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a personal provocative and boundary breaking volume on the power relations that racialized gendered and sexualized researchers grapple with while conducting activist research fugitive anthropology is a transnational intergenerational engagement that extends feminist theory activist research methodologies and the discipline of anthropology in new directions contributors examine the tensions that arise from conducting politically engaged collaborative research alongside communities in struggle in particular theorizing from the experiences of racialized women queer trans and gender nonconforming researchers across distinct geographies essays contend with the matrices of colonial imperial and patriarchal violence that afflict the researchers and communities with which they seek political alignment articulating an ethnographic practice grounded in black and indigenous political struggles and committed to collective liberation the volume reflects on what it means to navigate violent relations of power systemic inequities and current onslaughts shaping field research and us academia ultimately fugitive anthropology argues that a feminist ethos one that embraces embodied knowledges and fugitive sensibilities forges liberatory spaces that break from dominant masculinist frames of the political and challenge colonial regimes within and beyond the neoliberal university

in our biosocial brains michele lewis underscores culture brain behavior and social problems to advocate for a more inclusive cultural neuroscience traditional neuroscientists to date have not prioritized studying the impact of power bias and injustice on neural processing and the brain's perception of marginalized humans lewis explains current events historical events and scientific studies in our biosocial brains readers will be drawn to the relevancy of brain science to examples of injustices and social bias lewis also argues that incorporating non western african centered psychology is vital to diversifying research questions and diversifying

interpretations of existing brain science because african centered psychology is not rooted in racist classist and exclusionary hegemonic methods lewis argues for attention to marginalized populations regarding the impact of violence disrespect othering slurs environmental injustice health and general disregard on humans brains and behavior using hundreds of peer reviewed studies and original research the author presents scientific studies that are integrated with sociocultural explanations to foster wider understanding of how our sociocultural world shapes our brains and how our brains responses influence how humans perceive and treat one another

a decade after the publication of the first international handbook on the demography of sexuality there have been fundamental shifts in how we measure sexual and gender identities and the breadth of available population level sexuality data the chapters in this second edition of this handbook provide guidance on methodological approaches involved in studying population sexuality as well as insight into the ways that sexuality shapes key demographic outcomes chapters examine how we measure sexual identities and behaviors on surveys sexuality changes across the life course international perspectives on sexual behaviors and identities and the ways that sexual identities shape families labor market experiences and health outcomes despite these developments we still know relatively little about key demographic questions related to fertility and migration for sexual minorities as well as about understudied topics of sexuality that fall outside of risk focused analyses in particular much of our understanding of sexuality has been motivated by controlling the spread of sexually transmitted infections or adolescent pregnancies rather than understanding motivations for sexual interactions such as pleasure accordingly although the research set forth in this book provides insight into existing knowledge of sexual behavior and of sexual minority populations the chapters also point researchers and policymakers toward needed areas of research and data collection

engaging with the voices of students and educators and the work of gilles deleuze and felix guattari eve mayes crafts an account of what voice can and must do in education the book works with the textures tremors and murmurs of voice felt over ten years of ethnographic and participatory research in australian schools from research encounters with students and puppets to school governance council meetings to school reform evaluation processes to students political activism it offers a timely critique of the liberal humanist and late capitalist logics of student voice in educational reform entwined with an affirmation of other possibilities for transversal pedagogical relations in and beyond institutional sites of education

the first comprehensive work to turn a queer eye on the criminal justice system

providing an eye opening study of lgbtq rights and equality drawing on years of research activism and legal advocacy queer in justice is a searing examination of queer experiences as suspects defendants prisoners and survivors of crime the authors unpack queer criminal archetypes from gleeful gay killers and lethal lesbians to disease spreaders and deceptive gender benders to illustrate the punishment of queer expression regardless of whether a crime was ever committed tracing stories from the streets to the bench to behind prison bars the authors prove that the policing of sex and gender both bolsters and reinforces racial and gender inequalities an eye opening study of lgbtq rights and equality queer in justice illuminates and challenges the many ways in which queer lives are criminalized policed and punished

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
