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this review provides a snapshot of the state of art of school feeding programmes in 14 of the 15 caricom member states it provides an overview of the different models of school feeding programmes that currently exist in the caribbean challenges faced and recommendations for improvement among the aspects evaluated include the governance structure nutritional quality of meal served linkages with small farmers for the procurement of products used in the meals involvement of children in school gardens related activities etc the document includes a case study for each of the participating countries namely antigua and barbuda bahamas barbados belize dominica grenada guyana haiti jamaica st kitts and nevis st lucia st vincent and the grenadines suriname and trinidad and tobago for each of these countries an annual net benefit analysis was conducted using information collected in 2017 the aim is that the document can provide preliminary information and recommendations that can be relevant for governments public organizations donors opinion leaders private sectors and others toward strengthening school feeding programmes in the caribbean it was developed with the support of the university of the west indies and the caribbean agro economic society under the leadership of prof carlisle pemberton and dr hazel paterson andrews

compiled by the partnership for child development at imperial college london the world food programme the world bank and the african union s new partnership for africa s development this is the first sourcebook of its kind to document government led school feeding programmes in low and middle income countries it includes a compilation of concise but comprehensive chapters about national programmes in 14 countries from sub saharan africa asia and latin america the sourcebook highlights the trade offs associated with alternative school feeding models and analyses the overarching themes trends and challenges which run across these programmes this sourcebook supports learning and knowledge exchange among countries looking to strengthen and scale up national school feeding programmes the evidence presented here sheds light on identified global good practices which can be employed to improve the quality and effectiveness of programmes that positively impact on millions of children and communities worldwide

school meals are an effective safety net helping to ensure every child has access to education health and nutrition children from vulnerable families are often pulled out of school when more work is needed at home a daily school meal is a strong incentive for families to consistently send their children to school world food programme wfp is now supporting countries in setting up and maintaining sustainable government owned programmes wfp engages in school feeding policy dialogue provides technical assistance and supports knowledge exchange between countries

this guideline outlines the step by step implementation of direct purchases from family farming for school feeding considering the pilot implementation of the sustainable schools model in belize within the framework of mesoamerica hunger free amexcid fao programme the document presents the benefits and challenges of the connection between school feeding and family farming a brief context of food and nutrition policies and programs public procurement mechanisms agriculture and family farming status and the school feeding initiatives in belize as well as general recommendations for the adequate design implementation monitoring and evaluation of procurement from local family farming for the school feeding program component

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food and nutrition security is one of the 17 sustainable development goals enshrined in the 2030 agenda for sustainable development in an attempt to contribute to reaching this objective school feeding programmes are serving meals to over 418 million pre primary primary and secondary schoolchildren around the world the positive experience from a project supported by the food and agriculture organization of the united nations fao in angola honduras and peru that incorporated locally procured fish into home grown school feeding hgsf programmes led to the elaboration of this toolkit this toolkit is designed to support governments project designers managers and practitioners involved in the fishery value chain and school feeding who want to incorporate locally procured safe nutritious and affordable fish and fish products into their existing hgsfs therefore this toolkit is

expected to assist them during the rapid assessment of the situation of the school feeding and fishery sector and the identification of challenges and opportunities present while incorporating fish and fish products into hgsfs to this end this toolkit adopts three main approaches the sustainable food value chain for nutrition to enhance the consideration of nutrition lens in the value chain approach the gender transformative approach to support women fisherfolk in their activities and increase their participation in school feeding programmes and local and inclusive food procurement to connect public demand for food to small scale fisherfolk specifically this toolkit proposes 4 phases and 15 flexible and adaptable tools to sustainably serve fish and fish products at schools

the national home grown school feeding programme nhgsfp was launched in 2016 with an aim to increase school enrolment reducing the incidence of malnutrition especially amongst the poor empowering cooks while supporting local agriculture through small builder farmers thereby stimulating economic growth through the socio economic value chain

this framework fosters the replication and scaling up of home grown school feeding models and the mapping of opportunities for linking such programmes with relevant agricultural development and rural transformation investments

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
