photography in social work and social change provides a comprehensive overview of photography in social work practice and research it features original applied content state of the art case examples and user friendly resources this book introduces readers to the theory methods ethics technical aspects and cultural considerations of photographic practice and research

photography is a ubiquitous part of the public sphere yet we rarely stop to think about the important role that photography plays in helping to define what and who constitute the public photography and its publics brings together leading experts and emerging thinkers to consider the special role of photography in shaping how the public is addressed seen and represented this book responds to a growing body of recent scholarship and flourishing interest in photography s connections to the law society culture politics social change the media and visual ethics photography and its publics presents the public sphere as a vibrant setting where these realms are produced contested and entwined public spheres involve yet exceed the limits of families interest groups identities and communities they are dynamic realms of visibility discussion reflection and possible conflict among strangers of different race age gender social and economic status through studies of photography in south america north america europe and australasia the contributors consider how photography has changed the way we understand and locate the public sphere as they address key themes including the referential and imaginative qualities of photography the transnational circulation of photographs online publics social change violence conflict and the ethics of spectatorship the authors provide new insight into photography s vital role in defining public life

photovoice is a form of participatory action research which has been gaining use and momentum since its inception in the mid 1990s within the enactment of this methodology research participants are invited to document aspects of their lives through photography and then provide written or oral accounts of the images they create designed to situate participants as experts on their lives and their experiences photovoice is a powerful and visceral approach to policy change efforts in this book the photovoice methodology is conceptualized as being comprised of eight steps identification invitation education documentation narration ideation presentation and confirmation each of the steps is explained and expanded upon and insights are drawn from the extant photovoice literature and the author's personal experience in addition attention is given to the history of photography and inquiry theoretical underpinnings and aims of the methodology ethical considerations methods and procedures approaches to data analysis and photovoice exhibitions finally the author has attended to some aspects of photovoice that have historically been left unattended such as building a conceptual framework for a photovoice study viewing the photovoice exhibition as a site of inquiry and thinking through the ways in which ever evolving photography technologies can and should impact decision making throughout the photovoice process while many texts exist that touch on and or address photovoice this is the first book solely dedicated to the entirety of the photovoice methodology from theory to exhibition built as a practical guide readers will find a wealth of information resources and advice within this book

educators students and academic researchers will find this an accessible and compassionate text one that will be a trusted companion while on the photovoice project journey

this book explores the visual representation of masculinity in the work of larry clark using this to prompt a wider conversation about the male body in visual culture and art infamous for his often deeply personal depictions of teenage sexuality subcultures and drug use filmmaker and photographer larry clark also paid close attention to male identity as revealed for the first time in this book it explores the visual representation of masculinity in clark s work revealing how his images of the male body differ from traditional depictions and function not only as objects of spectacle but as spectacular objects in themselves despite being hugely influential there has been a lack of critical attention paid to clark s work following his celebrated photobook tulsa 1971 larry clark and masculinity is a vital contribution to research on clark and visual and photography studies more broadly where it explores the photographer s depiction of the male subject as an object of desire it also expands research in gender and queer studies by examining masculinity as a relational social and intercultural construct in media and society enhancing our understanding of clark s narrative and iconographic practice while simultaneously positioning his work at the centre of the cultural discourse around male subjectivity drawing on an array of clark s work including his films kids and ken park as well as his photographs masculinity and visual culture offers a critical re examination of clark s impact on visual culture and gender representation by positioning clark s work at the centre of the cultural discourse around male subjectivity it enhances our understanding of clark s narrative and iconographic practice as a means of negotiating complex subjectivities

photography is not dying and has not died it has been an ever changing medium since its earliest days and while near obsession with the technology of the day may have defined photography over the course of its existence photography is so much more than hardware and software photography is communication whether chemical or digital tangible or ephemeral in form photography beyond technique is a compelling selection of essays and images that reveal the thoughts and methods of some of today s most exciting contemporary photographers these artists employ alternative historical or handmade processes and techniques and they share a comprehensive view of the medium that the choice of photographic process is just as important as the selection of subjects while other books concentrate solely on process or theory or artistic intent none focus on photography in which these decisions are considered inseparable these 20 essays originally presented at the annual f295 symposium and seminar series provide a thought provoking read for anyone interested in photography as an art form and as a medium through which to view the world includes looking backward seeing forward reframing visual history by robert hirsch mystery memory and narrative by martha casanave finding confidence combining process with purpose by mark osterman photograph material and metaphor by jerry spagnoli

