d day veteran international film publicist and executive and production associate  
charles jerry juroe met knew or worked with almost anyone who was anyone from cecil b demille and alfred hitchcock to mary pickford marilyn monroe bob hope katherine hepburn brando and the beatles he made his

name working on the iconic james bond films running publicity and advertising for both united artists and legendary producers albert cubby broccoli and harry saltzman s eon productions from dr no to goldeneye juroe traveled the globe with sean connery roger moore timothy dalton and pierce brosnan his entertaining memoir reads like insider history of hollywood

this new book by the well known anthropologists jean and john l comaroff explores the global preoccupation with criminality in the early twenty first century a preoccupation strikingly disproportionate in most places and for most people to the risks posed by lawlessness to the conduct of everyday life ours in an epoch in which law making law breaking and law enforcement are ever more critical registers in which societies construct contest and confront truths about themselves an epoch in which criminology broadly defined has displaced sociology as the privileged means by which the social world knows itself they also argue that as the result of a tectonic shift in the triangulation of capital the state and governance the meanings attached to crime and with it the nature of policing have undergone significant change also that there has been a palpable muddying of the lines between legality and illegality between corruption and conventional business even between crime and policing which exist nowadays in ever greater hyphenated complicity thinking through crime and policing is therefore an excursion into the contemporary order of things or rather into the metaphysic of disorder that saturates the late modern world indeed has become its leitmotif it is also a meditation on sovereignty and citizenship on civility class and race on the law and its transgression on the political economy of representation

sontag and the camp aesthetic advancing new perspectives marks 50 years of writing and cultural production on the phenomenon of camp since susan sontag s 1964 cornerstone essay notes on camp it provides cutting edge theory and understanding on ways to read and interpret camp through a collection of essays from historical theoretical and cultural perspectives it includes varied subject areas including camp icons stylistics periods and important and representative texts from television film and literature these essays create a scholarly conversation that understands camp as not only signifier or aesthetic but also a language mode and style that goes beyond its initial linguistic and semiotic guise the contributors representing a diverse group of established and rising scholars

explore camp as a largely queer genre that includes varying modes of understanding of desire and of the self outside a hegemonic model of heteronormativity

this volume features in depth oral interviews with eleven incarcerated women each of whom offers a narrative of her life and her reading experiences within prison walls the women share powerful stories about their complex and diverse efforts to negotiate difficult relationships exercise agency in restrictive circumstances and find meaning and beauty in the midst of pain their shared emphases on abuse poverty addiction and mental illness illuminate the pathways that lead many women to prison and suggest possibilities for addressing the profound social problems that fuel crime framing the narratives within an analytic introduction and reflective afterword megan sweeney highlights the crucial intellectual work that the incarcerated women perform despite myriad restrictions on reading and education in u s prisons these women use the limited reading materials available to them as sources of guidance and support and as tools for self reflection and self education through their creative engagements with books the women learn to reframe their own life stories situate their experiences in relation to broader social patterns deepen their understanding of others experiment with new ways of being and maintain a sense of connection with their fellow citizens on both sides of the prison fence

far more than a building of brick and mortar the prison relies upon gruesome stories circulated as commercial media to legitimize its institutional reproduction perhaps no medium has done more in recent years to both produce and intervene in such stories than television this unapologetically interdisciplinary work presents a series of investigations into some of the most influential and innovative treatments of american mass incarceration to hit our screens in recent decades looking beyond celebratory accolades lee a flamand argues that we cannot understand the eagerness of influential programs such as oz the wire orange is the new black 13th and queen sugar to integrate the sensibilities of prison ethnography urban sociology identity politics activism and even black feminist theory into their narrative structures without understanding how such critical postures relate to the cultural aspirations and commercial goals of a quickly evolving tv industry and the most deeply ingrained continuities of american storytelling practices

in stark and compelling prose thomas w jones tells his story as a campus revolutionary who led an armed revolt at cornell university in 1969 and then altered his course over the next fifty years to become a powerful leader in the financial industry including high level positions at john hancock tiaa cref and citigroup as wall street plunged into its darkest hour from willard straight to wall street provides a front row seat to the author's triumphs and struggles as he was twice investigated by the sec and emerged unscathed his searing perspective as an african american navigating a world dominated by whites reveals a father a husband a trusted colleague a cornellian and a business leader who confronts life with an unwavering resolve that defies cliché and offers a unique perspective on the

issues of race in america today the book begins on the steps of willard straight hall where jones and his classmates staged an occupation for two days that demanded a black studies curriculum at cornell the straight takeover resulted in the resignation of cornell president james perkins with whom jones reconciled years later jones witnessed the destruction of the world trade center on 9 11 from his office at ground zero and then observed first hand the wave of scandals that swept the banking industry over the next decade from willard straight to wall street reveals one of the most interesting american stories of the last fifty years

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
