this book is a tribute to the work of criminologist professor ronald v clarke in view of his enormous and enduring contribution to criminology and crime science clarke is best known for his development of the theory and application of situational crime prevention although he also played a major part in the establishment of the british crime survey in discussions of evaluation methodology and in improving the knowledge base and tools for problem oriented policing he has consistently

emphasised the need for crime studies to be practical and well as academically rigorous in this major collection of original essays tilley and farrell bring together leading criminologists from around the globe we inadvertently invited only world class scholars oops the editors profess all of whom are colleagues or ex students of clarke the chapters mainly consist of theoretical and empirical contributions to the areas of situational crime prevention rational choice theory environmental criminology evaluation and problem oriented policing the largely biographical introduction ronald v clarke the quiet revolutionary is based on interviews with clarke

this engaging text takes an evenhanded approach to major theoretical paradigms in evaluation and builds a bridge from them to evaluation practice featuring helpful checklists procedural steps provocative questions that invite readers to explore their own theoretical assumptions and practical exercises the book provides concrete guidance for conducting large and small scale evaluations

numerous sample studies many with reflective commentary from the evaluators reveal the process through which an evaluator incorporates a paradigm into an actual research project the book shows how theory informs methodological choices the specifics of planning implementing and using evaluations it offers balanced coverage of quantitative qualitative and mixed methods approaches useful pedagogical features include examples of large and small scale evaluations from multiple disciplines beginning of chapter reflection questions that set the stage for the material covered extending your thinking questions and practical activities that help readers apply particular theoretical paradigms in their own evaluation projects relevant links including pathways to more details about sampling data collection and analysis boxes offering a closer look at key evaluation concepts and additional studies checklists for readers to determine if they have followed recommended practice

a sound statistical account of the principles and methods for the design and analysis of observational studies readers are assumed to have a working knowledge of basic probability and statistics but otherwise the account is reasonably self contained throughout there are extended discussions of actual observational studies to illustrate the ideas discussed drawn from topics as diverse as smoking and lung cancer lead in children nuclear weapons testing and placement programs for students as a result many researchers will find this an invaluable companion in their work

the papers collected in this volume examine some of the methodological issues involved in determining the effectiveness of criminal justice programs and practices

annotation leading social research methodologists and evaluators address the issues of validity research design and social experimentation in this first of two volumes inspired by the work of donald campbell and sponsored by the american evaluation association the first part of the book focuses on three types of validity external construct and statistical much attention is given to meta analysis statistical testing and effect sizes the second part is a major critique of campbell s vision and practice of social experimentation contributors review and extend campbell s ideas concentrating on their relevance to evaluation and social intervention and seeking to define an experimenting society

the intent of this volume of new directions for program evaluation is to update even to alter our thinking about quasi experimentation in applied social research and program evaluation this volume makes the case that we have moved beyond

concern for evaluation theoretical prescriptions emerged about 40 years ago giving it a history that is both recent enough to be part of the living experience of many of today's theorists and old enough to afford an opportunity for an analysis of how the field has evolved over time this book examines current evaluation theories and traces their evolution with the point of view that theories build upon theories and therefore evaluation theories are related to each other initially all evaluation was derived from social science research methodology and accountability concerns the way in which these evaluation roots grew to form a tree helps to provide a better understanding of evaluation theory thus the book uses an evaluation theory tree as its central metaphor the authors posit that evaluation theories can be classified by the extent to which they focus on methods uses or valuing these three approaches form the major limbs of the tree in addition to the authors overview which analyzes the evaluation theory tree and connections among theories the book contains essays by most of the leading evaluation theorists in these pieces the evaluators comment on their own development and give their views of their placement upon the tree

this successful introduction to behavioral research methods written by two leaders in the field provides step by step guidance through the processes of planning an empirical study analyzing and interpreting data and reporting findings and conclusions it encourages readers to be analytical and critical not only in interpreting research findings but also in investigating what is behind the claims and conclusions in news reports of scientific results while the primary emphasis is on behavioral and social research a strong effort is made to connect these disciplines with the empirical reasoning used in other fields in order to underscore the unity of science the volume examines behavioral research and scientific method creative ideas and working hypotheses ethical considerations and guidelines observation and measurement design and implementation describing data and making inferences and statistical tests for those interested in an introduction to research methods