sheona beaumont addresses the untold story of biblical subjects in photography she argues that stories characters and symbols from the bible are found to pervade photographic practices and ideas across the worlds of advertising and reportage the book and the gallery in theoretical discourse and in the words of photographers themselves beaumont engages interpretative tools

from biblical reception studies art history and visual culture criticism in order to present four terms for describing photography s latent spirituality the index the icon the tableau and the vision throughout her journey she includes lively discussion of selected fine art photography dealing with the bible in surprising ways from images by william henry fox talbot in the 19th century to david mach in the 21st far from telling a secular story photography and the conditions of its representations are exposed in theological depth beaumont skillfully interweaves discussion of the images and theology arguing for the dynamic and potent voice of the bible in photography and enriching visual culture criticism with a renewed religious understanding

while it has traditionally been seen as a means of documenting an external reality or expressing an internal feeling photography is now capable of actualizing never existed pasts and never lived experiences thanks to the latest photographic technologies we can now take photos in computer games interpolate them in extended reality platforms or synthesize them via artificial intelligence to account for the most recent shifts in conceptualizations of photography this book proposes the term virtual photography as a binding theoretical framework defined as a photography that retains the efficiency and function of real photography made with or without a camera while manifesting these in an unfamiliar or noncustomary form

in a world where nearly everyone has a cellphone camera capable of zapping countless instant photos it can be a challenge to remember just how special and transformative polaroid photography was in its day and yet there s still something magical for those of us who recall waiting for a polaroid picture to develop writing in the context of two polaroid corporation bankruptcies not to mention the obsolescence of its film peter buse argues that polaroid was and is distinguished by its process by the fact that as the new york times put it in 1947 the camera does the rest polaroid was often dismissed as a toy but buse takes it seriously showing how it encouraged photographic play as well as new forms of artistic practice drawing on unprecedented access to the archives of the polaroid corporation buse reveals polaroid as photography at its most intimate where the photographer photograph and subject sit in close proximity in both time and space making polaroid not only the perfect party camera but also the tool for frankly salacious pictures taking along the way buse tells the story of the polaroid corporation and its ultimately doomed hard copy wager against the rising tide of digital imaging technology he explores the continuities and the differences between polaroid and digital reflecting on what polaroid can tell us about how we snap photos today richly illustrated the camera does the rest will delight historians art critics analog fanatics photographers and all those who miss the thrill of waiting to see what develops

the ubiquity of digital images has profoundly changed the responsibilities and capabilities of anyone and everyone who uses them thanks to a range of innovations from the convergence of moving and still image in the latest dslr cameras to the growing potential of interactive and online photographic work the lens and screen have emerged as central tools for many artists vision anew brings together a diverse selection of texts by practitioners critics and scholars to explore the evolving nature of the lens based arts presenting essays on photography and the moving image

alongside engaging interviews with artists and filmmakers vision anew offers an inspired assessment of the medium s ongoing importance in the digital era contributors include ai weiwei gerry badger david campany lev manovich christian marclay lászl moholy nagy walter murch trevor paglen pipilotti rist shelly silver rebecca solnit and alec soth among others this vital collection is essential reading for artists educators scholars critics and curators and anyone who is passionate about the lens based arts

with a focus on socially engaged art practices in the twenty first century this book explores how artists use their creative practices to raise consciousness form communities create change and bring forth social impact through new technologies and digital practices suzanne lacy s foreword and section introduction authors anne balsamo harrell fletcher natalie loveless karen moss and stephanie rothenberg present twenty five in depth case studies by established and emerging contemporary artists including kim abeles christopher blay joseph delappe mary beth heffernan chris johnson rebekah modrak praba pilar tabita rezaire sylvain souklaye and collaborators victoria vesna and siddharth ramakrishnan artists offer firsthand insight into how they activate methods used in socially engaged art projects from the twentieth century and incorporated new technologies to create twenty first century socially engaged digital art practices works highlighted in this book span collaborative image making immersive experiences telematic art time machines artificial intelligence and physical computing these reflective case studies reveal how the artists collaborate with participants and communities and have found ways to expand transform reimagine and create new platforms for meaningful exchange in both physical and virtual spaces an invaluable resource for students and scholars of art technology and new media as well as artists interested in exploring these intersections

