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philip j ivanhoe s richly annotated translation of this classic work is accompanied by his engaging interpretation and commentary a lucid introduction and a language appendix that compares eight classic translations of the opening passage of the work and invites the reader to consider the principles upon which each was rendered

this translation shows that dao de jing is far more than a work of personal inspiration it is also a book of universal scope that makes penetrating comments still applicable today on politics statecraft cosmology aesthetics and ethics

this translation presents daoism s basic text in highly readable contemporary english

incorporating the latest scholarship in the field including the most recent discoveries of ancient manuscripts in the 1970s and 90s the book explains daodejing s often cryptic verses in a clear and concise way the introduction interprets the daodejing s poetic imagery in the context of ancient chinese symbolism and a brief philosophical analysis accompanies each of the 81 translated chapters of the daodejing

a new version of the dao that was 30 years in the making it truly is an easy to understand text that is written in english but retains the tone of the original chinese text it provides a blank page opposite each chapter for the reader to record their own thoughts and ideas having been written by a layman and not a scholar it does not contain any academic analysis it is solely the evaluation of one attempting to understand and live by the words of the old master

the tao te ching is a classic of chinese literature and one of the foundation texts of taoism a chinese religious philosophy it is also known as the daodejing dao de jing daode jing or simply as the laozi tao te ching is the romanization of the title which dates back to the late 19th century ad when english transliterations first appeared the date of original publication is still unknown but the oldest part can be traced back to the latter portion of the 4th century bc however modern experts believe it was written or put together after the zhuangzi the other seminal text of daoism which was published in the 3rd century bc there are several different translations of the title but the most common is as follows dao or tao means way but is most often used to mean the way as in the fundamental force driving the universe de has several meanings including perhaps most relevantly virtue jing in this context means something like canon or great book so the full title can be understood to mean the book of the way of virtue the book comprises 81 chapters today but there is evidence that chapter division was a later development for the book if this is the case then the original text had a much more free flowing style as it stands now the book is poetic in form with allowances for broad interpretation of the text it is written with an interesting rhetorical style it features bold declarative statements that are immediately confronted with statements that seem to contradict them some experts believe that the purpose of this style is to get the reader thinking to reconcile these contradictions

tao te ching also commonly known as lao tzu is perhaps the most important of chinese classical texts with an unparalleled influence on chinese thought this bilingual edition consists of two parts the english text in part one is a reprint of the earlier translation of the so called wang pi text first published by penguin books in 1963 part two is the fresh translation of a text which is a conflation of two manuscripts of the lao tzu dating at the latest from the early western han and discovered at ma wang tui in december 1973 the result is a text with a fuller use of particles free from the scribal errors and editorial tampering of subsequent ages

laozi also lao tzu 老子 or lao tze chinese 老聃 pinyin lǎo zǐ literally old master was an ancient chinese philosopher and writer he is known as the reputed author of the

tao te ching the founder of philosophical taoism and a deity in religious taoism and traditional chinese religions a semi legendary figure laozi is usually dated to around the 6th century bce and reckoned a contemporary of confucius but some historians contend that he actually lived during the warring states period of the 5th or 4th century bce a central figure in chinese culture laozi is claimed by both the emperors of the tang dynasty and modern people of the li surname as a founder of their lineage laozi s work has been embraced by various anti authoritarian movements 4 as well as chinese legalism the tao te ching is a classic chinese text written around the 6th century bc by laozi a zhou dynasty courtier while its authorship is debated the text remains a fundamental building block of taoism and one of the most influential works of its time today it s one of the most translated works in the world the work itself is a series of 81 short poetic sections each one written in a fluid ambiguous style leaving them open to wide interpretation subjects range from advice to those in power to advice to regular people and adages for daily living because of its ambiguous nature the tao te ching is famously difficult to translate and many if not all translations are significantly influenced by the translator s state of mind this translation is by james legge a famous scottish sinologist and the first professor of chinese at oxford university traditionally attributed to lao tzu an older contemporary of confucius 551 479 bc it is now thought that the work was compiled in about the fourth century bc an anthology of wise sayings it offers a model by which the individual can live rather than explaining the human place in the universe the moral code it encourages is based on modesty and self restraint and the rewards reaped for such a life are harmony and flow of life

many of the brightest chinese minds have used the form of the commentary to open the terse and poetic chapters of the laozi to their readers and also to develop a philosophy of their own none has been more sophisticated philosophically probing and influential in the endeavor than a young genius of the third century c e wang bi 226 249 in this book rudolf g wagner provides a full translation of the laozi that extracts from wang bi s commentary the manner in which he read the text as well as a full translation of wang bi s commentary and his essay on the subtle pointers of the laozi the result is a chinese reading of the laozi that will surprise and delight western readers familiar with some of

the many translations of the work a chinese reading of the daodejing is part of rudolf wagner s trilogy on wang bi s philosophy and classical studies which also includes the craft of a chinese commentator wang bi on the laozi and language ontology and political philosophy in china wang bi s scholarly exploration of the dark xuanxue both published by suny press

an extensive scholarly literature written in the 20th century holds that in ancient greek and roman thought history is understood as circular and repetitive a consequence of their anti temporal metaphysics in contrast with judaeo christian thought which sees history as linear and unique a consequence of their messianic and hence radically temporal theology gerald press presents a more general view that the graeco roman and judaeo christian cultures were fundamentally alien and opposed cultural forces and that therefore christianity s victory over paganism included the replacement or supersession of one intellectual world by another and then shows that contrary to this view there was substantial continuity between pagan and christian ideas of history in antiquity rather than a striking opposition between cyclic and linear patterns he finds that the foundation of the christian view of history as goal directed lies in the rhetorical rather than the theological motives of early christian writers
