great for directors of schools who want to maintain quality control in the classroom setting and for parents piece of mind topics we introduce in october human needs family loveshelterfoodclothingcommunitythe universeour solar systemfaq q are your montessori lesson plans an entire year s curriculum a i am working on creating montessori education as an entire year s curriculum this educational service has been taught at three different schools i am basically gathering my notes and tweaking what i found worked best and compiling the information into lesson plans the full year makes one complete cycle through what is traditionally called the primary albums i have completed my ams training and am in the process of finishing my ami certification these lesson plans can be taught to ages 3 6 years old the curriculum is more like a spiral in that each year it is used the child continues to learn at his or her own level and pace in the classroom or small group situation the older child will be a model for the younger children and become the expert as they themselves continue to learn on new levels branching out into related areas of interest q do i need montessori training to teach these lesson plans a it is ideal to have gone through a montessori training the lesson plans do not offer the detailed step by step lessons found in the montessori albums these lesson plans assist the montessori teacher to ensure that he she is following a reasonable scope and sequence throughout the year honoring each area of the montessori classroom in the process q how do i get started can i begin the curriculum in the middle of the year a it is ideal to begin with the september guide the montessori materials are introduced sequentially beginning in the september guide q how do you create a 3 hour work time a the ideal is a 2 1 2 to 3 hour work period but this will vary according to age interests attention span etc early in the year a 3 hour work period is usually not practical as the children have not yet normalized and may become restless after two hours or less as the year progresses they will have received more lessons and developed self discipline and the ability to work on their own and for a longer length of time in fact they are often reluctant to put work away when it is time to stop so give a gentle warning about five minutes before the work period is over this can be done by softly singing time to put your work away time to your work away time to put your work away and come to the line or whatever is next just use a simple melody if you aren t familiar with this song q how can i use the guides without feeling that i need to do almost everything a there is enough material in the guides for about three years so don t try to do everything the first year the curriculum will grow with the child each year it is used many schools use a two or three year period to complete the curriculum cycle

Maria Montessori was heavily influenced by Friedrich Froebel who invented the nursery school and Johann Heinrich Pestalozzi and firmly believed that children learned through activities. He invented a new philosophy on raising children. Maria Montessori's philosophy and methodology teach that children learn more in a stimulating environment. According to her philosophy, a teacher is more of a keeper of the environment and helps to create one that facilitates the self-guided learning process for children. Today many teachers and parents strongly follow this type of education as evidenced by the growing number of Montessori schools in the world. In traditional classrooms, children of the same age are grouped together and follow exactly the same lessons, participate in the same activities, and work. Montessori classrooms are very different. Typically, a Montessori classroom is designed for children of different ages and follows an open concept style with different work areas. Lessons are generally held in small groups of children, while other children work or study alone. This concept allows children to expand their individual and social development.
