are the integrity and existence of the arabic language in danger are there cultural divides among arabic speaking countries caused by the growing supremacy of the spoken over the written language can arabic grammar be reformed without compromising its age old syntax which has enriched its literature should a proposed reform be implemented what legal authority would have the power of implementation and control must delays be foreseen in the implementation of such a program such are the questions for which this book's author attempts to provide answers solutions and justifications

this book is a reference grammar to support any modern standard arabic course it is particularly useful for those students starting out in the study of arabic each chapter makes the fewest possible assumptions about the student's knowledge aiming rather to group the whole of its subject in one known and accessible place there is also interaction between the categories and to allow for this fact the explanations contain much cross reference similarly no hard line has been drawn between morphology and syntax the arabic used in the book is from modern life from the office the academy the departmental meeting the worksite and so on nothing solely historic or academic is included the book includes an arabic index grammatical index and glossary of grammatical terms accessible introduction to a difficult area of arabic language transliteration used where useful indexes to supplement detailed cross references in the text formerly modern standard arabic a concise grammar

this volume deals with the numerous grammatical passages included in the voluminous kitāb al ayn the earliest arabic dictionary 8th century this material is isolated and classified according to its various grammatical categories and then analyzed taking due account of the current knowledge of the state of arabic grammar in its early stage of development the much disputed attribution of kitāb al ayn to h alīl b aḥmad is reconsidered from the vantage point of this grammatical material this reconsideration involves a critical study of the vast medieval literature about alīl s personality and the question of attribution of this early arabic dictionary in addition to the author s analysis the volume includes an appendix with citations of the original grammatical passages of this dictionary with useful indices

abdallah nacereddine first taught arabic in the united states before moving to switzerland where he led arabic language courses at the league of arab states and in conjunction with the arab swiss chamber of commerce he directed his own institute for arabic language teaching in geneva lausanne bern and zurich and taught arabic at the united nations in geneva for over twenty two years at present he is teaching at the international labour office his teaching materials are the result of this experience and have been thoroughly tested in class one of the first arabic grammar books was published in the 13th century under the title al alfiya didactic treatise in one thousand lines by ibn malek 600 673 a h 1203 1274 a d since that time arabic grammar has not changed at all in 1636 thomas erpenius published his definitive work grammatica arabica in latin at leiden he followed a methodology which suited the european mind and adopted a specific terminology which had to be applied by every non arabic speaking grammarian following this several arabic grammar books were published in different languages contrary to the grammar of other languages which have continued to evolve arabic grammar has remained unchanged there are already a certain number of arabic grammar books what then is the point of publishing yet another from his childhood the author studied arabic grammar mainly from the al alfiya treatise he started to teach it in exactly the same archaic manner that he had learnt it it was when he began to teach arabic at the united nations in geneva to non arabic speakers in a multicultural context that he had to learn a new teaching method and its terminology he therefore started to follow the european methodology for teaching arabic grammar and to use its terminology

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the concept of tae lil occupies a central position in the arabic intellectual tradition in grammar it covers a host of areas of immense theoretical interest including description methodology epistemology and explanation this book sets out to deal with the concept by investigating the major works of those grammarians who

have contributed most in theoretical terms to its development and elaboration in the arabic grammatical tradition it seeks to do so by considering the relation between grammar on the one hand and jurisprudence and theology on the other in dealing with the above issues an appeal is made both directly and indirectly to some of the relevant ideas in the philosophy of science as they apply to this tradition the approach adopted is cross disciplinary in orientation to reflect the centrality of taclil in the arabic intellectual tradition and reference is therefore made to the employment of this concept in jurisprudence and to a lesser extent theology this is the first major study in any european language or in arabic to be published on the topic it will be of interest to arabic grammarians students of arabic and general linguistics and to specialists in islamic jurisprudence and philosophy
