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when the first europeans arrived in the hawaiian islands in 1778 the volcano goddess pele was the central deity of a complex religion in the volcano districts of hawai i island while native hawaiians were quickly converted to christianity pele remained remarkably relevant as a deity this book is a critical biography of the volcano goddess as well as a history of her religion topics covered include the ongoing belief in pele her popular manifestations her ceremonies her new cultural roles and her current status in hawai i

a comprehensive and readable account of the history of hawai i presented in three chronological units unit 1 pre contact to 1900 unit 2 1900 1945 unit 3 1945 to the present each unit contains chapters treating political economic social and land history in the context of events in the united states and the pacific region the student book features primary documents political cartoons stories and poems graphs a glossary maps and timelines the activities writing assignments oral presentations and simulations foster critical thinking

a thorough treatment of the many plant and animal species found in hawai i

this edition of the 9th grade textbook modern hawaiian history has been updated to include the years from 1994 to 2004 the new material features discussion provoking commentary on sovereignty and other contemporary issues and color photos have been added throughout

jan ken po ai kono sho junk an a po i canna show these words to a simple child s game brought from japan and made local the property of all of hawaii s people symbolize the cultural transformation experienced by hawaii s japanese it is the story of this experience that dennis ogawa tells so well here

the author interweaves her own memories of growing up in honolulu in the 1950s and 60s with a chronicle of hawaii s two hundred year encounter with the west offering a celebration of the myth culture landscape and music of kauai and revealing the rich polynesians traditions that have shaped the modern island state

the story of hawaii illustrated edition offers a rich tapestry of literary styles and

hawaiian legends figure greatly in the image of tropical paradise that has come to represent hawai i in popular imagination but what are we buying into when we read these stories as texts in english language translations this is the question that cristina bacchilega poses in her examination of how stories labeled as hawaiian legends have been adapted to produce a legendary hawai i primarily for non hawaiian readers or other audiences with an understanding of tradition that foregrounds history and change bacchilega examines how

following the 1898 annexation of hawai i by the united states the publication of hawaiian legends in english delegitimized indigenous narratives and traditions and at the same time constructed them as representative of hawaiian culture hawaiian mo'olelo were translated in popular and scholarly english language publications to market a new cultural product a space constructed primarily for euro americans as something simultaneously exotic and primitive and beautiful and welcoming to analyze this representation of hawaiian traditions place and genre bacchilega focuses on translation across languages cultures and media on photography as the technology that contributed to the visual formation of a westernized image of hawai i and on tourism as determining postannexation economic and ideological machinery in a book with interdisciplinary appeal bacchilega demonstrates both how the myth of legendary hawai i emerged and how this vision can be unmade and reimagined

in 1893 a small group of white planters and missionary descendants backed by the united states overthrew the kingdom of hawai i and established a government modeled on the jim crow south in nation within tom coffman tells the complex history of the unsuccessful efforts of deposed hawaiian queen lili'uokalani and her subjects to resist annexation which eventually came in 1898 coffman describes native hawaiian political activism the queen's visits to washington d c to lobby for independence and her imprisonment along with hundreds of others after their aborted armed insurrection exposing the myths that fueled the narrative that native hawaiians willingly relinquished their nation coffman shows how americans such as theodore roosevelt conspired to extinguish hawai i's sovereignty in the service of expanding the united states growing empire

first published in 1987 the cartographic history of hawaii began with the arrival of explorer and chartmaker captain james cook in 1778 between then and the mid 19th century visitors to hawaii produced a rich assortment of charts and maps depicting the shores harbors towns and volcanoes of the various islands this volume traces the story of the mapping of hawaii during the pivotal years in which the indigenous society was radically transformed by the peoples and ideas imported from the west a major segment of the early mapping of hawaii it examines the contribution of american missionaries in mapping hawaii mostly produced at the seminary school at lahainaluna maui these maps introduced geographical education into the hawaiian school system lahainaluna graduate s p kalama produced a landmark map of the islands in 1838 one of the most significant maps in hawaiian history nearly one hundred maps views portraits and illustrations are reproduced here included are many charts and harbor plans produced by james cook william bligh george vancouver otto von kotzebue urey lisiansky jean francois de la pérouse louis duperrey and charles wilkes these charts document the early geography of honolulu lahaina hilo and kailua as well as many bays and harbors in the islands