in the decades leading up to the civil war abolitionists crafted a variety of visual messages about the plight of enslaved people portraying the violence familial separation and dehumanization that they faced in response proslavery southerners attempted to counter these messages either through idealization or outright erasure of enslaved life in hidden in plain sight concealing enslavement in american visual culture rachel stephens addresses an enormous body of material by tracing themes of concealment and silence through paintings photographs and ephemera connecting long overlooked artworks with both the abolitionist materials to which they were responding and archival research across a range of southern historical narratives stephens begins her fascinating study with an examination of the ways that slavery was visually idealized and defended in antebellum art she then explores the tyranny especially that depicted in art enacted by supporters of enslavement introduces a range of ways that artwork depicting slavery was tangibly concealed considers photographs of enslaved female caretakers with the white children they reared and investigates a printmaker s confidential work in support of the confederacy finally she delves into an especially pernicious group of proslavery artists in richmond virginia reading visual culture as a key element of the antebellum battle over slavery hidden in plain sight complicates the existing narratives of american art and history

the awareness of light as both a concept and a phenomenon existed long before it became a

matter of scientific interest this volume investigates the many ways in which light has been conceptualized throughout history employing different methodological approaches derived from various disciplines in the humanities the essays gathered here situate the concept of light within discourses on gender religion intellectual life politics art and digital culture through diverse perspectives light is defined in some cases synchronically as a physical phenomenon a visual tool and a philosophic idea this book combines the fields of intellectual studies religion literature and visual culture to explore the complexities of conceptual paradigms that represent various manifestations of the idea of light through original readings the contributing authors present a range of scholarly perspectives offering new interpretations of the idea of light and its history within the humanities

those born since the digital revolution seem to have the hardest time re imagining the role of photography in the world today thinking of photography as a visual language is the approach this book adopts to addresses this challenge considering photography in this way develops the metaphor of learning a language when attempting to explain what photography can be and what it can give a student in transferable creative and life skills this begins with challenging the pre conception that successful photography is defined by the successful single image or the good photograph the book emphasises the central role of narrative and visual storytelling through a technique of photosketching to develop the building blocks of visual creativity and ultimately to craft successful bodies of photographic work new ways of seeing explains how to both learn and teach photography as a visual language appropriate for both professionals and students working today

even as the media environment has changed dramatically in recent years one thing at least remains true photographs are everywhere from professional news photos to smartphone selfies images have become part of the fabric of modern life and that may be the problem even as photography bears witness it provokes anxieties about fraudulent representation even as it evokes compassion it prompts anxieties about excessive exposure parents and pundits alike worry about the unprecedented media saturation that transforms society into an image world and yet a great news photo can still stop us in our tracks and the ever expanding photographic archive documents an era of continuous change by confronting these conflicted reactions to photography robert hariman and john louis lucaites make the case for a fundamental shift in understanding photography and public culture in place of suspicions about the medium s capacity for distraction deception and manipulation they suggest how it can provide resources for democratic communication and thoughtful reflection about contemporary social problems the key to living well in the image world is to unlock photography from viewing habits that inhibit robust civic spectatorship through insightful interpretations of dozens of news images the public image reveals how the artistry of the still image can inform challenge and guide reflection regarding endemic violence environmental degradation income inequity and other chronic problems that will define the twenty first century by shifting from conventional suspicions to a renewed encounter with the image we are challenged to see more deeply on behalf of a richer life for all and to acknowledge our obligations as spectators who are crucially also citizens

in soldier snapshots jay mechling explores how american men socially construct their performance of masculinity in everyday life in all male friendship groups during their service in the military the evidence mechling analyzes is a collection of vernacular photographs snapshots of and by american soldiers sailors marines and aviators since almost all of the snapshots are photographs taken of men by other men this book offers a unique view into the social construction performance and repair of american masculinity mechling guides the reader from the snapshots to ideas about the everyday lives of male soldiers to ideas about the lives of men in groups to ideas about american culture in his introduction mechling offers his thoughts about how to undertake the interdisciplinary study of american culture he draws from history folklore anthropology sociology rhetoric psychology gender and sexuality studies ethnic studies popular culture studies and visual studies to reveal the intricacies of how men use their folk practices in an all male group to manage the paradoxes of their friendship and comradeship under sometimes stressful conditions soldier snapshots begins with a brief history of war photography and establishes the nature of vernacular photography the snapshot this is followed by a jargon free discussion of the key ideas about masculinity and the vernacular practices of men in groups exploring male friendship the important role of play in men s relationships and the ways animal buddies adopted by male friendship groups actually tell us even more about male friendship and issues of trust in the final section mechling s careful analysis reveals how the men employ different folk practices including rough and tumble playfighting building human pyramids bathing naked in public cross dressing hazing and gallows humor in order to manage their relationships regardless of the man's sexual orientation and sexual identity the strong heterosexual norm in the military means that the men must find ways to understand and even enact or perform their feelings of bonding while still defining those feelings and acts as heterosexual

