in academia the effects of the cultural turn have been felt deeply in everyday life tenets from cultural politics have influenced how people behave or regard their options for action such as the reconfiguration of social movements protests and praxis in general many authors writing in this field are known for their scholarship and social activism both of which are arguably guided by principles of cultural politics about the nature of representation and the deployment of power in political discourses the handbook of cultural politics and education is less an attempt to standardize contemporary educational scholarship and more a collection that engages the problems and promises of recent themes in social and cultural thought which require our attention and demand a response in other words it opens

doors to questions rather than convenient answers to difficult educational dilemmas the handbook is part of the appraisal of an opening created by interdisciplinary writings on such themes as representation civil society cultural struggle subjectivity and media within the context of education indeed cultural politics troubles traditional frameworks in search of critical explanations concerning education s place within society the contributions in the collection support this endeavor

this book explores why the educational left in england has failed to develop viable alternatives to the approaches that have dominated educational policy and practice since 1979 at a time when schooling needs an urgent rethink it offers a fresh set of ideas about the past present and future of educational change linking educational developments with wider shifts in economics politics and culture the book draws from debates not just in education but a variety of other disciplines including media studies human geography and criminology though grounded in the context of english schooling this book has implications for the study of educational futures in all advanced western economies

this book introduces central assumptions that govern postmodern and feminist theory offering educators a language to create new ways of conceiving pedagogy and its relationship to social cultural and intellectual life it challenges some of the major categories and practices that have dominated educational theory and practice in the united states and in other countries since the beginning of the twentieth century rejecting the apolitical nature of some postmodern discourses and the separatism characteristic of some versions of cultural feminism the contributors take a political stand rooted in concern with cultural and social justice in so doing these essays represent a linguistic shift regarding how we think about ethics foundationalism difference and culture the selections present a concern with developing a language that is critical of master narratives racism sexism and those technologies of power in schools that subjugate infantilize and oppress students the authors also develop a language of possibility that focuses on analyzing how power can be linked productively to knowledge how teachers can construct classroom social relations based on notions of equity and justice how critical pedagogy can contribute to an identity politics that is grounded in democratic relations and how teachers can develop analyses that enable students to become self reflective actors as they transform themselves and the conditions of their social existence

provides a provocative examination of the interplay between political culture and educational policy the goal is to provide a better understanding of how different countries are responding to the global exchange of policy ideas that includes the standards movement and new public management or accountability in the public sector

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lance d fusarelli examines the relationship between the charter school and voucher issues to what degree does political support for charter schools from a coalition of teacher associations school board groups superintendents and voucher advocates slow or even stop the forces for vouchers or do these coalitions which successfully pushed charter school legislation through the legislature actually fuel the fires of privatization charter schools legislation has enjoyed bipartisan support precisely because the threat of vouchers is so great and contrary to the strategy of voucher opponents the spread of charter school increases rather than alleviates the push for vouchers

a radical departure from previous chronicles of education for people with disabilities this book views special education from a broader perspective its central thesis is that cultural values and expectations play a dominant role in understanding the structure and function of special education while theories of the social construction of disability have been written about in a growing body of research since the 1960s no attempt has been made to create a cross cultural framework this work offers such a framework eight chapters written by educators in each country s educational system cover the following nations china great britain hungary japan iran pakistan united states and zimbabwe historical discussions in each chapter provide a context for current practice an index and illustrations are also included

by including material from literary philosophical and anthropological sources and by selecting readings which consider educational practice both within and beyond formal educational contexts this book broadens the character of sociological inquiry in education the editors bring together material they have found valuable when working with students of education and degrees sociology at all levels many of these articles and extracts are either inaccessible or have not been reprinted the collection should stimulate inquiry about the assumptions underlying current debates on curriculum streaming school organization methods of teaching and preconceived notions of ability toward a sociology of education develops an alternative theoretical approach to and engages in critical dialogue with mainstream sociology and also points to other theoretical and practical probabilities

henry giroux continues his critique of american culture and the way it impinges on the lives of our children this time henry goes further looking at the bush restoration years the attacks of september 11th and the way the world has been transformed for our children and young adults

this book lays bare the ideological and political character of the positivist rationality that has been the primary theoretical underpinning of educational research in the united states these assumptions have expressed themselves in the form and content of curriculum classroom social relations classroom cultural artifacts and the experiences and beliefs of teachers and students have existing radical critiques provided the theoretical building blocks for a new theory of pedagogy the author attempts to move beyond the abstract negative characteristics of many radical critiques which are often based on false dualisms that fail to link structure

and intentionally content and process ideology and hegemony etc he also is critical of the over determined models of socialization and the abstract celebration of subjectivity that underlies much of the false utopianism of many radical perspectives professor giroux begins to lay the theoretical groundwork for developing a radical pedagogy that connects critical theory with the need for social action in the interest of individual freedom and social reconstruction author note henry a giroux is assistant professor of education at boston university he is the co editor of curriculum and instruction alternatives in education and the hidden curriculum and moral education

politics language and culture are three of the most powerful forces affecting education today yet they have been little discussed in relation to systemic school reform the new status quo of urban schools this book looks at their effects through the eyes of teachers administrators and insider outsiders who are actually living reform at the school level in four widely different urban school systems chicago san francisco and oakland california and boston the book also creates a statistical and conceptual picture of urban education and school reform as national phenomena with deep historical roots and offers a composite case study of an urban elementary school undergoing reform the author argues that urban school reform is failing because its basic strategy is misguided and because reform thinking has consciously ignored three essential sources of knowledge about school change strategically efforts for reform have relied heavily on the widespread replication of nationally promoted exemplary programs this approach assumes that local schools lack the knowledge and will to solve their own problems and require prescriptive intervention from national models in fact the exemplary programs approach has yielded very limited success what is needed instead is the creation and long term support of unique local exemplary contexts that combine best practice approaches with local knowledge conditions and resources

michael apple offers a powerful analysis of current debates and a compelling indictment of rightist proposals for change apple presents the causes and effects of further integrating schools into the corporate agenda as well as current calls for a national curriculum and national testing privatization and voucher plans and fundamentalist religious pressures to censor textbooks he demonstrates who will be the winners and losers culturally and economically as the conservative restoration gains in strength bringing with it an even greater restratification of knowledge and students in terms of race class and gender

this book on life politics comprises a collection of interviews and commentaries the notion of life politics covers a number of different meanings within the book most importantly is the way that the genre of interviews helps cover a range of cultural contexts and intellectual milieu part of the life politics represented in this book is built around the belief that if we are to act as public intellectuals in the field of education and culture in the current globalised setting we need to travel this book shows how public intellectual work gets interrogated and implemented in different social and cultural settings

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
