manufacturing a theory instead of presenting mere verbiage he offers hundreds of examples from the years 800 to 1990 of how poets actually use prosody and the patterns of stress in their work what poets in fact do is what the prosody of poetry written in english in fact is understanding what the poems tell us is not only the crucial but in a sense the only task so english prosody may best tell its own story by its own practice mr raffel has entirely refrained from offering elaborate conclusions or imposing any theoretical frame work it is his implicit thesis that theories of prosody are an unnecessary evil and an unnecessary befuddlement that as often as not make poetry seem unappealing and boring to those who want to understand it mr baffel helps guide his reader by calling attention to the actual practice of real poets both famous and not so famous and he does so in his usual acute and often rather pointed way selections of what poets themselves say about prosody are included as is modern linguistic explanation and commentary

this volume provides new insights into various issues on prosody in contact situations contact referring here to the l2 acquisition process as well as to situations where two language systems may co exist a wide array of phenomena are dealt with prosodic description of linguistic systems in contact situations analysis of prosodic changes language development processes etc and the results obtained may give an indication of what is more or less stable in phonological and prosodic systems in addition the selected papers clearly show how languages may have influenced or may have been influenced by other language varieties in multilingual situations where different languages are in constant contact with one another but also in the process of l2 acquisition unlike previous volumes on related topics which focus in general either on l2 acquisition or on the description and analyses of different varieties of a given language this volume considers both topics in parallel allowing comparison and discussion of the results which may shed new light on more far reaching theoretical questions such as the role of markedness in prosody and the causes of prosodic changes

this volume explores the elusive subject of english prosody the stress rhythm and

since creole languages draw their properties from both their substrate and superstrate sources the typological classification of creoles has long been a major issue for creolists typologists and linguists in general several contradictory proposals have been put forward in the literature for example creole languages typologically pair with their superstrate languages chaudenson 2003 with their substrate languages lefebvre 1998 or even creole languages are alike bickerton 1984 such that they constitute a definable typological class mcwhorter 1998 this book contains 25 chapters bearing on detailed comparisons of some 30 creoles and their substrate languages as the substrate languages of these creoles are typologically different the detailed investigation of substrate features in the creoles leads to a particular answer to the

question of how creoles should be classified typologically the bulk of the data show that creoles reproduce the typological features of their substrate languages this argues that creoles cannot be claimed to constitute a definable typological class
