing descriptions of romanticism as the expression of a national character or culture the contributors approach the period from the perspective of the atlantic maritime economy making a strong case for viewing british romanticism as the effect of myriad economic and cultural exchanges occurring throughout a circum atlantic world driven by an insatiable hunger for sugar and slaves typically taken for granted the material contributions of slaves sailors and servants shaped romanticism both in spite of and because of the severe conditions they experienced throughout the atlantic world the essays range from sierra leone to jamaica to nova scotia to the metropole examining not only the desperate circumstances of diasporic peoples but also the extraordinary force of their creativity and resistance of particular importance is the emergence of race as a category of identity class and containment race romanticism and the atlantic explores that process both economically and theoretically showing how race ensures the persistence of servitude after abolition at the same time the collection never loses sight of the extraordinary contributions diasporic peoples made to british culture during the romantic era

this collection are rich with gorgeous prose nadia owusu author of aftershocks and are as humorous and as full of nolan s appetites as they are of anxiety the result is lyrical and magnetic in on dating white guys while me nolan realizes her early romantic pursuits of rich preppy white guys weren t about preference but about self erasure in the titular essay don t let it get you down we traverse the cyclical richness and sorrow of being black in america as black children face police brutality large black females encounter unique stigma and black men carry the weight of other people s fear in bad education we see how women learn to internalize rage and accept violence to participate in our own culture and in to wit and also we meet filliss grace and peggy the enslaved women owned by nolan s white ancestors reckoning with the knowledge that america s original sin lives intimately within our present stories over and over again nolan reminds us that our true identities are often most authentically lived not in the black and white but in the grey of the in between perfect for fans of heavy by kiese laymon and bad feminist by roxane gay don t let it get you down delivers a deeply personal insight layla f saad new york times bestselling author of me and white supremacy on race class bodies and gender in america today

the essays collected here illustrate the exciting new historical research being done by scholars at the beginning of their careers the authors employ a variety of methodologies to answer questions and recover histories ranging from medieval european political iconography to communist women in suharto s indonesia three important themes run through the breadth and diversity of the essays race gender and politics the contributors use these familiar themes to create new lines of historical inquiry disparate in topic and approach the essays demonstrate the ways in which race gender and politics as analytical categories continue to provide new critical revisions to received interpretations particularly of politics further they underscore the need to interrogate the transnational and global nature of historical developments we once understood as purely local or national finally the essays illustrate the importance of both macro and micro studies to understanding global historical developments
