how do lawyers judges and jurors read novels and what is at stake when literature and law confront each other in the courtroom nineteenth century england and france are remembered for their active

legal prosecution of literature and this book examines the ways in which five novels were interpreted in the courtroom: Gustave Flaubert's *Madame Bovary*, Paul Bonnetain's *Charlot's Amuse*, Henry Vizetelly's English translation of Émile Zola's *La terre*, Oscar Wilde's *The Picture of Dorian Gray*, and Radclyffe Hall's *The Well of Loneliness*. It argues that each of these novels attracted legal censure because they presented figures of sexual dissidence: the androgyne, the onanist or masturbator, the patricide, the homosexual, and the lesbian, that called into question an increasingly fragile normative middleclass masculinity. Offering close readings of the novels themselves and of legal material from the proceedings, such as the trial transcripts and judicial opinions, the book addresses both the doctrinal dimensions of Victorian obscenity and censorship as well as the reading practices at work in the courtroom. It situates the cases in their historical context and highlights how each trial constitutes a scene of reading, an encounter between literature and the law through which different forms of masculinity were shaped, bolstered, or challenged.

In *Dirt for Art's Sake*, Elisabeth Ladenson recounts the most visible of modern obscenity trials involving scandalous books and their authors. What she asks: do these often colorful legal histories have to tell us about the works themselves and about a changing cultural climate that first treated them as filth and later celebrated them as masterpieces? Ladenson's narrative starts with *Madame Bovary*: Flaubert was tried in France in 1857 and finishes with *Fanny Hill*, written in the eighteenth century, put on trial in the United States in 1966. She considers, along the way, *Les fleurs du mal*, *Ulysses*, *The Well of Loneliness*, *Lady Chatterley's Lover*, *Tropic of Cancer*, *Lolita*, and the works of the Marquis de Sade. Over the course of roughly a century, Ladenson finds two ideas that had been circulating in the form of avant-garde heresy gradually became accepted as truisms and eventually as grounds for legal defense. The first is captured in the formula *art for art's sake*, the notion that a work of art exists in a realm independent of conventional morality. The second is realism, vilified by its critics as *dirt for dirt's sake*. In Ladenson's view, the truth of the matter is closer to *dirt for art's sake*: the idea that the work of art may legitimately include the representation of all aspects of life, including the unpleasant and the sordid. Ladenson also considers cinematic adaptations of these novels, among them Vincente Minnelli's *Madame Bovary*, Stanley Kubrick's *Lolita*, and the 1997 remake directed by Adrian Lyne, and various attempts to translate de Sade's works and life into film, which faced similar censorship. *Travails* is written with a keen awareness of ongoing debates about free speech. *Dirt for Art's Sake* traces the legal and social acceptance of controversial works with critical acumen and delightful wit.

Adam Parkes investigates the literary and cultural implications of the censorship encountered by several modern novelists in the early twentieth century. He situates modernism in the context of this censorship, examining the relations between such authors as D. H. Lawrence, James Joyce, Radclyffe Hall, and Virginia Woolf and the public controversies generated by their fictional explorations of modern sexual themes. These authors located obscenity at the level of stylistic and formal experiment. *The Rainbow*, *Lady Chatterley's Lover*, *Ulysses*, and *Orlando* dramatized problems of sexuality and expression in ways that subverted the moral, political, and aesthetic premises on which their censors operated. In showing how modernism evolved within a culture of censorship, *Modernism and the Theater of Censorship* suggests that modern novelists, while shaped by their culture, attempted to reshape it.

The essays of this volume show how Joyce's work engaged with the many upheavals and revolutions within the French nineteenth-century novel and its contexts. They delve into the complexities of this engagement, tracing its twists and turns and reemerge with fascinating and rich discoveries. The contributors explore Joyce's explicit and implicit responses to Alexandre Dumas, Honoré de Balzac, Victor Hugo, and Émile Zola, and of course Flaubert. Drawing from the wide range of Joyce's writings, *Dubliners*, a portrait, *Ulysses*, *Finnegans Wake*, and his life, letters, and essays, they resituate Joyce's relation to France, the novel, and the nineteenth century.
