this book presents the healthcare reform experiences of six small to mid sized but dynamic economies spanning the asia pacific the middle east and europe usually not given serious consideration in major international comparisons because of their small size each in fact provides a fascinating case study that illuminates the understanding of the dynamics of healthcare reform although dissimilar in historical and cultural backgrounds they share some important features all faced very similar pressures for change in the 1970s and 1980s all considered a very similar range of policy options and all did not only discuss but actually implemented fundamental changes in their healthcare funding organization contracting and governance structures with strikingly different outcomes all of the authors have lived and worked in one or more of the countries studied in this volume the analytic frameworks they use reflect their broad range of professional and disciplinary backgrounds in health economics and political science beyond mere descriptions of reform processes and superficial analyses based on aggregate data from the usual oecd or who sources they seek to understand and explain the variations in country experiences by examining the politico socio economic factors driving health reform as seen through the respective country lenses in coming together in this unique international collaboration they make an important contribution to the growing field of international comparative health policy studies contributors tsung mei cheng princeton university usa david chinitz the hebrew university of jerusalem israel luca crivelli and iva bolgiani university of lugano switzerland meng kin lim national university of singapore singapore kieke g h okma and hans maarse maastricht university the netherlands toni ashton and tim tenbensel university of auckland new zealand

health care reforms around the world from europe and north america to africa latin america and asia seem to all be market oriented reforms driven by international business interests and right wing political parties there seems to be a sudden and broad concern with the efficiency of medical care with the assertion that democratically or professionally run systems are inherently inefficient far less concern is evident for the more traditional values held regarding medical care effectiveness or quality and equity the fact is that we have little good cross national research that systematically addresses the reform issue this book addresses that problem and attempts to look at health care reforms in a number of countries representing as wide a spectrum as possible and using a common conceptual framework that allows for comparable information to be gathered and presented on each despite differing levels of socio economic development the authors agreed on a set of models that were thought to provide reasonable guidance in answering the questions of the source of pressures for reform the alternative modes of organization that have been found in the world in recent years and the direction of change among

those alternatives

health reform has become a permanent feature of public debate but all trends have their day and any genuine reform process must come to an end how will the 90s health reforms turn out will the public enjoy highly cost effective health systems offering the best available health benefits or are the health reforms bound to fail to study health reform it is essential to know what is actually happening to and within various health systems and this volume includes comprehensive articles on health reform in the usa the uk holland south africa new zealand and eastern europe but to be aware of the facts alone is not enough philosophical questions must be addressed if health reform is to be explored in any depth what for instance is health reform what are and what ought to be the typical goals of the health reform process and by what criteria are the success or failure of health reform to be assessed reforming health care offers the reader a grasp of both the practical detail and the theoretical fundamentals of health reform and shows that it is only by understanding the logical structure of reform that burgeoning health reform initiatives can be properly managed

ways reforms have developed in 30 countries and specifically the impact national reform initiatives have had on the quality and safety of care it explores how reforms drive quality and safety improvement and equally how they act to negate such goals every country included in this book is involved in a reform and improvement process but each takes place in a particular social cultural economic and developmental context leading to differing emphases and varied progress methods for tackling common problems financing efficiencies effectiveness evidence based practice institutional reforms quality improvement and patient safety initiatives also differ representatives from each nation provide a chapter to convey their own situation the editors draw a conclusion from these numerous contributions and synthesize the themes emerging into a coherent lessons learned summary that delivers value to the numerous stakeholders healthcare reform quality and safety forms a compendium of the current state of the art in global healthcare reform this is the first book of its type and offers a unique opportunity for cross fertilization of ideas to the mutual benefit of countries involved in the project the content will be of interest to governments policymakers managers and leaders clinicians teaching academics researchers and students

veteran health care insider stephen s s hyde says we can cure today s health care crisis by enabling every american consumer to demand the answers to two question which are the best doctors and hospitals for my medical needs and which of them are the least expensive none of these answers are available now they should be and they can be but to get there we must first correct the fundamental market and regulatory failure that has given us 7 decades of misguided actions by employers government insurers medical providers and consumers to produce the dysfunctional mess we have today hyde reveals how we can have affordable portable health insurance and high quality health care for everyone and how we can double medical quality at half the cost why the government must adopt 3 critical regulatory reforms the 7 key elements of health care reform to achieve 8 essential goals

arguing that health care should be a human right rather than a commodity the distinguished contributors to this volume call for a new social covenant establishing a right to a standard of health care consistent with society s level of resources by linking rights with limits they offer a framework for seeking national consensus on a cost conscious standard of universal medical care the authors identify the policy implications of recognizing and implementing such a right and develop specific criteria to measure the success of health care reform from a human rights perspective health care reform also offers specific and timely criticism of managed competition and its offspring the clinton plan for health care reform because health care reform will inevitably be an ongoing process of assessment and revision especially since managed competition has not been implemented elsewhere this book will last beyond the moment by providing vital standards to guide the future evolution of the health care system

one way to describe the importance of social policy is to say it's about what is and what might be this ethos is the driving force behind chack kie wong vai io lo and kwong leung tang's china's urban health care reform based on a study of a mid level city in china these three scholars provide analysis and offer theory based recommendations on health care development using a comparative policy framework supported by a legal expert's knowledge of regulatory specifications china's urban health care reform argues that a strategy with priority in economic growth as in the case of china does not bring forth cost efficiency and equity in health care for the whole nation ultimately wong lo and tang strive to offer direction for health care reform that will lead to better health care in china's cities as a result this is a work of great significance to anyone involved in public health social work public policy medicine or law

as we forge ahead in charting a new health care course we must devise the most modern streamlined and economically sound system that can answer the needs of this nation's citizens

back to reform is a persuasive discussion of the moral values that motivate the movement for health care reform the book is also a critique of the overreliance on market reforms for improvements in health care examining the values at the heart of health care reform dougherty displays the incompatibility between them and those guiding the market the author starts with an overview of the health care system and the nature of moral values he shows how stresses in the health care system are caused by the increased use of market reforms and how these reforms are inconsistent with the values inherent to genuine health care each chapter considers a central moral value its historical roots and current meanings religious and secular influences the values addressed including human dignity caring protection of the least well off the common good cost containment responsibility and excellence are then applied to the health care system back to reform is a thoughtful reminder of the moral dimension of health care and health care reform it builds a strong argument for a limited and well defined yet leading role for government if health care change is expected to amount to health care reform

although no other country in the world allocates as large a proportion of its gdp to health care as the united states it is clear that the most basic health needs of many americans are not being met health care reform in the nineties presents an extensive study of this topical issue
