

The Crusades Islamic Perspectives

complex issue of the interaction between muslims and crusaders in a social economic and cultural setting the epilogue traces the profound impact of the crusades on muslim consciousness up to the present day the crusades is also lavishly illustrated with 500 black and white pictures and two full color plate sections

this comprehensive work of cultural history gives us something we have never had a view of the crusades as seen through muslim eyes with breathtaking command of medieval muslim sources as well as the vast literature on medieval european and muslim culture carole hillenbrand has produced a book that shows not only how the crusades were perceived by the muslims but how the crusades affected the muslim world militarily culturally and psychologically as the author demonstrates that influence continues now centuries after the events in the crusades the reader discovers how the muslims reacted to the franks and how muslim populations were displaced the ensuing period of jihad the careers of nur al din and saladin and the interpenetration of muslim and christian cultures stereotypes of the franks in muslim documents offer a fascinating counter to western views of the infidel of legend for readers interested in the middle ages military history the history of religion and postcolonial studies the crusades opens a window onto a conflict we have only viewed from one side the crusades is richly illustrated with eighteen color plates and over five hundred line drawings and black and white photographs

for many centuries the history of the crusades as written by western historians was based solidly on western sources evidence from the islamic societies that the crusaders attacked was used only sparingly in part because it was hard for most westerners to read and in part because much of it was inaccessible even for historians who did speak arabic carole hillenbrand set out to re evaluate the sources for the crusading period not only looking with fresh eyes at known accounts but also locating and utilizing new sources that had previously been overlooked her work involved her in conducting extensive evaluations of the new sources assessing their arguments their evidence and their reasoning in order to assess their value and using the critical thinking skill of analysis a powerful method for understanding how arguments are built to place them correctly in the context of crusade studies as a whole the result is not only a history that is more balanced better argued and more adequate than most that have gone before it but also a work with relevance for today at a time when crusading imagery and mentions of the current war on terror as a crusade help to fuel political narrative hillenbrand s evaluative work acts as an important corrective to oversimplification and misrepresentation

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the crusades continue to exert a fascination in the west as a story of perceived gallantry and battles against impossible odds yet what is less often considered is their effect on the holy land and in particular the response of the muslim world to the invasions of european crusaders in this book w b bartlett author of four books on the crusades looks at these great events from the muslim point of view one of the effects was to unite a previously divided islamic world against a common enemy in the process they gave an unstoppable impetus towards the declaring of jihad against the west a holy war against christendom they also helped to shape the careers of some important figures most notably saladin but also other great men like sultan baibars and nur al din the rise of these great leaders is traced in this book as are the many great battles that were fought by men just as devoted to their cause as the crusaders were

but what if we take a closer look on what appears to be behind the ambiguous history of crusades and holy wars are there perhaps more sophisticated explanations we have to differentiate the motives for the main campaigns in an assumed continuous conflict therefore we will see over the crusades the fierce war at the front between christendom and islam under ottoman rule and finally the modern antagonisms to verify or falsify that theory of a causally determined cultural conflict

constantinople by the fourth crusade in 1204 in order to understand the history of the region during this period one must be aware of the rich source material created by these shifting populations in a wide range of languages and with differing traditions of historical writing the fourteen essays give an overview of the material highlighting any problems the historian may have in dealing with it and provide detailed bibliographical surveys latin arabic jewish slavonic georgian armenian and syriac sources are all discussed this invaluable reference work offers new approaches for all those working on the meeting of the christian and muslim worlds in this period

the first great city the crusaders came to in 1089 was not jerusalem but constantinople the capital of the byzantine empire almost as much as jerusalem itself constantinople was the key to the foundation survival and ultimate eclipse of the crusading kingdom the byzantines had developed an ideology over seven hundred years which placed constantinople rather than rome or jerusalem at the centre of the world the attitudes of its rulers reflected this priority and led to tensions with the crusaders over military and diplomatic strategy at the same time the riches and sophistication of the great city made a lasting impression on the crusaders even though they found byzantine society alien and remote in the end the lure of the city's wealth was irresistibly fatal to the claims of christian unity in 1204 the fourth crusade under the venetian doge enrico dandolo captured and sacked constantinople signalling the effective end of almost a thousand years of byzantine dominance in the east

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
