manga in japanese means comics and comics in japan are simply the most marvelous  
multifaceted misunderstood mass market monster publishing phenomenon ever anywhere  
a multibillion dollar industry tens of millions of devoted fans thousands of ceaselessly  
toiling artists a few of whom grow fabulously wealthy there s something for everyone too  
from historical romances set in the french revolution and bloody duels between medieval  
samurai to tales of wrestlers enlightened buddhist sages spacemen anthropomorphic cats  
gangsters girls in and out of love warrior robots sushi makers and even the tireless mr  
nobody at the office the esteemed soldier in japan s economic miracle army until now this  
world has been hardly remarked upon by western observers except for mention of the fact  
that on trains in restaurants and indeed at every leisure moment the japanese seem to  
have their heads buried in comics but with this book japanese comics emerge in all their  
spectacular variety for the first time in english author fred schodt offers a wealth of  
highlights and sidelights into history themes and artists and every page is chock full of  
samples from japanese comic magazines here is popular culture running at a high pitch  
and outsiders might find it all a bit puzzling and perverse so if you re a bit straitlaced take

it slow but if your assumptions about comics are open to challenge or if you thought you knew the real japan because you ve read all about zen and the tea ceremony and theory z read on read on

outside japan the term manga usually refers to comics originally published in japan yet nowadays many publications labelled manga are not translations of japanese works but rather have been wholly conceived and created elsewhere this book takes seriously the political economy and cultural production of this so called global manga produced throughout the americas europe and asia and explores the conditions under which it arises and flourishes what counts as manga and who gets to decide the implications of global manga for contemporary economies of cultural and creative labour the ways in which it is shaped by or mixes with local cultural forms and contexts and ultimately what it means for manga to be authentically japanese in the first place

japanese manga comic books have attracted a devoted global following in the popular press manga is said to have invaded and conquered the united states and its success is held up as a quintessential example of the globalization of popular culture challenging american hegemony in the twenty first century in manga in america the first ever book length study of the history structure and practices of the american manga publishing industry casey brienza explodes this assumption drawing on extensive field research and interviews with industry insiders about licensing deals processes of translation adaptation and marketing new digital publishing and distribution models and more brienza shows that the transnational production of culture is an active labor intensive and oft contested process of domestication ultimately manga in america argues that the domestication of manga reinforces the very same imbalances of national power that might otherwise seem to have been transformed by it and that the success of japanese manga in the united states actually serves to make manga everywhere more american

this book analyzes the role of manga in contemporary japanese political expression and debate and explores its role in propagating new perceptions regarding japanese history

in the last few decades japanese popular culture productions have been consolidated as one of the most influential and profitable global industries as a creative industry japanese media mixes generate multimillion dollar revenues being a product of international synergies and the natural appeal of the characters and stories the transnationalization of investment capital diversification of themes and sub genres underlying threat in the proliferation of illegal audiences development of internet streaming technologies and other new transformations in media mix based production models make the study of these products even more relevant today in this way manga japanese comics anime japanese animation and video games are not necessarily products designed for the national market more than ever it is necessary to reconcile national and transnational positions for the study of this cultural production the present volume includes contributions aligned to the analysis of japanese popular culture flow from many perspectives cultural studies film comic studies sociology etc although we have emphasized the relationships between manga anime and international audiences the selected works include the following topics

studies on audiences national and transnational case studies fandom production and otaku culture cross media and transmedia perspectives theoretical perspectives on manga anime and media mixes

during the japanese bubble economy of the 1980 s the youth of japan began to exert unprecedented influence on japanese culture through their spirited patronage of certain art forms previously deemed subcultural or avant garde among these were manga japanese comics or animation and shogekijo japanese little theater these art forms while very unlike in the manner in which they were produced and disseminated can be shown to exhibit a common language manga discourse this discourse presents the ludic image oriented and seemingly infantile but simultaneously transhistorical language the range and meaning of these discursive forms as they are related to changes in the forms of shogekijo in japan between the 1960 s and the 1980 s are explored here using the work of noda hideki and his troupe yume no yuminsha as example founded in the early 70 s in the dark recesses of the university of tokyo noda s troupe blossomed into a major component of the theater boom of the bright leisure oriented 80 s the question which noda s theater raises for those who seek to define japan s modernization in the arts is how something defined as instinctively little could become so big in line with its predecessors in the avant garde movements of the 1960 s and 70 s the 1980 s shogekijo borrowed from popular theater of the pre modern period in reaction to the western and script oriented shingeki and from modern comedy in early twentieth century japan but unlike its avant garde predecessors it eschewed direct political confrontation with the power holders and consciously sought to expand its audiences through capitalistic means japanese youth born in the postwar generation could be led to appreciate the anti shingeki message of shogekkijo noda predicted only if it could be put in the playful and fantastic language of manga discourse in some ways this counterintuitive movement to youth subculture fulfilled shogekijo s mission to return theater to its japanese roots and thereby complete the process of a truly japanese modernization in the arts

following the opening of japan its early popular culture with colour woodcuts by the likes of hokusai and kuniyoshi has achieved worldwide fame and with manga and anime japan s contemporary pop culture has also conquered the world woodcuts and woodblock printed books by famous ukiyo e artists meet up with mass media comics and animated films from modern japan page 4 of cover

japanese animation video games and manga have attracted fans around the world the characters the stories and the sensibilities that come out of these cultural products are together called japan cool this is not a sudden fad but is rooted in manga japanese comics which since the mid 1940s have developed in an exponential way in spite of a gradual decline in readership manga still commands over a third of the publishing output the volume of manga works that is being produced and has been through history is enormous there are manga publications that attract readers of all ages and genders the diversity in content attracts readers well into adulthood surveys on reading practices have found that almost all japanese people read manga or have done so at some point in their lives the skills of reading manga are learned by readers themselves but learned in the context of other readers and in tandem with school learning manga reading practices are sustained by the practices of other readers and manga content therefore serves as a topic of conversation for both families and friends moreover manga is one of the largest sources of content for media production in film television and video games manga literacy the practices of the readers the diversity of titles and the sheer number of works provide the basis for the movement recognized as japan cool reading japan cool is directed at an audience of students of japanese studies discourse analysts educators parents and manga readers
