autobiographical comic strip stories from salon s popular mothers who think section lynda barry wrestles with some of hers in her signature quirky irrepressible voice from dancing and hate to dogs and magic the tales included here are at once hilarious and heartbreaking as she delves into the delights and sorrows of adolescence family identity and love barry s ear for dialogue dead on delivery and painterly style showcase her considerable genius

for use in schools and libraries only lynda barry serves up shouting moms innocence betrayed rotten things we ve done that will haunt us forever and other demons in a comic strip style that will engage the most reluctant readers

from the mists of prehistory to the present day japan has always had stories of fantastic monsters there are women with extra mouths in the backs of their heads water goblins whose favorite food is inside the human anus elephant dragons which feed solely on bad dreams baby zombies talking foxes fire breathing chickens animated blobs of rotten flesh that run about the streets at night and of course the dreaded night parade of one hundred demons when all of the yokai leave their homes and parade through the streets of japan in one massive spectacle of utter pandemonium what are yokai put simply they are the supernatural creatures of japanese folklore the word literally means bewitching and strange it encompasses monsters demons gods ghosts magical animals transformed humans urban legends and strange phenomena it is a broad and vague term nothing exists in the english language that quite captures the essence of yokai this field guide contains over 100 illustrated entries covering a wide variety of japanese yokai each yokai is described in detail including its habitat diet origin and legends based on translations from centuries old japanese texts

a first edition of the stories of the prophets written in khwarezmian turkish by the judge q rabgh z and completed in 1311 was published in 1995 by a group of authors for the second edition h e boeschoten and j o kane have thoroughly revised both the text edition and the translation volume on the basis of additional manuscripts and reviews of the first edition the stories of the prophets qi a al anbiy is a traditional genre in islamic literature such a work contains the res gestae of the biblical prophets and stories about other personalities and peoples up to the birth of the prophet mu ammed exceptionally rabgh z s stories also contains a sizable account of the life of mu ammed and his family the work is a fundamental source both for turkic linguistics and

for islamic studies

japanese anime plays a major role in modern popular visual culture and aesthetics yet this is the first study which sets out to put today s anime in historical context by tracking the visual links between edo and meiji period painters and the post war period animation and manga series *gegegeno kitaro* by mizuki shigeru through an investigation of the very popular *gegegeno kitaro* series broadcast from the 1960s to the present time the author is able to pinpoint the visual roots of the animation characters in the context of yôkai folklore and edo and meiji period monster painting traditions through analysing the changing images related to the representation of monsters in the series the book documents the changes in the perception of monsters over the last half century while at the same time reflecting on the importance of mizuki s work in keeping japan s visual traditions alive and educating new audiences about folklore by recasting yôkai imagery in modern day settings in an innovative way in addition by analysing and comparing character set costume and mask design plot and storyline of yôkai themed films the book is also the first study to shed light on the roles the representations of yôkai have been assigned in post war japanese cinema this book will be of particular interest to those studying japanese visual media including manga and animation as well as students and academics in the fields of japanese studies animation studies art history and graphic design

to see the wizard politics and the literature of childhood takes its central premise as the title indicates from l frank baum s the wonderful wizard of oz upon their return to the emerald city after killing the wicked witch of the west the task the wizard assigned them dorothy the tin woodman scarecrow and lion learn that the wizard is a humbug merely a man from nebraska manipulating them and the citizens of both the emerald city and of oz from behind a screen yet they all continue to believe in the powers they know he does not have still insisting he grant their wishes the image of the man behind the screen and the reader s continued pursuit of the wizard is a powerful one that has at its core an issue central to the study of children s literature the relationship between the adult writer and the child reader as jack zipes perry nodelman daniel hade jacqueline rose and many others point out before the literature for children and young adults actually reaches these intended readers it has been mediated by many and diverse cultural social political psychological and economic forces these forces occasionally work purposefully in an attempt to consciously

