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based on a year long micro ethnography of a nursery school this book presents a unique approach to childhood socialization by focusing directly upon the social interactive and communicative processes that make up the world of young children it contains micro sociolinguistic analyses of videotaped peer interactive episodes which are the basis of explanations of children s development and use of social concepts such as status role norms and friendship stable features of peer culture in the nursery school are identified and the importance of interpreting children s behavior from their own perspective is demonstrated the author also addresses the implications of the findings for early childhood education

the provision of many amusing examples from corsaro s own research experience with children make his book a thoroughly enjoyable read as well as a valuable critical sociological analysis of childhood sociology the sociology of childhood is the second edition of a text that has been universally acclaimed as the best book on the subject available today it is the only text that

thoroughly covers children and childhood from a sociological perspective the second edition retains the same quality coverage of social theories of childhood the consideration of children and childhood in historical and cultural perspective children's peer cultures from preschool through preadolescence and the social problems of children the book has been updated to include new research information and discussions on the latest social indicators regarding children in the united states and around the world key features new chapter on up to date methods of research for studying children new chapters on theory cultural change and children's peer cultures new section on children's rights including a description and discussion of the united nations convention on the rights of the child updated chapter on the future of childhood addresses current policy debates and changing demographics related to children in today's societies contains many examples of children's actual play and behavior provides photographs and charts that capture the complexity and diversity of children's lives the sociology of childhood is highly recommended for use as the core text in courses on the sociology of children and childhood as well as for parents teachers and other adults interested in the social lives and development of children it can also be used in early education child development and child psychology courses and as a supplemental text in the area of family studies william a corsaro is the robert h shaffer class of 1967 endowed professor of sociology at indiana university bloomington where he teaches courses on the sociology of childhood childhood in contemporary society and ethnographic research methods corsaro is the author of *friendship and peer culture in the early years* 1985 and *we're friends right inside kids culture* 2003 he was a fulbright senior research fellow in bologna italy in 1983-84 and a fulbright senior specialist fellow in trondheim norway in 2003 his research has been featured on npr the bbc in london and in the new yorker

this volume demonstrates how the ethnographic approach to research demanded by a literacy as social practice perspective can generate fresh insights into what happens when young children engage with schooled literacy tasks researching early childhood literacy in the classroom argues that the lived experience of young children encountering formal schooled literacy curricula should be the foremost consideration in educational reforms intended to improve rates of literacy acquisition in schools to make this argument the author suspends traditional concerns with learning and progress to concentrate on practice and meaning in a careful analysis of key classroom incidents the author concludes that such insights suggest a need for re-considering the assumptions upon which educational policy rests this book will be of great interest to graduate and postgraduate students researchers academics and libraries in the fields of literacy studies teacher education education policy and applied linguistics

childhood studies education sociology history law anthropology and other related areas the child contains more than 500 articles all written by experts in their fields and overseen by a panel of distinguished editors led by anthropologist richard a shweder each entry provides a concise and accessible synopsis of the topic at hand for example the entry adoption begins with a general definition followed by a detailed look at adoption in different cultures and at different times a summary of the associated mental and developmental issues that can arise and an overview of applicable legal and public policy while presenting certain universal facts about children s development from birth through adolescence the entries also address the many worlds of childhood both within the united states and around the globe they consider the ways that in which race ethnicity gender socioeconomic status and cultural traditions of child rearing can affect children s experiences of physical and mental health education and family alongside the topical entries the child includes more than forty imagining each other essays which focus on the particular experiences of children in different cultures in work before play for yucatec maya children for example readers learn of the work responsibilities of some modern day mexican children while in a hindu brahman boy is born again they witness a coming of age ritual in contemporary india compiled by some of the most distinguished child development researchers in the world the child will broaden the current scope of knowledge on children and childhood it is an unparalleled resource for parents social workers researchers educators and others who work with children

this book presents findings from current scientific research in child development highlighting how scientists tackle issues that impact children and their families the authors have integrated examples of diversity throughout the book in the domains of physical psychological and cultural differences gender race ethnicity and social and economic status community and social issues are also covered extensively which help readers to think critically about their world as many readers of this book are pursuing careers as teachers care providers or parents the authors focus the material on these real world applications and demonstrate how theory and research matter for what readers need in their own lives for those involved in the fields of early childhood education
