critical theory traces its roots from marxism through the renowned frankfurt school to a wide array of national and cultural traditions raymond morrow s book traces the history and outlines the major tenets of critical theory for an undergraduate audience he exemplifies the theory through an analysis of two leading social theorists j um urgen habermas and anthony giddens unique to this volume is the emphasis on the link between critical theory and empirical research and social science methodology often

thought to be incompatible

this text brings together leading critical theorists of world politics to discuss both the promise and the pitfalls of their work the contributors range broadly across the terrain of world politics engaging with both theory and emancipatory practice critiques by two scholars from other traditions are also included the result is a seminal statement of the critical theory approach to understanding world politics

the contrast between the critical theory of the frankfurt school and karl manheim's sociology of knowledge has often been noted but never fully explicated most accounts of the frankfurt school's critique of manheim have taken the form of partisan affirmations or denials of its success this study provides the first detailed comparison of these two conflicting approaches to the theory of ideology following reconstructions of the origins of the two perspectives and a review of the frankfurt school's critique of manheim a systematic comparison is developed around the four central issues of totality consciousness and social existence ideology and truth an analysis of the significance of the contrast for current debates in social theory is offered in conclusion

this important study of the relationship between historical developments and the work of the scholars associated with the frankfurt institute for social research yields fascinating insights into the actual workings of the institute and the relationships among its members the book has already had a major impact in germany where it has opened up the subject for argument and analysis by a new generation of scholars theory and politics first explores the effect of political experience on the process of theory construction from 1930 to 1945 the central figure in this examination is max horkheimer whose work is seen as the key to the shift in the frankfurt school's focus from materialism to critical theory to a critique of instrumental reason within each of the three periods defined by these foci the author examines external historical political events including the school's emigration to america and their reflection in the group's changing conception of the relation of theory to practice as well as in its detailed theoretical position along the way he helps to clarify such questions as the school's evolving attitudes toward the soviet union fascism science and the desired utopia the book then examines what may have been the strongest stage of critical theory the program for interdisciplinary research that emerged in the early 1930s the author acutely portrays horkheimer's conception of a synthesis between philosophy and empirical social science that would result in a form of social research relevant to the central problems of the day as martin jay notes in his foreword helmut dubiel has become not only an analyst of critical theory but a gifted contributor to its ongoing reception and development he is currently a research fellow at the university of frankfurt theory and politics is included in the series studies in contemporary german social thought edited by thomas mccarthy

of critical theory and its theorists is an intelligent accessible overview of the entire critical theory tradition written by one of the leading experts on the subject filled with original insights and valuable historical narratives of critical theory and its theorists

critical theory emerged in the 1920s from the work of the frankfurt school the circle of german jewish academics who sought to diagnose and if at all possible cure the ills of society particularly fascism and capitalism in this book stephen eric bronner provides sketches of leading representatives of the critical tradition such as george lukács and ernst bloch theodor adorno and walter benjamin herbert marcuse and jurgen habermas as well as many of its seminal texts and empirical investigations this very short introduction sheds light on the cluster of concepts and themes that set critical theory apart from its more traditional philosophical competitors bronner explains and discusses concepts such as method and agency alienation and reification the culture industry and repressive tolerance non identity and utopia he argues for the introduction of new categories and perspectives for illuminating the obstacles to progressive change and focusing upon hidden transformative possibilities only a critique of critical theory can render it salient for a new age that is precisely what this very short introduction provides

this volume explores andrew feenberg s work in critical theory feenberg is considered one of the key second generation critical theorists with a keen interest in philosophy of technology he has made a vital contribution to critical theory in ways that remain of interest given the pressing technological issues of our time the authors of this book highlight not only the ways that feenberg has begun to make good on what is often characterized as the broken promise of critical theory to address issues of technology but also the continued importance of critical theory more generally and of feenberg s contributions to understanding this tradition

a collection of seminal essays many appearing in english for the first time which provides an excellent overview of the critical theory developed by the frankfurt school

axel honneth has been instrumental in advancing the work of the frankfurt school of critical theorists rebuilding their effort to combine radical social and political analysis with rigorous philosophical inquiry these eleven essays reclaim the relevant themes of the frankfurt school which counted theodor w adorno max horkheimer walter benjamin jürgen habermas franz neumann and albrecht wellmer as members they also engage with kant freud alexander mitscherlich and michael walzer whose work on morality history democracy and individuality intersects with the frankfurt school s core concerns collected here for the first time in english honneth s essays pursue the unifying themes and theses that support the methodologies and thematics of critical social theory and they address the possibilities of continuing this tradition through radically changed theoretical and social conditions according to honneth there is a unity that underlies critical theory s multiple approaches the way in which reason is both distorted and furthered in contemporary capitalist society and while much is dead in the social and psychological doctrines of critical social theory its central inquiries remain vitally relevant is social progress still possible after the horrors of the twentieth century does capitalism deform reason and if so in what respects can we justify the relationship between law and violence in secular terms or is it inextricably bound to divine justice how can we be free when we re subject to socialization in a highly complex and in many respects unfree society for honneth suffering and moral struggle are departure points for a new reconstructive form of social criticism one that is based solidly in the empirically grounded interdisciplinary approach of the frankfurt school

to social and political practices and at the same time transcends them forst regards society as a whole as an order of justification comprising complexes of different norms referring to institutions and corresponding practices of justification the task of a critique of relations of justification therefore is to analyse such legitimations with regard to their validity and genesis and to explore the social and political asymmetries leading to inequalities in the justification power which enables persons or groups to contest given justifications and to create new ones starting from the concept of justification as a basic social practice forst develops a theory of political and social justice human rights and democracy as well as of power and of critique itself in so doing he engages in a critique of a number of contemporary approaches in political philosophy and critical theory finally he also addresses the question of the utopian horizon of social criticism

this text collects together ben agger s essays on the origins significance and applications of critical theory a perspective associated with the frankfurt school the essays address a variety of topics including the viability of marxist theory and new social movements

an anthology of readings and extracts providing a comprehensive introduction to the main schools and positions of critical theory the book is divided into five sections structuralism and poststructuralism psychoanalytical theory marxism feminism and post foundational ethics and politics it includes a general introduction covering the field of critical theory and identifies founding theorists and movements with a bibliography and notes

this volume reassesses the nature of the current global economic crisis and its implication for the 21st century through the unique lens of marx s theory of the value form as the unconscious matrix of modern society going beyond orthodox marxist and postmodernist accounts the author offers fresh new readings of marx benjamin foucault and Žižek here he argues that capitalism has not only entered its greatest crisis since wwii but has in fact reached its historical limit and is in terminal decline in this light the book seeks to answer how a rerun of keynesian regulations could possibly resolve the crisis it also inquires as to whether a green new deal might succeed when the gap between work to be had and work to be done widens and what alternatives neo marxian approaches offer considering the failure of marxism in the 20th century this far reaching critical examination of the crisis not only builds on critical theory but also offers new readings of key theorists that will appeal to anyone interested in political theory critical theory and political economy

this book examines the vital role of affect and feeling within the work of the early frankfurt school the author investigates a range of concepts including melancholia hope un happiness objects and mimesis and argues that a contemporary reading of critical theory needs to accommodate an adequate understanding of affect

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
