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alongside the recent cultural turn in the humanities there has been a noticeable return to ethical considerations with regard to literature as well as other media this has rekindled awareness of a tension antagonism or even disparity between ethics and aesthetics this volume of articles takes a more systematic and cross disciplinary approach to the widely mooted ethical turn in literature and other media than has been pursued so far it brings together a wide range of critical perspectives from literary studies media and cultural memory studies and philosophy tracing the complex and sometimes conflicting relationship between ethics and aesthetics in theoretical contexts and individual case studies as diverse as colonial architecture nineteenth century literary histories and postmodern writing and art

intermediate examination paper from the year 2007 in the subject politics general and theories of international politics grade 1 5 the australian national university language english abstract contemplating ethics culture and furthermore their interplay in world politics might be a perpetual impasse devoid of a teleological clarity disregarding the two concepts on the other hand as irrelevant to the study of international relations ir as it is best carried out by realpolitik and studied with scientific sterility ala kenneth waltz would be myopic on a number of levels before framing the meaning of ethics and culture and discussing their possible interplay in world politics the following question is proposed to perhaps establish a conceptual link between the two can we find a fruitful starting point by perceiving morality as a connector of ethics and culture to world politics of all the areas of philosophy ethics is the one that seems most significant to people and it is no overstatement to say that everyone is engaged in ethical deliberation at every turn in life ethics as a major philosophical branch is derived from the ancient greek term ethikos or the meaning of living its primary focus is to discern between right and wrong ergo it aims to understand the nature of morality or put differently the social quality of ethics forces each of us to feel that our identity is also defined by our relations to others in a world which is transformed by a growing interconnectedness and intensification of relations among states and societies summarized in the buzzword of globalization the social quality of ethics calls for refinement the veil of ignorance has been vigorously lifted from our eyes by the effects of global transformation and it becomes an imperative to avoid limiting ethics to kin relationship or confined to territorial bounded westphalian sovereignty in short ethics is about humanizing the experience of the other which is in its logical extension an individual moral choice to be righteous in a global as well as national and even local context thus sound moral values raise tough choices and tough choices are

never straightforward especially in the prevailing anarchical system of world politics just like ethics culture is not a singular thing but rather a loose collection of assumed characteristics of a community

questions of ethics and the study of culture are tightly interwoven are we to see ethics as one thread in the fabric created by human culture or does ethics rather transcend culture the discussions in this volume take place within this spectrum eleven wittgenstein scholars explore how ethics is embedded in everyday activities and speech the topics dealt with range from the ways we speak about human practices and nature religious belief gender and moral understanding to questions about wittgenstein's views on ethics and what it means to understand and attend to a particular individual central points of departure are firstly that ethics cannot be reduced to any specific cultural form and secondly that how we conceive of language is crucially connected with how we perceive the relation between culture and ethics the points of view put forth frequently pose radical questions to the mainstream of philosophy the different uses to which wittgenstein's thought is put also raise important questions about how one should understand the role of language ethics and culture in his philosophy

boothroyd presents an original perspective on emmanuel levinas s account of the ethical subject as contingently and empirically embedded in everyday experience and situations it explores the relationship between theoretical understandings of the subject in recent and contemporary european philosophy and the constitution of ethical subjectivity in relation to ethical subject matters as these are lived as the author argues and demonstrates in parallel with one another

conceptualized by those who have described organizations and the kind of moral world they have in fact constructed through its ideals and images for the men and women who work in organizations feldman builds his analysis around a historically grounded concept of moral tradition he demonstrates a central insight when those who have written on organizational culture have addressed issues of ethics they have ignored the past as a foundation to stabilize and maintain moral commitments instead they have fluctuated between attempts to base ethics on executive rationality and attempts to escape the suffocating logic of rationalism after an opening chapter defining the concept of moral tradition feldman focuses on early works on organizational management by chester barnard and melville dalton these define the tension between ethical rationalism and ethical relativism he then turns to contemporary frameworks analyzing critical organizational theory and the new institutionalism in the final chapters feldman considers ethical relativism in contemporary thinking including postmodern organization theory the exaggerated drive for diversity and such concepts as power knowledge and deconstructionism memory as a moral decision is unique in its understanding of organizational culture as it relates to past present and future systems its interdisciplinary approach uses the insights of sociology psychology and culture studies to create an invaluable framework for the study of ethics in organizations

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
