research paper postgraduate from the year 2010 in the subject health miscellaneous grade 89 0 the university of western ontario language english abstract the Canada Health Act of 1984 was enacted with the mandate to protect promote and restore the physical and mental well being of residents of Canada and to facilitate reasonable access to health services without financial or other barriers I Hughes Marsh personal communication september 20 2010 the act has five principles public administration comprehensiveness universality portability and accessibility Canadian health care 2004 the CHA principles have assisted in creating the universal glorious and free healthcare system that historically Canadians have been so proud to adopt as part of their identity the 2010 report card however suggests that this attitude is shifting when compared with six other developed nations on the performance of their healthcare systems Canada ranked sixth only placing ahead of the United States the one country that did not have universal healthcare coverage factors measured include quality of care access efficiency equity and health outcomes these findings suggest that Canadians no longer hold the same value for their once glorified universal healthcare system instead

the system receives an abundance of criticism for its inability to provide quality care to all citizens and is thus currently facing many challenges and structural reforms this report will outline three recommendations to improve the current canadian healthcare system going lean in healthcare establishing universal prescription drug coverage programs and incorporating virtual health practices into the canadian healthcare system

health care in canada examines the challenges faced by the canadian health care system a subject of much public debate in this book katherine fierlbeck provides an in depth discussion of how health care decisions are shaped by politics and why there is so much disagreement over how to fix the system many canadians point to health care as a source of national pride others are highly critical of the system's shortcomings and call for major reform yet meaningful debate cannot occur without an understanding of how the system actually operates in this overview fierlbeck outlines the basic framework of the health care system with reference to specific areas such as administration and governance public health human resources drugs and drug policy and mental health she also discusses alternative models in other countries such as britain the united states and france as health care becomes increasingly complex it is crucial that canadians have a solid grasp of the main issues within both the policy and political environments with its balanced and accessible assessment of the main political and theoretical debates health care in canada is an essential guide for anyone with a stake in canada's health system

in response to the need for an objective and value free document this volume was completed following a conference on the canadian health care

system held april 2 1993 on the campus of the university of north texas health sciences center in fort worth the purpose of the conference was to examine the canadian health care system to determine if there were lessons that the u s could learn from the canadian experience as the united states began to undertake its first serious attempt at health care reform since 1965 the conference participants included a diverse group of health care professionals health care policy makers and behavioral and social scientists from the u s and canada

the contributors include prominent specialists in medical military and labour history who provide valuable examinations of such issues as the ideological origins of the welfare state the experience of the canadian army medical corps during the first world war and the development of neuropsychology during the second world war several essays are particularly relevant to contemporary concerns a history of sexually transmitted diseases stds in canada extended to include present day research reveals underlying flaws in the approach to stds taken by canadian governments and the medical establishment the comparative development of health insurance in canada and the united states is discussed in another essay other authors provide a historical and critical review of a key assumption of canadian medicare that universal first dollar coverage will enhance equity in the use of health services and in health status in addition to david naylor who writes the introduction the contributors are robin f badgley jay cassel terry copp raisa b deber colin d howell stephen j kunitz desmond morton eugene vayda samuel wolfe and judith young

heated debate surrounds the topic of health care in both the us and in canada in each country these debates are based in some measure on perceptions about health care in their neighboring country the perceptions held by canadians about the us health care system or those held by americans about canada end up having significant impact on health policy makers in both countries health care policy and opinion in the united states and canada examines these perceptions and their effects using an extensive cross national survey made up of two public opinion polls of over 3 500 respondents from the us and canada the book first develops a rigorous and detailed explanation of the factors that contribute to levels of satisfaction among americans and canadians with respect to their health care systems it then attempts to study the perceptions of canadians vis à vis the us health care system as well as the perception of americans toward canada s health care system the authors examine how these perceptions impact health policy makers and show how the survey results indicate remarkable similarities in the opinions expressed by americans and canadians toward the problems in the health care system heralding perhaps a measure of convergence in the future the authors present how perceptions on health care indicate elements of convergence or divergence between the views of canadians and americans and discuss how these citizen opinions should inform health care policy change in both countries in the near future this book should generate interest in scholars of health care public opinion and comparative studies of social policies and public opinion