this companion provides an authoritative source for scholars and students of the nascent field of media geography while it has deep roots in the wider discipline the consolidation of media geography has started only in the past decade with the creation of media geography s first dedicated journal aether as well as the publication of the sub discipline s first textbook however at present there is no other work which provides a comprehensive overview and grounding by indicating the sub discipline s evolution and hinting at its future this volume not only serves to encapsulate what geographers have learned about media but also will help to set the agenda for expanding this type of interdisciplinary exploration the contributors leading scholars in this field including stuart aitken deborah dixon derek mccormack barney warf and matthew zook not only review the existing literature within the remit of their chapters but also articulate arguments about where the future might take media geography scholarship the volume is not simply a collection of individual offerings but has afforded an opportunity to exchange ideas about media geography with contributors making connections between chapters and developing common themes

whether inscribed in physical media projected on surfaces or viewed on digital devices we find ourselves constantly inundated with streams of visual data yet we know surprisingly little about how these images are made especially in journalistic contexts where representations are long lasting and where repercussions can be dramatic to see and be seen considers some of the

ideological aesthetic pragmatic institutional cultural commercial environmental and psychological forces that consciously or otherwise shape the production of news images and subsequently influence their reception t j thomson examines the expectations experiences and reactions of those depicted by visual journalists and considers other relevant factors how do everyday people perceive cameras and those who operate them how are identities visually represented and presented to different audiences and how does the physical and the socially constructed environment shape those depictions the results of thomson s research provide one of the first empirical and real time glimpses into the experience of being in front of a journalist s lens to see and be seen enables us to understand the stories behind images by considering the environment in which such images are made the exchange if one occurred between the camera wielding observer and the observed the identities of both parties and how they react to the representations that are created to see and be seen is the winner of the national communication association s 2020 diane s hope book of the year award nca reviewers called the book a signature achievement in understanding the process of media production and the ethics of photojournalism

from the ritual object which functions as a substitute for the dead thus acting as a medium for communicating with the other world to the representation of death violence and suffering in media or the use of online social networks as spaces of commemoration media of various kinds are central to the communication and performance of death related socio cultural practices of individuals groups and societies this second volume of the studies in death materiality and time series explores the ways in which such practices are subject to re mediation that is to say processes by which well known practices are re presented in new ways through various media formats presenting rich interdisciplinary new empirical case studies and fieldwork from the us and europe asia the middle east australasia and africa mediating and remediating death shows how different media forms contribute to the shaping and transformation of various forms of death and commemoration whether in terms of their range and distribution their relation to users or their roles in creating and maintaining communities with its broad and multi faceted focus on how uses of media can redraw the traditional boundaries of death related practices and create new cultural realities this book will appeal to scholars across the social sciences and humanities with interests in ritual and commemoration practices the sociology and anthropology of death and dying and cultural and media studies

the weight of constant digital connection is the default condition of working life home life and everyday personal life driving us to engage more with platforms than with people a new state of constant disconnection that we cannot escape overflowing email inboxes deluges of mobile phone notifications and torrents of social media posts the flow of communication in its abundance is today s individualized interface for interpersonal and professional practices communication technologies and their use are both the needle and the thread of the wider social tapestry of everyday contemporary life this ever changing communication environment is where the neoliberal economic policies of the west and the commercial imperatives of the platform and data mining industries meet it is where the contradictions they produce can be felt day to day by citizens turned users how does it feel to live at the pressure points of intersecting economic realities and why does it

matter drawing on extensive sociological research burchell examines how individuals try to manage connection as participation in everyday life and how on a larger scale the ever expanding knowledge communication and data driven economies depend on the very pressures that result from our disparate communication needs with so much time spent managing the pressures of our communication environment we often overlook the way media technologies produce systemic tensions that are reshaping how we interact with each other and what we understand to be social connection today

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