socialize or empower training the reader into a particular identity or way of viewing the world by one who considers him or herself an advocate for children obviously these wizards acting in literature can be the writers themselves but they can also be the publishers corporations school boards teachers librarians literary critics and parents and these advocates can be conservative progressive or any gradation in between it is the purpose of this volume to interrogate the politics and the political powers at work in literature for children and young adults childhood is an important site of political debate and children often the victims or beneficiaries of adult uses of power one would be hard pressed to find a category of literature more contested than that written for children and adolescents peter hunt writes in his introduction to understanding children s literature that children s books are overtly important educationally and commercially with consequences across the culture from language to politics most adults and almost certainly the vast majority in positions of power and influence read children s books as children and it is inconceivable that the ideologies permeating those books had no influence on their development if there were a question about the central position literature for children and young adults has in political contests one needs to look no further than the myriad struggles surrounding censorship mark i west observes for instance throughout the history of children s literature the people who have tried to censor children s books for all their ideological differences share a rather romantic view about the power of books they believe or at least they profess to believe that books are such a major influence in the formation of children s values and attitudes that adults need to monitor every word that children read because childhood and young adulthood are the sites of political debate for issues ranging from civil rights and racism to the construction and definition of the family indoctrinating children into or subverting national and religious ideologies the literature of childhood bears consciously political analysis asking how socialization works how children and young adults learn of social cultural and political expectations as well as how literature can propose means of fighting those structures to see the wizard politics and the literature of childhood intends to offer analysis of the political content and context of literature written for and about children and young adults the essays included in to see the wizard analyze nineteenth and twentieth century literature from america britain australia the caribbean and sri lanka that is for and about children and adolescents the essays address issues of racial and national identity and representation poverty and class mobility gender sexuality and power and the uses of literature in the healing of trauma and the construction of an authentic self

some of the most noteworthy graphic novels and comic books of recent years have been entirely autobiographical in graphic subjects michael a chaney brings together a lively mix of scholars to examine the use of autobiography within graphic novels including such critically acclaimed examples as art spiegelman s *maus* david beauchard s *epileptic* marjane satrapi s *persepolis* alan moore s *watchmen* and gene yang s *american born chinese* these essays accompanied by visual examples illuminate the new horizons that illustrated autobiographical narrative creates the volume insightfully highlights the ways that graphic novelists and literary cartoonists have incorporated history experience and life stories into their work the result is a challenging and innovative collection that reveals the combined power of autobiography and the graphic novel

in itself as they assert their asian and american identities claim their own ethnic identity be they immigrant or american born and negotiate their ethnic communities the contributors to growing up asian american in young adult fiction focus on moving beyond stereotypes to examine how asian american children and adolescents define their unique identities chapters focus on primary texts from many ethnicities such as chinese korean filipino japanese vietnamese south asian and hawaiian individual chapters crossing cultural linguistic and racial boundaries negotiate the complex terrain of asian american children s and teenagers identities chapters cover such topics as internalized racism and self loathing hypersexualization of asian american females in graphic novels interracial friendships transnational adoptions and birth searches food as a means of assimilation and resistance commodity racism and the tourist gaze the hostile and alienating environment generated by the war on terror and many other topics

contributions by frederick luis aldama melissa burgess susan kirtley rachel luria ursula murray husted mark o connor allan pero davida pines tara prescott johnson jane tolmie rachel trousdale elaine claire villacorta and glenn willmott lynda barry b 1956 is best known for her distinctive style and unique voice first popularized in her underground weekly comic ernie pook s comeek since then she has published prolifically including numerous comics illustrated novels and nonfiction books exploring the creative process barry s work is genre and form bending often using collage to create what she calls word with drawing vignettes her art imaginative and self reflective allows her to discuss gender race relationships memory and her personal everyday lived experience it is through this experience that barry examines the creative process and offers to readers ways to record and examine their own lives the essays in contagious imagination the work and art of lynda barry edited by jane tolmie study the pedagogy of barry s work and its application academically and practically examining barry s career and work from the point of view of research creation contagious imagination applies barry s unique mixture of teaching art learning and creativity to the very form of the volume exploring barry s imaginative praxis and offering readers their own with a foreword by frederick luis aldama and an afterword by glenn willmott this volume explores the impact of barry s work in and out of the classroom divided into four sections teaching and learning which focuses on critical pedagogy comics and autobiography which targets various practices of rememorying cruddy a self explanatory category that offers two extraordinary critical interventions into barry criticism around a challenging text and research creation which offers two creative synthetic artistic pieces that embody and enact barry s own mixed academic and creative investments this book offers

Many of Japan's most brilliant artists, including Hiroshige, Hokusai, Yoshitoshi and Zeshin, allowed their imaginations free rein to present these mysteries in a variety of media, including paintings, woodblock prints, screens, netsuke and inrō, sculptures and fans. The 49 color plates and 75 black and white illustrations presented here show a stunning array of Japan's most fiendish figures. Each of the ten chapters focuses on one of the most important themes in Japanese lore, discussing its anthropological meaning and literary and artistic interpretations.
