from bilingual education and racial epithets to gendered pronouns and immigration discourses language is a central concern in contemporary conversations and controversies surrounding social inequality developed as a collaborative effort by members of the american anthropological association s language and social justice task force this innovative volume synthesizes scholarly insights on the relationship between patterns of communication and the creation of more just societies using case studies by leading and emergent scholars and practitioners written especially for undergraduate audiences the book is ideal for introductory courses on social justice in linguistics and anthropology

is access to higher education really open to all how does the experience of higher education vary between social groups are graduate jobs harder to find for some than for others the transformation of higher education from an elite experience to a mass system delivering advanced education to a socially mixed clientele has often been conflated with a process of equalization through wider access but is this really the case andy furlong and fred cartmel fear not arguing that young people from social and economically disadvantaged families suffer

from unfair access arrangements have a poorer student experience and have limited contact with their middle class peers moreover students from less advantaged families who successfully complete their courses tend to face greater difficulty securing graduate jobs and may be left with higher levels of debt taking a holistic approach that focuses on access to higher education experiences in higher education and gains derived from participation the book explores the barriers that impede the progress of young people from less advantaged families and outlines the various forms of stratification that help limit the possibilities for social mobility through education higher education and social justice provides essential reading for anyone who has an interest in higher education or a concern for social justice including lecturers administrators and policy makers in higher education

rosamund sutherland argues against a skills based curriculum suggesting that from a social justice perspective the priority of schools should be to teach traditional subjects such as mathematics and history giving young people the formal knowledge they are not likely to learn outside school she draws on the work of michael young lev vygotsky amartya sen and david olson in order to develop new theoretical and practical insights that offer ways of changing policy and practice to improve equality and life chances for young people
