to linguistic form it proposes intimate links between syntactic and semantic structures and argues that the basic elements of any language are not syntactic but syntactic semantic gestalts professor croft puts forward a new approach to syntactic representation and a new model of how language and languages work he covers a wide range of syntactic phenomena illustrating these with examples that show the varied grammatical structures of the world s languages the book will be accessible all linguists at graduate level and beyond

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with exercises based on real language data this volume gives a comprehensive introduction to construction grammar focusing on english

what do speakers of a language have to know and what can they figure out on the basis of that knowledge in order for them to use their language successfully this is the question at the heart of construction grammar an approach to the study of language that views all dimensions of language as equal contributors to shaping linguistic expressions the trademark characteristic of construction grammar is the insight that language is a repertoire of more or less complex patterns constructions that integrate form and meaning this textbook shows how a construction grammar approach can be used to analyse the english language offering explanations for language acquisition variation and change it covers all levels of syntactic description from word formation and inflectional morphology to phrasal and clausal phenomena and information structure constructions each chapter includes exercises and further readings making it an accessible introduction for undergraduate students of linguistics and english language

construction grammar as a framework offers a new perspective on traditional historical questions in diachronic linguistics and language change how do new constructions

arise how should competition in diachronic variation be accounted for how do constructions fall into disuse and how do constructions change in general formally and or semantically and with what implications for the language system as a whole this volume offers a broad introduction to the confluence of construction grammar and historical syntax and also detailed case studies of various instances of syntactic change modeled within construction grammar the volume demonstrates that construction grammar as a theory is particularly well suited for modeling historical changes in morphosyntax and it also documents challenging new phenomena that require a theoretical account within any competing framework of syntactic change

what do speakers of english know in order to produce utterances that other speakers will understand construction grammar explains how knowledge of language is organized in speakers minds the central and radical claim of construction grammar is that linguistic knowledge can be fully described as knowledge of constructions which are defined as symbolic units that connect a linguistic form with meaning the implications of this claim are far reaching in construction grammar not only lexical items but also syntactic patterns are seen as symbolic meaningful units instead of being meaningless structural templates syntactic patterns actively contribute to the overall meaning of an utterance knowledge of language is thought of as a vast repository of interrelated symbolic units and nothing else in addition this book expands on this idea and familiarizes readers with the central concepts of construction grammar as applied to english constructions in the process it explains how the theory of construction grammar relates to issues of language processing language acquisition and language variation and change

this book provides a state of the art collection of constructional research on syntactic structures in german the volume is unique in that it offers an easily accessible yet comprehensive and sophisticated variety of papers moreover various of the papers make explicit connections between grammatical constructions and the concept of valency which has figured quite prominently in germanic linguistics over the past half century

in ten lectures on construction grammar and typology william croft presents a unified theory of linguistic form and meaning that encompasses crosslinguistic diversity verbalization and language change croft begins from construction grammar a theory of syntax in which all syntactic structures are a pairing of form and meaning

constructions are posited as basic syntactic categories are defined by constructions the internal structure of constructions directly link elements of constructions to the meanings they express constructions across languages can be situated in a space of syntactic variation grammar emerges from the verbalization of experience constructions occur in a probability distribution across the conceptual space of meanings these probability distributions evolve leading to grammatical change in language modeled in an evolutionary framework

martin hilpert combines construction grammar and advanced corpus based methodology into a new way of studying language change constructions are generalizations over remembered exemplars of language use these exemplars are stored with all their formal and functional properties yielding constructional generalizations that contain many parameters of variation over time as patterns of language use are changing the generalizations are changing with them this book illustrates the workings of constructional change with three corpus based studies that reveal patterns of change at several levels of linguistic structure ranging from allomorphy to word formation and to syntax taken together the results strongly motivate the use of construction grammar in research on diachronic language change this new perspective has wide ranging consequences for the way historical linguists think about language change it will be of particular interest to linguists working on morpho syntax sociolinguistics and corpus linguistics

the present book provides an introduction to the linguistic model of construction grammar offering a full analysis of the grammar of the english language it covers all levels of morpho syntactic form meaning units including sentence types tense and aspect argument structure phrases idioms word and morphological constructions in line with its usage based approach all constructions are discussed using authentic corpus examples in order to illustrate how constructions can be learnt the book draws on authentic data from child language furthermore corpus analysis is used to show which lexical items typically occur in the slots of constructions and make up their collo profile a key feature of the book is that it develops a systematic method for showing how constructions combine to form actual utterances for this purpose so called construction grids are developed which contain all the constructions that make up even the most complex sentences and show points of overlap between them

the last decade has seen a rise in popularity in construction based approaches to grammar the various approaches within the rubric construction grammar all see language as a network of constructions pairings of form and meaning construction grammar as a kind of cognitive linguistics differs significantly from mainstream

