

Migration In Lusophone Cinema

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with more than 250 million speakers globally the lusophone world has a rich history of filmmaking this edited volume explores the representation of the migratory experience in contemporary cinema from portuguese speaking countries exploring how lusophone films filmmakers producers studios and governments relay narratives of migration

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offering a range of critical perspectives on a vibrant body of films this collection of essays engages with questions specific to the various cinemas and films addressed while putting forward an argument for their inclusion in current debates on world cinema the collection brings together 11 chapters by recognized scholars who analyze a variety of films and videos from angola cape verde guiné bissau and mozambique it also includes an interview with pedro pimenta one of the most distinguished african film festival organizers drawing on various theoretical perspectives the volume strives to reverse the relative invisibility that has afflicted these cinemas arguing that most if not all lusophone films are transnational in all aspects of production acting and reception the initial three chapters sketch broad comparative overviews and suggest theoretical approaches while the ensuing chapters focus on specific case studies and discuss a number of key issues such as the convergence of film with politics the question of gender and violence as well as the revisiting of the period immediately following independence attention is given to fiction documentary films and recent short alternative video productions that are overlooked by more traditional channels the book stresses the need to pay attention to the significance of african film and lusophone african film in particular within the developing field of world cinema bringing together general overviews historical considerations detailed case studies and focused theoretical reflections this book is a significant volume for students and researchers in film studies especially african lusophone cultural studies and world cinema

manthia diawara provides an insider s account of the history and current status of african cinema african cinema politics and culture is the first extended study in english of sub saharan cinema employing an interdisciplinary approach which draws on history political science economics and cultural studies diawara discusses such issues as film production and distribution and film aesthetics from the colonial period to the present the book traces the growth of african cinema through the efforts of pioneer filmmakers such as paulin soumanou vieyra oumarou

ganda jean rené débrix jean rouch and ousmane sembène the pan african filmmakers organization fepaci and the ougadougou pan african film festival fespaco diwara focuses on the production and distribution histories of key films such as ousmane sembène's black girl and mandabi 1968 and souleymane cissé's fine 1982 he also examines the role of missionary films in africa débrix's ideas concerning magic the links between yoruba theater and nigerian cinema and the parallels between hindu mythologicals in india and the yoruba theater inflected films in nigeria diawara also looks at film and nationalism film and popular culture and the importance of fespaco african cinema politics and culture makes a major contribution to the expanding discussion of eurocentrism the canon and multi culturalism

besides national productions transnational films that result from agreements with ex colonies now engage with the legacy of portugal's colonial history and its powerful myths of cultural identity such as lusophony and lusotropicalism this volume analyses the negotiations of ideas on identity and difference in both production modes

situates the cultures of portuguese speaking africa within the postcolonial global era

film studies a global introduction reroutes film studies from its euro american focus and canon in order to introduce students to a medium that has always been global but has become differently and insistently so in the digital age glyn davis kay dickinson lisa patti and amy villarejo's approach encourages readers to think about film holistically by looking beyond the textual analysis of key films in contrast it engages with other vital areas such as financing labour marketing distribution exhibition preservation and politics reflecting contemporary aspects of cinema production and consumption worldwide key features of the book include clear definitions of the key terms at the foundation of film studies coverage of the work of key thinkers explained in their social and historical context a broad range of relevant case studies that reflect the book's approach to global cinema from italian white telephone films to mexican wrestling films innovative and flexible exercises to help readers enhance their understanding of the histories theories and examples introduced in each chapter an extensive interlude introducing readers to formal analysis through the careful explication and application of key terms a detailed

discussion of strategies for writing about cinema films studies a global introduction will appeal to students studying film today and aspiring to work in the industry as well as those eager to understand the world of images and screens in which we all live

covering fourteen high interest feature films from portuguese speaking countries this text provides a springboard for student discussion and conversation with classroom activities and exercises covering portuguese language grammar vocabulary and culture
