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in the art and philosophy of the garden philosopher david fenner and botanist ethan fenner examine the philosophical ideas lying behind one of the most universal human activities they strip away our assumptions and take a close look at gardens starting with a definition of what a garden is and argue for a particularly way of understanding their aesthetic properties fenner and fenner make the case that many gardens have a claim to being

what essentially is a garden is it a small plot of land that we put aside to cultivate our favourite vegetables or to grow flowers for our personal enjoyment or is it a symbol a mirror a reflection of our human passions within the context of phenomenology onto-poiesis of life we find the significance of the garden inscribed within the web of the human condition creatively unfurling its form from the vital basis to its loftiest swings of the period the aesthetic synthesis of our passions is carried by the logic promise of life its infinite renewal and infinite response the topic of the present volume is the mysterious ways in which imaginatio creatrix plays within the human ingrownness in natural life transposing dreams nostalgias and enchantments

christopher thacker tells the history of gardens from their origins in the natural paradises of greek myth to the present day studying individual gardens or garden topics which are representative of an age or region he builds up a comprehensive survey of the gardens and garden theories of an era

as part of papua new guinea the trobriant islands are located in a bordering sea of the pacific ocean at the beginning of the 20th century the anthropologist bronislaw malinowski was one of the first to explore the archipelago in the south sea and its inhabitants in the context of his work he discovered that freud's psychoanalytic universality thesis regarding the oedipus complex is not true for the islanders in this first volume out of three malinowsky deals with the tribal economics and social organizations as well as the trobriandan gardening techniques and the magic within this kind of work

this is volume ii of coral gardens and their magic dealing with kilivila terms related to gardening and agriculture kilivila is the language spoken on the trobriand islands a group of islands off the east coast of new guinea this volume will appeal to those with an interest in anthropology and trobriand culture and it would make for a fantastic addition to collections of allied literature contents include language as tool document and cultural reality the translation of untranslatable words the context of words and the context of facts the pragmatic setting of utterances meaning as function of words the sources of meaning in the speech of infants gaps gluts and vagaries of a native terminology etc many vintage books such as this are increasingly scarce and expensive it is with this in mind that we are republishing this volume now in an affordable modern high quality edition complete with a specially commissioned new biography of the author

from the earliest of times people have sought to grow and nurture plants in a garden area gardens and gardeners of the ancient world traces the beginning of gardening and garden history from ancient egypt and mesopotamia to the minoans and mycenaeans greeks etruscans and romans through byzantine islamic and persian gardens right up to the middle ages it shows how gardens in each period were designed and cultivated evidence for garden art and horticulture is gathered from surviving examples of ancient art literature archaeology actual period gardens that have survived the centuries and the wealth of garden myths associated with certain plants these sources bring ancient gardens and their

gardeners back to life and provide information on which plants were chosen as garden worthy their setting and the design and appearance of ancient gardens deities associated with aspects of gardens and the garden s fertility are featured everyone wanted a fertile garden different forms of public and domestic gardens are explored and the features that you would find there whether paths pools arbors and arches seating or decorative sculpture the ideal garden could be like the greek groves of the academy in athens a garden so fine that it was comparable with that of the mythical king alcinoos the paradise contemplated by the islamic world or a personal version of a garden of eden that early christians could create for themselves or in the forecourt of their churches in general books on garden history cover all periods up to the present often placing all ancient gardens in one chapter at the beginning but there is so much of interest to be found in these early millennia generously illustrated with 150 images with plant lists for each period this is essential reading for everyone interested in garden history and ancient societies
