our society has become characterized by aggressive media information is constantly at our fingertips whether it be through the books newspapers and magazines we read the television we watch the radio stations to which we listen or the computers that connect us to the world in a matter of seconds we can try to limit our media exposure but it is impossible to avoid all media messages as a result we psychologically protect ourselves by automatically processing the media to which we are exposed theory of media literacy a cognitive approach comprehensively explains how we absorb the flood of information in our media saturated society and examines how we often construct faulty meanings from those messages in this book author w james potter enlightens readers on the tasks of information processing by building on a foundation of principles about how humans think theory of media literacy examines decisions about filtering messages standard schema to match meaning and higher level skills to construct meaning a central theme of potter s theory is the locus that governs the degree to which a person is media literate the locus is enriched by developing skills as well as good knowledge structures on five topics media effects media content media industries real world parameters and the self key features presents the first social scientific theory of the process of media literacy explores a

this book explores the socially and individually determined nature of media literacy addressing the central question of how individuals media activity can be explained and evaluated it examines people s media activity through the relationship between their competence to act and actual actions further the book discusses the social factors that foster self determined media activity including people s abilities and skills and the associated knowledge that facilitates such skills from the perspectives of various social science disciplines lastly it applies these theoretical reflections to two empirical studies overall this book provides a fundamental introduction to theories of media socialization media literacy and media competence and to the relation between media and socialization it analyses international discourses on children media media literacy and digital literacy this book is of interest to scholars and researchers in the field of media studies including media sociology and media education communication and cultural studies

the arrival of immigrants on america s shores has always posed a singular problem once they are here how are these diverse peoples to be transformed into americans the americanization movement of the 1910s and 1920s addressed this challenge by seeking to train immigrants for citizenship representing a key element of the progressives search for order in a modernizing america frank van nuys examines for the first time how this movement in an effort to help integrate an unruly west into the emerging national system was forced to reconcile the myth of rugged individualism with the demands of a planned society in an era convulsed by world war and socialist revolution the americanization movement was especially concerned about the susceptibility of immigrants to un american propaganda and union agitation as van nuys convincingly demonstrates this applied as much to immigrants in the urbanizing and industrializing west as it did to those occupying the ethnic enclaves of cities in the east in americanizing the west he tells how hundreds of bureaucrats educators employers and reformers participated in this movement by developing adult immigrant education programs and how these attempts contributed more toward bureaucratizing the west than it did to turning immigrants into productive citizens he deftly ties this history to broader national developments and shows how westerners brought distinctive approaches to americanization to accommodate and preserve their own sense of history and identity van nuys shows that although racism and social control agendas permeated americanization efforts in the west americanizers sustained their faith in education as a powerful force in transforming immigrants into productive citizens he also shows how some westerners especially in california believed they faced a racial frontier unlike other parts of the country in light of the influx of hispanics and asians so that westerners became major players in the crafting of not only american identity but also immigration policies the mystique of the white pioneer past still maintains a powerful hold on ideas of american identity and we still deal with many of these issues through laws and propositions targeting immigrants and alien workers americanizing the west makes a clear case for regional distinctiveness in this

citizenship program and puts current headlines in perspective by showing how it helped make the west what it is today weaver incorporates especially timely information accurate data informed critique and results of often ignored research to help teachers counteract government and corporate intrusion into classrooms
