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blending cultural studies and political analysis this interdisciplinary text both illuminates and moves forward debates over race and its meanings in contemporary society and in educational and social policy

encompassing more than a decade of research around the globe this book shows that cultural capital has far more impact than politics prejudice or genetics on the social and economic fates of minorities nations and civilization

we need scarcely note that the topic of this book is the stuff of headlines around the

world political economic educational military religious and social relations of every variety have a racial or ethnic component one cannot begin to understand the history or contemporary situation of the united states the soviet union china zimbabwe south africa great britain lebanon mexico canada indeed almost any land without careful attention to the influence of cultural and racial divisions preparation of this new edition has brought a strong sense of *deja vu* with regard both to the persistence of old patterns of discrimination even if in new guises and also to the persistence of limited and constraining explanations we have also found however rich new empirical studies new theoretical perspectives and greatly expanded activity and analyses from members of minority groups although this edition is an extensive revision with reference both to the data used and the theoretical approaches examined we have not shifted from our basically analytical perspective we strongly support efforts to reduce discrimination and prejudice but these can be successful only if we try to understand where we are and what forces are creating the existing situation we hope to reduce the tendency to use declarations and condemnations of other persons actions as substitutes for an investigation of their causes and consequences

this text discusses key debates in the sociology of ethnicity and race arguing that ethnicity is culturally expressed and politically and economically contextualised the historical trajectories of slavery colonialism and nation state formation have seen ethnicities and racisms develop along some parallel and some quite different lines drawing on examples from all around the globe including britain continental europe the usa hawaii and malaysia this book offers a theoretically informed account of a major sociological issue in a truly international and comparative perspective

this work throws new light on the nature and origins of ideas of racial difference it reconstructs the evolution of the modern discourse of race and investigates its meaning in contemporary society

in *race language and culture* franz boas rigorously interrogates the interrelations between these three fundamental aspects of human society written in the early 20th century boas employs an anthropological lens enriched by his advocacy for cultural relativism asserting that culture is a primary influence on human behavior rather than inherent racial characteristics his analytical style combines empirical evidence with philosophical inquiry challenging the scientific racism prevalent in his time and positioning culture as a dynamic entity shaped by historical context and social interactions franz boas often referred to as the father of american anthropology forged his theories against the backdrop of a rapidly evolving understanding of human

what is black culture does it have an essence what do we lose and gain by assuming that it does and by building our laws accordingly this bold and provocative book questions the common presumption of political multiculturalism that social categories such as race ethnicity gender and sexuality are defined by distinctive cultural practices richard ford argues against law reform proposals that would attempt to apply civil rights protections to cultural difference unlike many criticisms of multiculturalism which worry about reverse discrimination or the erosion of core western cultural values the book s argument is primarily focused on the adverse effects of multicultural rhetoric and multicultural rights on their supposed beneficiaries in clear and compelling prose ford argues that multicultural accounts of cultural difference do not accurately describe the practices of social groups instead these accounts are prescriptive they attempt to canonize a narrow parochial and contestable set of ideas about appropriate group culture and to discredit more cosmopolitan lifestyles commitments and values the book argues that far from remedying discrimination and status hierarchy cultural rights share the ideological presuppositions and participate in the discursive and institutional practices of racism sexism and homophobia ford offers specific examples in support of this thesis in diverse contexts such as employment discrimination affirmative action and transracial adoption this is a major contribution to our understanding of today s politics of race by one of the most distinctive and important young voices in america s legal academy
