thing and have drawn bizarre conclusions by assuming that plath's writing can be used as a reliable source for diagnosing her mental condition it is obvious that this kind of immediate understanding of confessional poetry leads nowhere as tracy brain puts it in her essay about the dangers of reading sylvia plath's work as an unfiltered outpour of personal experience dangerous concessions sylvia plath how can we ever hope to distinguish the extreme diction and address that is prompted by lived events from a vividly imagined drama that is the result of an expertly assumed style the answer is we cannot still one should not altogether ignore the context of the confessional movement when interpreting sylvia plath but how can confessional poetry be dealt with without getting caught in the traps and pitfalls of a biographic reading this essay will first try to detect the underlying principles of the so called confessional poetry and position it within literary history by revealing some of the influences and conventions of confessional poetry it aims to uncover the deceiving strategies of this type of poetry the subsequent interpretation of sylvia plath's lady lazarus will then try to concentrate on the cultural and social context the poem was produced in and examine in which ways plath used these different contexts as well as the deceiving strategies of confessional poetry in general to create the unique character of the poem

although the representation of suicide is commonplace in literature few studies have explicitly dealt with the meaning of suicide in the works of women writers the art of dying applies theories concerning the division of women literary figures into angels or monsters to representative literary suicides of the nineteenth century including the suicides of women characters in works by kate chopin and sylvia plath the

awakening by kate chopin is often misunderstood by critics who read it using the romantic paradigm chopin breaks that paradigm by presenting the suicide of edna pontellier as heroic suicide is a prevalent motif and theme in two works by sylvia plath the bell jar and ariel an extensive analysis of plath s last poem edge portrays the suicide of the speaker as a calm and heroic act in keeping with the tone set by chopin in the awakening the art of dying concludes by exploring women s need for self actualization within the framework of love marriage and motherhood institutions that have always demanded from women an unnatural and harmful degree of unselfishness the inherent message in the works of artists such as chopin and plath is that women should not have to die in order to live

explores the therapeutic uses and effects of writing in a post freudian age

historical but is itself as local and concrete as these contexts an experience as well as a meditation on our experiences in its particularity its flexibility its sensual and sonic complexity its consideration of the extra rational experiences of pleasure and desire and above all in the ways in which it speaks with both more and less authority more and less presence than an actual human voice poetry offers us the experience of the unknown at the core of proposed self knowledge this is lyric poetry s enduring though not sole claim on us

since her death in 1963 at the age of thirty sylvia plath has become a strange icon an object of intense speculation of fantasy repulsion and desire few twentieth century western writers have inspired such a range of deeply felt responses not even her tombstone is allowed to rest in peace admirers exalt plath as a priestess of high art in a degenerate culture or see her work as an indictment of patriarchal society as she painfully experienced it in her relationships with her family her analysts and her husband poet ted hughes

detractors however see plath as a seductive destructive death figure whose solipsistic negative rantings offend conventional mores and values in both popular and scholarly circles there seem to be no middle ground jacqueline rose stands back from the debates and looks instead at the swirl of controversy recognizing it as a phenomenon in itself one with much to tell us about how a culture selects and judges writers how we hear women s voices and how we receive messages from to and about our unconscious selves rose frees plath from the rigid opposition between psychoanalytic and feminist agendas and offers a new way of understanding plath and ourselves jacket
