utilizing research on networked struggles in both the 18th century atlantic world and our modern day resistance space and political identities the making of counter global networks challenges existing understandings of the relations between space politics and resistance to develop an innovative account of networked forms of resistance and political activity explores counter global struggles in both the past and present including both the 18th century atlantic world and contemporary forms of resistance examines the productive geographies of contestation foregrounds the solidarities and geographies of connection between different place based struggles and argues that such solidarities are essential to produce more plural forms of globalization

boys underachievement in education has now become a global concern taxing the minds of governments across the western world boys and schooling in the early years represents the first major study of its kind to focus specifically on young boys and achievement it makes a powerful argument for the need to begin tackling the problem of boys lower educational performance in the early years this book includes one of the most detailed and up to date analyses of national evidence regarding gender differences in educational achievement from the early years through to the end of compulsory schooling together with original and in depth case studies that vividly capture the differing experiences and perspectives of 5 6 year old boys the book sets out the nature of the problems facing them in education and highlights a number of practical ways in which these issues can begin to be addressed this is essential reading for all those working in the early years who are concerned about boys lower levels of achievement and want to know what they can do about it

why are some harms defined as crimes while others are not this pioneering collection disrupts the boundaries of criminology offering a bold innovative exploration of crime state power and social harm across historical and global contexts bridging zemiology governmentality studies and decolonial theory this book offers a fresh perspective on how the colonial roots and ongoing dynamics of global capitalism perpetuate harm particularly in the global south through compelling case studies on topics such as tourism drugs non human animals food ecology minoritized groups and migration it reveals how colonial legacies and structural injustices shape who experiences harm whose experiences are acknowledged and how harm may be resisted

economic development and urban growth are the contested grounds of urban politics business elites and politicians tend to forge pro growth coalitions centered around downtown development while progressive and neighborhood activists counter with a more balanced approach that features a strong neighborhood component urban politics is often shaped by this conflict which has intellectual as well as practical dimensions in some cities neighborhood interests have triumphed in others the pro growth agenda has prevailed in this illuminating comparative study barbara ferman demonstrates why neighborhood challenges to pro growth politics were much more successful in pittsburgh than they were in chicago operating largely in the civic arena pittsburgh s neighborhood groups encountered a political culture and institutional structure conducive to empowering neighborhood progressivism in housing and economic development policymaking in contrast the pro growth agenda in chicago was challenged in the electoral arena which was dominated by machine ward based politicians who regarded any independent neighborhood organizing as a threat consequently neighborhood demands for policymaking input were usually thwarted besides revealing why the development policies of two important american cities diverged ferman s unique comparative approach to this issue significantly expands

the scope of urban analysis among other things it provides the first serious study to incorporate the civic sector neighborhood politics as an important component of urban regimes ferman also emphasizes institutional and cultural factors often ignored or relegated to residual roles in other studies and expounds on their influence in shaping local politics and policy to add an analytical and normative dimension to urban analysis she focuses on the non elite actors not just the economic and political elites who compose governing coalitions ultimately ferman takes a more holistic and balanced view of large cities than is typical for urban studies as she argues that neighborhoods are an important integral part of what cities are and can be for that reason especially her work will have a profound impact upon our understanding of urban politics

while violence by boys towards girls is readily recognized as being gender based mills education u of queensland australia argues that all violence of boys in schools is gender based for example contending that the common notion of bullying is an example of boundary policing usually with a homophobic edge which serves to normalize particular constructions of masculinity while also determining where a boy is positioned within a hierarchical arrangement of masculinities drawing on insights of feminist scholarship he attempts to analyze the possible development of strategies and programs that seek to challenge the existence of gender based violence in schools after discussing the theoretical underpinnings of such work he moves to an exploration of the curriculum and pedagogy issues in relation to challenging dominant notions of masculinity that lead to violence annotation copyrighted by book news inc portland or
