this handbook provides a detailed exploration of the rich and diverse theatrical work produced by women in the first two decades of 21st century british theatre the book explores key issues and methodologies relevant to women working in the uk s theatre industry including the legacies of feminism and its role in shaping contemporary work by women the politics of visibility and inclusion in theatrical institutions and collaborative strategies in creating original work it closely examines how women in contemporary british theatre tackle urgent social issues such as environmental risk the representation of marginalized identities and mental and physical wellbeing chapters by both established and early career scholars from a variety of international contexts present new perspectives on significant questions and issues underpinning women s work in 21st century british theatre by engaging with contemporary debates from theatre and performance studies and cultural theory a concluding roundtable with

women theatre practitioners addresses key questions pertaining to their work including working conditions the politics of funding and of ageing disability and care with a foreword by the guardian's chief theatre critic arifa akbar and featuring research tools such as introductions to sections a detailed list of sources and an annotated bibliography this is an authoritative study for anyone with a keen research interest in the distinct contribution of women to contemporary british theatre and performance

solving your script is a hardheaded approach to solving technical problems in scripts in down to earth chapters award winning playwright and screenwriter jeffrey sweet introduces tools enabling writers to write exposition using the future tense make characters vivid even before they appear find the idiosyncrasies in a character that will generate story each chapter includes a discussion of a particular technique followed by an assignment from sweet's workshop and scenes written by his colleagues and students there are also detailed discussions of what works in the scenes what is problematic and why

presents new scholarship on the innovative playwright caryl churchill discussing her major plays alongside topics including sexual politics and terror

serious money is a satirical study of the effects of the big bang though written in response to specific events churchill opens the play with an extract from a 17th century comedy about stock jobbers little has changed she suggests and little will since its premiere at the royal court theatre london in 1987 it has prompted city financiers worldwide both to applaud and decry its presentation of their lives this edition contains an introduction and a chronology of the playwright's life and work

giving equal space to the sanctity of script and the artistic freedom of directors this book addresses the difficulties

encountered by playwrights and directors as they bring a script to the stage inspired directors can help a writer of genius turn his play into exciting theatre but playwrights find that giving directors leeway to interpret and modify text can result in directors overriding authorial intentions this book presents the best that has been written by literary theorists on the current definitions of text and attempts to depart from quick rule of thumb assessments of the problem drawing from definitive articles in literary and theatre journals part one gives the reader basic concepts and terminology interviews with playwrights and directors showing the complexity of the issue appear in part two and part three includes case studies of playwrights and directors who faced production crises legal aspects of collaboration are considered in part four the book concludes with a positive approach and possible solution to the problem

the theatre of caryl churchill documents and analyses the major plays and productions of one of britain s greatest and most innovative playwrights drawing on hundreds of never before seen archival sources from the us and the uk it provides an essential guide to churchill s groundbreaking work for students and theatregoers each chapter illuminates connections across plays and explores major scripts alongside unpublished and unfinished projects each considers the rehearsal room the stage and the printed text each demonstrates how churchill has pushed the boundaries of dramatic aesthetics while posing urgent political and theoretical questions but since each maps churchill s work in a different way each deploys a different reading practice for many approaches are necessary to characterise such a restlessly imaginative and prolific career through its five interlocking parts the theatre of caryl churchill tells a story about the playwright her work and its place in contemporary drama

in traps a set of characters meet themselves and their pasts to create plenty of sinewy lines and joyous juxtapositions plays and players vinegar tom is set in the world of seventeenth century witchcraft but it speaks

through its striking images and its plethora of ironic contradictions of and to this century tribune light shining in buckinghamshire is set during the civil war and unflinchingly shows the intolerance that was the obverse side of the demand for common justice deftly it sketches in the kind of social conditions that led to hunger for revolution the play has an austere eloquence that precisely matches its subject the guardian cloud nine sheds light on some of the british empire s repressed dark side and is a marvelous play sometimes scurrilous always observed with wicked accuracy and ultimately surprisingly rather moving it plunges straight to the heart of the endless convolutions of sexual mores and does so with acrobatic wit guardian owners i was in an old woman s flat when a young man offering her money to move came round that was one of the starting points of the play caryl churchill the plays in this volume represent the best of churchill s writing up to and including her emergence onto the international theatre scene with cloud nine
