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these essays explore aspects of the english colony in medieval ireland and its relations with the gaelic host society they deal both with the foundation and expansion of the english lordship in the twelfth and early thirteenth centuries and with the problems sand adjustments that accompaneid its contraction in the later middle ages attention is paid both to the government and society of the colony itself and to the interactions between settler and native

hospitality was one of the most important social institutions and cultural customs in medieval ireland the fundamental principles governing the provision of hospitality were rooted in both the secular and religious traditions of irish culture and were represented in both the public and private spheres of irish life legal texts

court records ecclesiastical decrees concerning the privileges of high ranking clerics and secular statements regarding the rights of kings reveal that the practice of hospitality was largely contractual and generally involved the mutually self interested transactions of mundane affairs yet an ethos of generosity strongly linked to a cultural code of honor suffused the irish practice of hospitality with an air of moral uprightness and decorousness gnomonic literature provided a series of adages maxims and proverbs reminding individuals that the path to virtuous living began with charity liberality and good housekeeping while sagas and bardic praise poetry underscored the influence hospitality had in determining one's standing in society still hospitality was not wholly secular nor exclusively irish for that matter it was a basic christian duty sanctioned by the church and observed throughout the medieval world christian precept and example had a major impact on native irish concepts of hospitality and how the practice was played out in everyday life

the field of hiberno latin literature a term coined to describe the latin literature written in ireland or by irishmen abroad between 400 and 1500 was first defined by the late mario esposito his work too revealed its vast extent and range so enabling a significantly better understanding of the importance of irish scholarship in the cultural history of the western middle ages this volume concentrates on hiberno latin authors and on texts composed in ireland a second collection of esposito's articles contains studies on irish learning and texts written on the continent the great strength of his research is that it is founded on unparalleled knowledge of the manuscripts many of which indeed no longer survive the articles now provided with extensive indexes to facilitate their consultation therefore form the essential basis and guide for any further enquiry into the authors dealt with or their works

fosterage was a central feature of medieval irish society yet the widespread practice of sending children to another family to be cared for until they reached adulthood is a surprisingly neglected topic where it has been discussed fosterage is usually conceptualised and treated as a purely legal institution this work seeks to outline the emotional impact of growing up within another family what emerges is a complex picture of deeply felt emotional ties binding the foster family together these emotions are unique to the social practice of fosterage and we see the language and feelings originating within the foster family being used to describe other relationships such as those in the monastery or between humans and animals this book argues that the more we understand how people felt in fosterage the more we understand medieval ireland

history and salvation in medieval ireland explores medieval irish conceptions of salvation history using latin and vernacular sources from c 700 c 1200 ce which adapt biblical history for audiences both secular and ecclesiastical this book examines medieval irish sources on the cities of jerusalem and babylon reworkings of narratives from the hebrew scriptures literature influenced by the psalms and texts indebted to late antique historiography it argues that the conceptual framework of salvation history and the related theory of the divinely ordained movement of political power through history had a formative influence on early irish culture society and identity primarily through analysis of previously untranslated sources this study teases out some of the intricate connections between the local and the universal in order to situate medieval irish historiography within the context of that of the wider world using an overarching biblical chronology beginning with the lives of the jewish patriarchs and ending with the christian apostolic missions this study shows how one culture understood the histories of others and has important implications for issues such as kingship religion and literary production in medieval ireland this book will appeal to scholars and students of medieval ireland as well as those interested in religious and cultural history
