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in covering the subject of chinese medicine this book addresses topics such as oracle bones the treatment of women fertility and childbirth nutrition acupuncture and qi as well as examining chinese medicine as practiced globally in places such as africa australia vietnam korea and the united states

there is a dividing line between the science based med of the west the more holistic people oriented traditions of the east this book examines the idea of integration looking at the diverse traditions of healing all over the world tracing their common roots showing how eastern traditions western science are coming together again to the benefit of humanity discusses how therapeutic practices changed developed over time the type of role that the healer fulfilled in other cultures in times gone by describes the evolution from the quasi religious rituals of the tribal shaman to today s high tech computer based diagnostic techniques numerous color b w photos drawings

whether it is the binding of shattered bones or the creation of herbal remedies human agency is a central feature of the healing process both archaeological and anthropological research has contributed much to our understanding of the performative aspects of medicine the papers contained in this volume based on a session conducted at the 2010 theoretical archaeology conference take a multi disciplinary approach to the topic addressing such issues as the cultural conception of disease the impact of gender roles on healing strategies the possibilities afforded by syncretism the relationship between material culture and the body and the role played by the active agency of the sick

currently and for centuries past sickness has been understood to be primarily the physical result of bodily disease yet this definition of illness is out of date and untrue to life at a time when chronic illness and the problems of disability and aging are increasingly common when persons are sick it pervades their whole being the nature of healing is based on a different

definition of sickness one that recognizes persons as sick when they cannot achieve their goals and purposes because of impairments of function ranging from the molecular to the spiritual which they believe to fall under the scope of medicine such impairments may result from disease but certainly not all as the sick person has increasingly become the focus of medicine there have been repeated but mostly failed attempts to achieve both technological and humanistic goals in caring for patients this approach is flawed because there is only one ultimate goal the well being of the patient whether it involves the personal action of the clinician or the use of technology everything done toward the goal of well being is part of the healing enterprise in this book eric cassell explores what sickness is what persons are and how to understand function and its impairments he explains healing skills and actions as well as the nature of healing for sick and suffering patients this book concludes with a discussion of the moral basis of the relationship between patient and healer as well as the goals of healing

medical healing implies knowledge of the assumptions that underlie our understanding of health and concomitantly how we define well being and its opposites illness and disease today health health care business wellness recreation and medicine especially research driven scientific medicine have become separate entities with different institutions budgets marketing philosophies and corporate cultures furthermore healing is individual and subjective yet at the same time also culturally determined the present volume brings together papers on these topics in an unique interdisciplinary approach the book provides an ethical framework for healthcare from a political perspective it discusses definitions of the terminology of healing and health and their ethical and medical implications including their historical contexts a separate section expands the theme of the cultural constructedness of healing by the concepts of traditional chinese medicine and homeopathy modern medicine has a strong focus on acute care which urgently needs to place greater emphasis on preventive medicine including the crucial importance of social factors on health and on the emergence of public health the point of view of business concepts their potential and limitations are by no means neglected and the legal ramifications of genetic research and innovative medical strategies with regard to some of our most foundational notions are discussed

modern medicine is one of the most successful branches of science with a distinguished history of conquering many of the twentieth century's deadliest diseases yet today people are turning in record numbers to alternative therapies that have little or no scientific basis herbalists homeopaths crystal therapists chiropractors acupuncturists and countless other unconventional practitioners are enjoying thriving businesses what accounts for this flight from reason in the face of hard evidence that medical doctors do a better job of treating disease and alleviating suffering than their alternative counterparts in magic or medicine dr robert buckman and karl sabbagh offer a response to this question by critically evaluating both alternative and conventional medical approaches to patient care drawing on some of the earliest written medical sources as well as their own investigations into current alternative therapies the authors argue that healing has always been partly the science of clinical treatment medicine and partly an art magic medicine may make the patient get well but often it is magic that makes the patient feel well with all the pressures under which they work modern medical doctors often neglect the magic in their dealings with patients alternative therapists however frequently offer nothing but magic buckman and sabbagh look closely at the claims made for both medical science and alternative treatments and discover a gap between the promises and

the reality of each approach magic or medicine is a fascinating exploration of healing in the late twentieth century and vital reading for anyone concerned about the effective delivery of health care
