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this report from the education committee looks at the administration of examinations for 15 19 year olds in england the

committee expresses serious concerns about incentives in the exam system and about competition on syllabus content incentives in the system should be changed so the downward pressure through the competition of exam boards is mitigated the committee considers a number of options to change incentives including i a single board this offers a simpler system with no risk of competition but the committee believes the cost risk and disruption outweigh the benefits ii franchising of subjects to exam boards this removes syllabus competition but again has downsides 3 or the current system of multiple boards the committee sees no benefit in competition on syllabus content but the setting and marking of exams and associated administration if properly regulated could generate incentives and drive quality up offering value for money to schools and colleges the committee also recommends the development of national syllabuses accredited by ofqual the syllabuses would be developed by exam boards in conjunction with learned bodies and employer organisations and could therefore retain the benefits of competition on quality and the incentive for exam boards to innovate

this book shares the goal of the classic text how to lie with statistics namely preventing and correcting statistical misconceptions that are common among practitioners though its focus is on the educational context it illustrates and discusses the essentials of educational statistics that will help educational practitioners to do this part of their job properly i e without making conceptual mistakes the examples are cast in the school classroom contexts based on realistic rather than theoretical examples the strongest aspect of the work or author's view is that the author can put himself in the shoes of teachers and make the work a very practical guide for teachers and school leaders as a very experienced educator and researcher the author knows very well about the knowledge skills that are essential for the professional development of teachers he is able to explain the statistical and measurement concepts in plain language and with examples that are highly relevant to the target audience in addition the author also conveyed an important message to the target audience throughout the work by pointing out the mistakes and misunderstandings of the interpretation of test scores and measurement design the author reminds the audience about the importance of proper use of tests and test scores when teachers and school leaders make any education decisions which has much implication on the professional integrity of teachers and school leaders dr joyce kwan the education university of hong kong hong kong this book covers all the statistical tools for analyzing educational data and provides examples to explain the ideas chapters 10 17 are practical data analysis in educational data that helps readers have a better understanding of the procedure to analyze the data dr alpha

the book is generally written in a humorous tone but there are poignant moments in the book where the narration takes on a more serious or sad tone where they are needed the book is about the growing up years of a boy called ijan who grew up in a fast developing singapore in the 1970s and 1980s in two different villages or kampung as they are called in singapore although the concept or notion of a kampung is now gone in the developed city of singapore the book invites the readers to take a journey back to a historical singapore as a backdrop ingrained in the ways of the village ijan the kampung boy had also attended schools which were very structured and the schools were where his parents were teachers as a kampung boy ijan was accustomed to his roaming ways and as a teacher s son he was expected to behave this was further compounded where it seemed ijan s dna had been hardwired with the characteristics of what was known in the village as a pusar dua anomaly he was born with two hair whirls at the back of his head this led to a somewhat disorderly hair disposition for ijan but more significantly the villagers believed this anomaly brought with it certain traits to the afflicted boy it was believed that a pusar dua boy would be a maverick of sorts hyperactive and stubborn to say the least he was also believed to be blessed with a very endearing character especially to animals the interesting contrast in environment character and expectations are the themes that carry the narration in this book with ijan as the protagonist

this book examines connections between policy contexts school experiences and everyday activities of children growing up in the global city of singapore in particular it explores how singapore children s everyday experiences inside and outside of school shape their orientations towards educational success alongside an analysis of school life and educational policies it also considers children s out of school activities including leisure homework and enrichment activities and connections between these and their school based activities the book draws on empirical data from primary 4 classes in two singapore schools in the form of student completed surveys classroom ethnographies student responses to a learning dialogues activity and a re enactment of one child s out of school life as well as curriculum and policy analysis it provides readers

with an in depth understanding of singapore primary 4 children s experiences inside and outside of school including the structure of timetables and pedagogical approaches encountered in school lessons children s enjoyment of activities inside and outside of school children s engagement and wellbeing at school and the impact of singapore s educational policies on children s learning experiences moving beyond a simplistic focus on singapore children s academic performance in international high stakes testing the book offers a comprehensive exploration of their lives inside and outside of school this holistic approach is unique in the singapore context and contributes to a greater understanding of children s everyday lives in the city