in the early 1800s thousands of american and european traders arrived in hawaii to lay in supplies for the long trip east or to take on hawaiian sandalwood which commanded a high price in china in response to this developing global economy in the pacific russia expanded its trading outposts as far as western kauai and together with kauai chiefs began planning the construction of fort elisabeth in waimea in 1816 a year later the structure was abandoned by the russians but as peter mills argues convincingly a long and significant history of the fort remains to be told even after its russian one had ended seeking to redress the imbalance that exists between the colonized and the colonizers in pacific historiography mills examines the fort and its place in the history of kauai under paramount chief kaumuali'i and in relation to the expanding kingdom of kamehameha and his successors his work exposes how hawaiians have been ignored in their own history and challenges commonly held assumptions such as kamehameha's unification of the islands in 1810 and the victimization of kaumuali'i by representatives of the russian american company using hundreds of firsthand accounts in combination with field archaeology mills shows that the fort was originally built and used by hawaiians as a heiau ritual temple after the russians departure hawaiians continued to use the fort but in ways that reflected an ongoing transformation of cultural values provoked by contact with outsiders and the development of multiethnic communities in waimea and other port settlements throughout the hawaiian chain hawaii's russian adventure is an original look at a significant chapter in the history of hawaii it overturns many popular myths and perceptions about the fort at waimea and about european and hawaiian interaction in the first half of the nineteenth century while delving into some of the central issues in historical anthropology colonialism and the development of global networks

this quirky brilliant book gives the reader the thrill of cultural history done well okihiro undertakes a conventional topic in a jarring way avoiding the assumption of set boundaries of nations and human societies henry yu author of thinking orientals migration contact and exoticism in modern america this beautifully written book integrates the history of hawaii into that of the u s better than any other i have ever read patricia seed author of american pentimento the invention of indians and the pursuit of riches

in 1907 hawaii's fledgling college of agriculture and mechanical arts boasting an enrollment of five students and a staff of twelve opened in a rented house on young street the hastily improvised college and the university into which it grew owed its existence to the initiative of native hawaiian legislators the advocacy of a caucasian newspaper editor the petition of an asian american bank cashier and the energies of a president and faculty recruited from cornell university in

distant ithaca new york today nearly a century later some 50 000 students are enrolled yearly at ten campuses in a unique system of community colleges and professional schools malamalama a history of the university of hawai i documents the many contributions the university has made over the decades to culture and education in the islands from its start the university rejected the racial stereotyping and prejudice common in territorial hawai i thus fostering an ease of association among students of diverse backgrounds and providing through student government and campus societies a venue where future political leaders of the islands could hone their skills the story of how the university of hawai i grew from a regional undergraduate college to an internationally recognized graduate and research university weathering repeated crises along the way is told by emeritus professors kamins and potter in part i they highlight the university s relationship with the legislature the actions and personalities of its very different presidents and the effects of social upheaval and changing budgets on an evolving institution three alumni provide personal accounts of their years at the university parts ii and iii offer particular histories by knowledgeable contributors including faculty members and administrators of the hilo and west oahu campuses of each fo the seven community colleges and of programs at the manoa campus the strands of history woven together here reveal the university s abiding determination to serve as a cultural link across the pacific and among hawai i s own ethnic communities the university seal dominated by the hawaiian word malamalama light of knowledge depicts a map of the pacific hemisphere celebrating the great diversity of people and cultures that contributed to its founding and the westward reach of its connections

the long awaited third edition of the atlas of hawai i like its predecessor promises to be noteworthy for its completeness meticulous scholarship and colorful format american reference books annual entirely revised in content and design the atlas presents the hawaiian islands in a larger format than before the volume is divided into six sections five of which are abundantly illustrated the first contains detailed reference maps with place names for towns mountains bays harbors and other features geographical descriptions of the state and the main islands and an introduction to hawaiian place names this is followed by four sections on the physical biotic cultural and social aspects of the hawai i environment geology climate the ocean water soils and astronomy are among the topics discussed in the physical environment next the special character of terrestrial and marine ecosystems is described the cultural environment considers the people of hawai i the diversity of the state s cultures is treated in chapters on history and languages as well as archaeology religions and the arts the social environment treats such elements as the economy government and population the sixth and final section comprises a statistical supplement bibliography and gazetteer for the reference maps readers of this new edition will find much new information including topics e g paleoclimate threats to native ecosystems hawaiian sovereignty not discussed in previous editions

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