generative grammar as espoused by chomsky and his followers advocates of construction grammar see it as a psychologically plausible theory of human language as such it is capable of providing a principled account of language acquisition language variation and language change research in construction grammar also includes multidisciplinary cognitive studies in psycholinguistics neurolinguistics and computational linguistics the oxford handbook of construction grammar is the first authoritative reference work solely dedicated to construction grammar divided into five sections the book will be an invaluable resource that students and scholars alike can turn to for a comprehensive account of current work on construction grammar its theoretical foundations and its applications to and relationship with other kinds of linguistic enquiry

the chapters in this book show how the different flavors of construction grammar provide illuminating insights into the syntax semantics pragmatics and discourse functional properties of specific phenomena in romance languages such as castilian spanish french romanian and latin from a synchronic as well as a diachronic viewpoint the phenomena surveyed include the role of constructional meanings in novel verb noun compounds in spanish the relevance of lexicalization for a constructionist analysis of complex prepositions in french the complementarity of fragments patterns and constructions as theoretical and explanatory constructs in verb complementation in french latin and spanish non constituent coordination phenomena e g right node raising argument cluster coordination and gapping in romanian and variable type framing in spanish constructions of directed motion in the light of leonard talmy s 2000 typological differences of lexicalization between satellite framed and verb framed languages

drawing on work in linguistics language acquisition and computer science adele e goldberg proposes that grammatical constructions play a central role in the relation between the form and meaning of simple sentences she demonstrates that the syntactic patterns associated with simple sentences are imbued with meaning that the constructions themselves carry meaning independently of the words in a sentence goldberg provides a comprehensive account of the relation between verbs and constructions offering ways to relate verb and constructional meaning and to capture relations among constructions and generalizations over constructions prototypes frame semantics and metaphor are shown to play crucial roles in addition goldberg presents specific analyses of several constructions including the ditransitive and the resultative constructions revealing systematic semantic generalizations through a comparison with other current approaches to argument structure phenomena this book narrows the gap between generative and cognitive theories of language

an accessible but incisive introduction to modern syntax and generative grammar for conlangers and anyone interested in languages or linguistics syntax can be frustrating because there are multiple schools that seem to fight over inessential things i hope i can show you that this is normal for a new field and that it actually makes syntax fun new discoveries are being made and you can participate something that s a lot harder to do in say quantum mechanics the emphasis here is on doing syntax learning how to make and how to evaluate syntactic arguments what s in it an introduction to the chomsky hierarchy a classification of grammars that s used both in linguistics and computer science as well as a comparison to other generative techniques such as markov text generators a tour of chomsky s methods production rules and transformations with overnight stays in the syntactic structures x bar and minimalist stages in his thought a leisurely stroll through interesting bits of syntax the english verbal complex pronouns and other anaphors relative clauses quantifiers and more the emphasis is on doing syntax not just learning rules and drawing trees but learning how syntactic arguments are made an overview of alternatives to chomsky s approach generative syntax cognitive linguistics relational grammars word grammar construction grammar jackendoff s simpler syntax and comrie s universals a chapter on production which asks how real are these grammars do we really have syntactic categories and transformations in the brain or in the genome a chapter on how you can apply all this to your conlangs the syntactic bestiary an annotated list of transformations and constraints which you can think about for conlanging or use to evaluate syntactic theories plus unlike most syntax textbooks this one comes with a set of web toys so you can see the rules in action and write your own it makes the ideas come alive much more than mere diagrams can

this volume brings into focus the conceptual roots of the notion grammatical construction as the theoretical entity that constitutes the backbone of construction grammar a unique grammatical model in which grammatical constructions have the status of elementary building blocks of human language by exploring the analytic potential and applicability of this notion the contributions illustrate some of the fundamental concerns of constructional research these include issues of sentence structure in a model that rejects the autonomy of syntax the contribution of frame semantics in establishing the relationship between syntactic patterning and the lexical meaning of verbs and the challenge of capturing the dynamic and variable nature of grammatical structure in a systematic way all the authors share a commitment to studying grammar in its use which gives the book a rich empirical dimension that draws on authentic data from typologically diverse languages

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the papers in this volume provide a contrastive application of construction grammar by referencing a well described constructional phenomenon in english each paper provides a solid foundation for describing and analyzing its constructional counterpart in another language this approach shows that the semantic description including discourse pragmatic and functional factors of an english construction can be regarded as a first step towards a tertium comparationis that can be employed for comparing and contrasting the formal properties of constructional counterparts in other languages thus the meaning pole of constructions should be regarded as the primary basis for comparisons of constructions across languages the form pole is only secondary this volume shows that constructions are viable descriptive and analytical tools for cross linguistic comparisons that make it possible to capture both language specific idiosyncratic properties as well as cross linguistic generalizations

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
